Member of Stamp Club Wins Awards at Show

Miss Spence Receives Scholarship

Miss Marcia Lou Spence, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wendell S. Spence, 118 Medford Heights, Medford, has been awarded the \$200 scholarship given annually by the Woman's auxiliary to the Jackson County Medical society to an outstanding girl who is studying for a career in nursing.

The scholarship is granted to the applicant whose character, personality, and interest in a nursing career equal her scholastic ability, the auxiliary notes. The money is sent to the school of her choice, to be applied to her expenses.

Miss Spence will enter her senior year at the University of Oregon School of Nursing this month. She expects to complete the five year course in June, 1963, and at that time will receive a bachelor of science degree in nursing and a public health certificate. After she receives her degree, she must take the state board examinations to become licensed as a registered nurse.

Miss Spence was graduated from Medford Senior High school in 1958, and attended Oregon State university at Corvallis for two years, majoring in pre-nursing. While at OSU, she participated in numerous campus activities, among them Lamplighters, the pre-nursing organization, which she served as president.

She transferred to the University of Oregon School of Nursing in Portland in the fall of 1960 to begin her clinical practice.

At nursing school, she has maintained excellent grades, and has been active in extra-curricular activities, the auxiliary reports. She was president of her class during her sophomore year, and was recently initiated into Alpha Tau Delta, the national professional nursing honor society.

New York—One way to measure current fashions is to sit in garment manufacturers' showrooms for several days during previews of new collections. These sessions are the ones where buyers and fashion reporters on duty, and models between assignments, accurately reflect what ranks as "in" and "out" of style.

For two weeks the Seventh Avenue skyscraper showrooms of the pace-setting New York manufacturers have been packed with these fashion authorities, as they watched what the industry planned for fall and winter 1962.

We've been there too, at first wearing starched white shorty cotton gloves — standard with us as a summertime accessory. Not any more, though. If it's to be a shorty glove, it has to be kid. Kid is in, and from wrist length to elbow, in black or white, it's the accessory worn even with summer weight suits and dresses.

Ribbons in Hair

In too are bows of ribbon in the hair, worn at the sides or in the back, and reflecting the influence of the Kennedy women in Washington on styles nationally. Out are the hat veils as a summertime head cover. Most of the women in the showrooms are bare-headed otherwise.

In the low, 1 1/4-inch stacked leather heel on black patent pumps. Out are the black patents with 3-inch heels.

In, with buyers and models, are the huge satchel carryalls as the daily handbag. These often measure 20 by 20 inches, with every inch occupied — in the case of buyers, with notebooks, in the case of the models, with changes of makeup and accessories.

In are the short skirts, even

to the knees on some females who should provide a little more coverage in this area. In are the neutral-colored stockings. Out, all those color-toned to fit the costume, although the hosiery industry continues its promotion to match the stocking to the costume.

Eye Makeup Varies

In, with the models on duty — heavy eye makeup including eyeshadow all over the lid and false eyelashes an inch long. Out, with the buyers, any extremes in makeup. Eyeliner usage is rare, and there is little except mascara and eyebrow pencil showing for daytime.

In are the brunettes in the modelling world. Down in numbers, but not out, are the blonds.

In, in color scheme, is the monochromatic beige in dress, shoes, and handbag. Out, the spring basic of navy.

In, the "little" nothing — black crepe or linen dress for daytime — sleeveless, spare of silhouette, belted with a narrow rope of self-fabric. Out, for city wear, the shirtwaister dress with its full skirt.

In, and apt never to go out, the greeting between buyers and manufacturers of the "hello, darling" and kiss on the cheeks.

Out — the handshake.
