

John Day Diking Reports Squelched

Umatilla, Ore. —(UPI)—Mayor Roy Attebury Sunday scotched reports that Army Engineers have informed residents to be concerned immediately with diking or home and business relocation because of backwater from John Day dam, which is under construction.

Attebury said townspeople still have a year or more to decide what they want to do. He said the rumors apparently developed from a recent meeting of engineers and the City Council at which the situation was discussed.

Weyerhaeuser To Close N. Y. Plant

Rochester, N.Y. —(UPI)—The Weyerhaeuser Co. of Tacoma, Wash., announced Saturday it would shut down its box-board and folding carton division plant here in a move that will idle 220 workers.

The closure was blamed on large losses sustained over a period of years at the 67-year-old plant that has been strike-bound since May 1.

Another Weyerhaeuser unit here, the shipping containers division, also has been affected by the strike, but company officials said it will continue to operate.
