

400 Trapshooters To Come Here For Oregon Shoot

Scattergunners by the hundreds will converge on this community next week end. They'll be here for the annual Oregon State shoot of the Pacific International Trapshooting Association. Approximately 400 shooters are anticipated from a number of western states.

Medford Gun club is the host.

Out-of-state shooters will not be eligible for Oregon championships. But, there are a large number of guest trophies offered and the gunners, some of them among the best in the country, from bordering states should be on hand as a sizable delegation. This group will include Cal and Ruth Ray, Eureka, Calif., both of whom have gained national titles.

The tournament, under auspices of the Oregon State Trapshooting Association, will open on Friday and will run through Sunday. A program of 650 registered targets is offered in 16-yard singles and doubles and in handicap events.

A good number of the shooters will be on hand Thursday. There will be no registered events that day but the clubhouse will open at 1 p.m. for registration. Traps will be available for practice.

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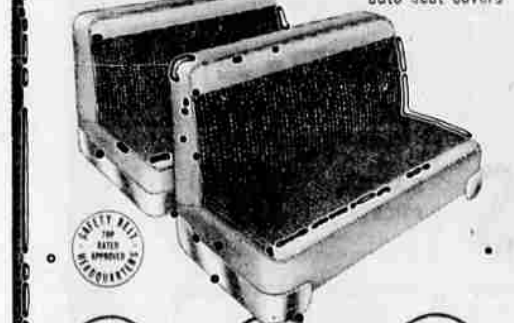

Brundage Warns U.S. On 'Mixing'

Moscow (UPI)—The United States was warned Saturday that it would lose out on future international events if it continued to mix politics and sports.

Presenting the threat from this Russian capital was an American—Avery Brundage of Chicago, president of the International Olympic committee.

"The only object of the Olympic movement is to build international good will," Brundage said Friday. "We don't propose to let governments use sports as a political weapon or political tool. That is our view on this question and it is a very important one."

Brundage, in Moscow awaiting the opening of the 25th annual meeting of the IOC next week, said the problem of "political interference in sports" would be one of the main topics at the conference.

He pinpointed as examples of political interference the failure of East German teams to get visas to compete in the international ski championships at Chamrousse, France, and the international ice hockey championships at Colorado Springs, Colo., last winter.

Brundage said that any country, including the U.S., which refused to recognize all eligible contestants would not be permitted to host the Olympic Games.

"We've gone a step further," Brundage added. "We have asked the International Athletic federations to adopt a similar policy. I think you'll find that they'll do it."

"In the case of the United States, it means that if the country wants international sporting meetings, it will have to permit everyone to come in."

Brundage said that sports could exist outside of political barriers, and gave as an example the German situation.

"The politicians have been trying to put Germany together for 15 years," he said, "and we've had a united East and West German team for the last four Olympics."

All Corners Meets Eugene will continue its all-corners track action with July and August competition with Bowerman and Newland as directors, according to information which appears to come from Newland. Meets for amateurs have been scheduled July 13-14, July 20-21, July 27-28, Aug. 3-4 and Aug. 10-11. High school boys and girls and open competitors will contend on Friday evenings beginning at 5:30 p.m. and the younger boys and girls will compete from 10 a.m. to noon on Saturdays. Eugene is on daylight time. August 10-11 meets are all-corners championships.

NO PAUSE High school sports competition is over for another school year but there is no pause, no breath-catching moment before summer athletic activities in this area. Softball play—Jackson County, North West Women's and church leagues and independent—is in full swing and American Legion junior baseball is underway. A state trapshoot is due here in a week and it won't be long before the city recreation program for boys and girls will be underway.

One program which will not be conducted this summer by city or school district here is track and field. The all-corners meets, which have proved popular in three past summers, are not being held here because of grandstand construction at the high school stadium. There are reports, however, that some meets might be arranged at Southern Oregon college.

WON'T BE MISSED LONG There reportedly were quite a few aches and pains, and perhaps a few tears were shed, when the old west side grandstand at the high school field was razed. We don't think it will be missed long, however, after the new and bigger stand is built.

CLEAN OUT FILE Spring end of the school year is a busy one, sports-wise. There's both the demand for space and the lack of space, newspaperwise, along with this busy period. Quite a few things get pushed back or filed for later use. We'll try to clean out the file a bit.

COUPLE AT ASHLAND Dick Cople, ex-Medford high athlete who went on to play football at Washington State University, will join the Ashland Junior High school faculty next year as a teacher and coach.

PUNTS FOR MEXICANS Dick Brundage, ex-Medford high, got off a punt which traveled 73 yards, to set up the first touchdown for Stanford University in its spring practice football game with the Indian alumni. Skip Face of the alumni fumbled on the four-yard line and a varsity man recovered the ball.

Ragsdale did the punting through the game for the Indians, however, was Phil Humphreys, another ex-Medfordite, who worked at left halfback in spring workouts. He tore a ligament in practice and underwent surgery. Stanford coaches are counting on Phil for next fall.

McINTYRE PLEASES Plans of Payton Jordan, head track coach, and Jim Terrill, assistant coach, at Stanford, are to work Bob McIntyre, ex-Medford high, at the 220, 440 and 880-yard distances for varsity competition. Bob was a co-captain of the freshman cinder team this spring. The two coaches were reported pleased with Bob's competitive attitude and expect him to be a help to the varsity.

McIntyre showed outstanding ability early in the season before being sidelined by a leg injury. He turned in a 48.7 quarter-mile, .5 of a second off the Indian freshman record of 48.2 set by the great Ben Eastman in 1930.

The pulled muscle kept Bob out of action almost four weeks. He then was timed in 51.1 in a meet. On May 5 he ran a 49.0 quarter.

HIGH ON FUNSTON We learned at state track meet that Oregon State University coaches are high on the football playing ability of tackle Jim Funston, ex-Medford high, and have fine hopes for his younger brother, Al. Lowell Dean, also ex-Medford, acquitted himself well playing tackle for the University of Oregon Ducks in their alumni game, according to a Mail Tribune observer of the contest.

LONG BEAR SEASON Bear hunters of the area—or at least one of them—were disturbed by the United Press International report on the tentative hunting regulations as drawn up by the state game commission. The story indicated a hunting season of 15 days for bear when a much longer one had been worked for.

A news release received later direct from the commission said that the group classified the bear to be game animal in all national forest areas between Highway 97 and 101, and within one mile of the Rogue river between Oregon and California. Open season would be Sept. 1 through Dec. 15.

The foregoing would be a 3½-month season.

HOCH SETS MARKS Feats of George Koch, ex-Medford high, in sweeping blue ribbons in the broad jump, high jump and javelin meets against Lewis and Clark college, Seattle Pacific college and University of Idaho, stand as the top effort by a University of Portland track man this year. Koch was one of three Medford area athletes whom Pilot Coach Tom O'Connor used to good advantage.

The others were Roger Hout and Dick Evans, ex-St. Mary's high. Hout had a hand in setting of Pilot mile and 440-yard relay standards. He had a best winning 100-yard dash of 10.3 and a top 220-yard time of 22.4. Evans displayed promise in the javelin and high jump. He won the novice high jump in the Willamette relays at 6 feet 4½ inch and later cleared 6-3.

Koch set school marks of 23-3½ in broad jump and 6-3½ in the high jump. The broad jump was a Washington State indoor meet record. He topped the squad in total points for the season with 100½.

BETTER THAN MEN'S When Sandy Ekerson, Medford, won the women's division of the Ray Schwartz Memorial stamion this spring at Heavenly Valley, near State-line, Calif., her time was almost four seconds faster than that of the top men's skier. She had a time of 21.3 for the 17-gate one-arm event.

In NCAA Baseball Colorado State Tops Air Force Academy

Greeley, Colo. — UP Colorado State college pushed across two runs in the 11th inning Saturday to defeat the Air Force Academy, 6-5, for the NCAA District 7 baseball championship and its 13th berth in the College World Series.

The loss was a heartbreaker for the Falcons, who suffered their only previous loss in the double elimination tournament to defending champion CSC in the first round Friday and snapped back to eliminate Brigham Young University and New Mexico.

The championship game was tied, 4-4, after nine innings, then was interrupted for 30 minutes by a rainstorm. After a scoreless 10th, the Falcons took the lead in the 11th when Bear shortstop Al Suydam fumbled Willie Parma's grounder and let Darrel Bloodworth score from second.

In the bottom of the 11th, Joe Bonacquist walked and scored on Gary Harper's triple to right centerfield. Kim Spence brought Harper home with a single lashed into the hole between short and third.

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Speedy Cars, Large Field in Drag Races

One of the largest contest-turrounds ever for a local drag race is expected this coming week end, June 9-10, for the annual Spring Championship event. All action will take place at the Southern Oregon Timing association drag strip at White City.

Some 300 entries are foreseen with many in the faster competition classes. Twenty-five or more machines are billed for the dragster classes alone. Several of these sleek 'rails' will be running speeds as high as 160-170 miles per hour.

Gas dragster division will be headed by three of Pacific coast area's fastest cars, from Vancouver, Wash., will come the Skeans-Pickering record-holding A-modified roadster. Driver Dave Skeans drove this Chevrolet-powered entry to a class win at last year's National Championship races at Indianapolis. Skeans also holds the national record for this class.

Shoeborn Returns Making a return engagement from Reno, Nev., will be the 'Shoeborn' acceleration machine which features a rear-mounted engine. Owners Bill Butler and Warren Welsh have rebuilt this famous speedster and have installed a new engine for the Medford meet. They currently hold class records at many California drag strips and they have the low elapsed time

mark for a gas-powered run here.

Appearing from Sacramento, Calif., will be the famous Glass Slipper operated by the team of Ed Cortopassi and Doug Butler. They, like the Shoeborn team, are one of the area's outstanding contenders in the sport. The Slipper is well remembered for past performances on the Medford track.

Other dragster entries include Peterson and Frost, Portland; Keith and Williamson, Santa Clara; Rodgers and Madrug, Milpitas; Chaves and Harvey, Santa Clara; Jerry Olsen, Redding; Smith and Grimm, Vancouver; and Loan-Burnham-Robinson, Redding.

Drivers will be gunning for some \$1,000 in cash prizes put up by SOTA along with trophies and special awards.

Competition will be conducted in both the gas and fuel divisions. A fuel dragster entry from Vancouver is expected to threaten the present strip fuel record of 176.10 miles per hour.

Gates are scheduled to open at 10 a.m. on Saturday for timed runs. Grudge races for street class cars will be held at 4 p.m. on Saturday with special prizes for the winners.

Sunday action will get under way at 7 a.m. Deadline for stock car entries is 9 a.m. on Sunday and stock car eliminations will begin at 10:30 a.m. Elimination runs for other classes will begin later.

Various drivers will compete in a special powerpuff class of several classes.

All entries will undergo a strict safety inspection before being allowed to compete. All entries will be required to have safety belts.

The SOTA drag strip is located seven miles north of Medford and the Crater Lake highway in West White City.

Duck Swaff Toga Won By Mosler

University of Oregon, Eugene — Sophomore first baseman Sandy Nosler and senior right-hander Son Swanson garnered hitting and pitching championships of Oregon's baseball team for the 1962 season.

The Webfoots concluded the season last week-end by sweeping a pair of games from Oregon State to earn a second place finish in Northern Division standings and run their overall season record to 29-9-1.

Nosler, a hometown hero from South Eugene High school, paced the Webfoots at the plate with a .330 percentage. He was followed in the hit parade by second baseman Dave Moore (.326), center fielder Cal Dean (.312), and shortstop Leon Hayes (.308).

Hayes, a senior from Cottage Grove, was the team leader in runs batted in with 33. Moore was next in line with 26 and outfielder Trev Swangard plated 25 mates.

Swanson led the Ducks in pitching with a 5-0 record and a nifty 1.26 earned run average. Sophomore Robbie Snow was 4-1 for the year with a 1.35 ERA and senior Bob Christiansen was 8-3 with a 1.71 earned run average.

The Ducks lose eight seniors off this year's team including pitchers Christiansen, Swanson, and Dick Brede, catcher and captain Ray Haroldson, infielders Moore and Hayes, and outfielders Swangard and Jim Cloutier.

Dallas-Ft. Worth Snaps Omaha Streak in AA Play

United Press International Dallas—Ft. Worth snapped a six-game Omaha winning streak Friday night, 7-6, costing the heretofore artful Dodgers a chance for a first-place tie with Indianapolis, the American association leader.

The Indians lost to visiting Denver, 10-3, but remained a game ahead of Omaha, Rain postponed Louisville's contest at Oklahoma City.

The Rangers jumped on Omaha hurler Bernon Wheeler for five runs in the first two innings. The losers tallied once in the opening frame, then cut their deficit to 5-3 on Mike Brunley's two-run homer in the third. But Dallas-Ft. Worth counted two more in the fourth and held Omaha in check the rest of the way.

Dave Baldwin, the second of four Ranger pitchers, got credit for the win. The loss went to Wheeler, whose teammates committed five errors.

Denver, which collected 14 hits off four Indianapolis pitchers, led only 2-0 after six innings. But they opened the flood gates in the next two frames, scoring eight runs, including a solo homer by Jim Baumer. The victory went to starter Gordon Seyfried, who scattered ten hits while going the distance.

Dallas-Ft. Worth played at Omaha again Saturday, Denver was at Indianapolis and Louisville visited Oklahoma City.

Ring Magazine Drops Robinson

New York (UPI)—Sugar Ray Robinson, former middleweight and welterweight champion, was dropped from The Ring magazine's top-10 ratings today because of inactivity.

Except for nearly two years of retirement from December, 1952, to October, 1954, it is the first time since Sugar Ray became prominent in 1941 that he was not ranked among the top 10 welterweights or middleweights by The Ring.

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Harrington Upsets Chas. Scott

New York (UPI)—Stan Harrington, Honolulu welterweight, recovered from a fifth-round knockdown Saturday night and hammered out an upset split 10-round decision over Charley Scott of Philadelphia in their television fight at Madison Square Garden.

Twenty-eight-year-old Harrington, floored for the first time in his career, barely regained his feet at the count of 10 but rallied quickly and was throwing punches at Scott in the Philadelphia's corner after the bell ended the fifth round.

Harrington, weighing 148½ pounds to Scott's 148, won the votes of the referee and one of the judges on a rounds basis. Referee Barney Felix favored the rangy Hawaiian, 54-1, and Judge Bill Recht agreed, 62-2. However, Judge Tony Rossi had Scott ahead, 54-1.

United Press International had Harrington winning, 5-3-2. And a poll of 11 sports writers at ringside favored Harrington, 10-1.

It was a heartening triumph for Harrington, father of six, because in his only previous fight outside of Honolulu—in the same garden on Jan. 7, 1960—he lost a decision to Mexican Gaspar Ortega.

He thought the verdict that night was unjust. And a press poll supported his contention 9-1.

Accordingly, Harrington was reluctant to accept last night's fight as a substitute for Jorge Fernandez of Argentina, who had to remain in Buenos Aires because of his illing wife. Matchmaker Teddy Brenner finally convinced Stan he would get a square deal in New York this time.

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Home Hitting Bugs Gentile

Baltimore (UPI)—First baseman Jim Gentile of the Baltimore Orioles is "conceding" the American league home run crown despite the fact he's leading the circuit with 15.

"I won't win the homer title," said Gentile, who belted 46 last season and is regarded by most experts as a good bet to hit 50 or more this year. "I've just got too many factors going against me."

"By the time we complete this home stand in Baltimore next week," he said, "others will have caught up with me. I don't get many here in Baltimore."

Gentile hit 16 of his 46 at Memorial Stadium in 1961, and 13 of this season's 15 have been on the road.

"What's really got me bugged at Memorial Stadium this season is my batting average," Gentile says. "I know I'm going to get less home runs here because of distant fences but I never had trouble getting my share of hits here."

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
