Five Rogue Valley Girl Scouts Will Attend Meet

Five Girl Scouts of the Rogue Valley Girl Scout council will travel to Salem later this month to attend a citizenship conference of the Santiam Girl Scout council of Region 11. About 100 girls from Montana, Oregon, Washington and Idaho will attend.

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The Girl Scouts at the meeting will range from 13 to 17 years old and will be housed in Baxter hall dormitory during their week long stay.

As preparation for the conference, delegates have been participating in projects dealing in government on a local level in their own communities. During the conference they will report on their progress in addition to learning how city, county, and state governments function and work together to achieve unity of purpose. They will hear lectures by noted speakers and make tours of the capitol building, the supreme court and state hospital.

Recreation facilities will include swimming, tennis and other organized sports. Firesides in the evenings will provide time for relaxation and informal discussions. A special feature will be a tour to historic Champoug State park when delegates will have as their guests Boy Scouts of the Cascade area council in Salem.

Provisional Unit of Oregon LWV Formed In Ashland

Ashland—Organization of a provisional unit of the Oregon League of Women Voters was completed Thursday evening when 40 Ashland women met in the Gresham lecture room of the public library. Mrs. Roy Neal, who has been serving as temporary chairman during several weeks of preliminary planning, conducted the session.

Present to assist in the Ashland unit formation was Mrs. Frank Anderson, Eugene, a member of the state board, who will serve as advisor until the unit qualifies for full membership. During the provisional period study of local government and state and national issues will be stressed.

At the meeting in the library Miss Florence Lusted and Mrs. John Wenker presented an outline of their research into the background of Ashland and of its current status. This initial study will be the basis for one of the year's requirements, "Know Your Town Government." Material and sources of information will be compiled and

used in a comprehensive brochure which will be available to the public.

Study Divisions
Mrs. Donald Moore presented a brief analysis of the various study divisions suggested for the first year. According to Mrs. Moore, there are four from which to choose. On the state level are revision of the state United Nations and the U.S. foreign policy are the two subjects listed.

"Members of the league are not out to make judgments but to learn facts," said Mrs. Moore, a statement emphasized by the state board advisor when she spoke informally

during the discussion of the by-laws.

Mrs. Julian Baittle presented the report of the by-laws committee and after explanation and discussion it was accepted and the by-laws for the provisional unit were adopted. The year's budget as presented by Mrs. Harry Hawk was accepted as read.

The organization is non-partisan and is for the purpose of promoting political responsibility through informed and active participation in government at all levels. 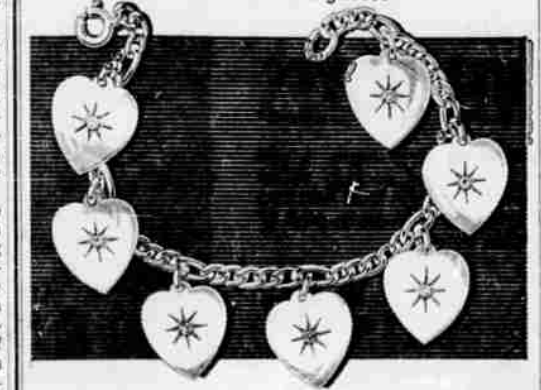
