**Food Fats Use Sets Record for Marketing Period**

Agriculture Department said Tuesday the supply, domestic use, and export of food fats reached record proportions the first half of the 1961-62 marketing year.

Prospects for the second half — March to October — are for normal seasonal declines in output and domestic use, but a continuing strong demand for exports, the department said in a review of the fats and oils situation.

**6 Per Cent Greater**

Production of food fats during October, 1961, to March, 1962, was 6 per cent greater than the year-earlier record. The gain mainly reflected increases in soybean oil, butter, and lard. Although output in the second half of the season will decline seasonally, it is expected to remain well above last year. Stocks of food fats on April 1 were 38 per cent higher than on the same date last year, reflecting heavy inventories of soybean oil and butter.

Domestic use of food fats during the first half of this marketing year was a record, more than 3 per cent above that of a year ago. Growth in population largely accounted for the rise as consumption per person was about the same as the previous year. Slight increases in the use of salad and cooking oils and direct lard per person about offset reductions in butter, margarine, and shortening.

**Two Billion Pounds**

Exports of food fats in October-March totaled two billion pounds, 9 per cent above a year before. Increased shipments of soybeans and edible vegetable oils (cottonseed and soybean) more than offset a decline in lard. Exports during the second half of the marketing year are expected to total about 2.3 billion pounds. The record total of exports of 4.3 billion pounds expected for the entire marketing year compares with 3.2 billion pounds last year.

**2,500 Students To Take Part in Campus Activities**

Corvallis—More than 2,500 junior and senior high school students from Oregon and throughout the nation, will participate in five special youth training programs at Oregon State university this month.

The 47th annual 4-H Club Summer school, June 11 to 15, will draw nearly 1,000 Oregon boys and girls between 13 and 15 years old. Training will cover all fields of home economics, agriculture, forestry, health, and related subjects. The Oregon 4-H Summer school is one of the largest in the U.S.

Approximately 500 high school junior and senior boys will attend Beaver Boys state Jun 10 to 16. The annual citizenship training program is sponsored by the American Legion.

**Junior Engineers**

Nearly 170 high school boys from the Northwest have been picked for the Junior Engineers and Scientists Summer Institute June 11 to 24. It includes training in all phases of science and engineering and is designed to give top students an insight into study requirements and career opportunities in the two fields. Started at OSU, JESSI now has spread nationwide.

OSU will offer two summer science training programs for high-ability high school boys starting June 25. Both are sponsored by the National Science Foundation.

One will be a seven-week mathematics training program for 55 selected boys from 20 states. The other will be a six-week program in Earth and Space Science. Twenty-five top boys will be chosen for it. Boys named to both institutes will receive study grants covering most of their expenses from National Science Foundation.

**Migratory Labor Official To Speak**

Salem — James F. Short, chairman of the Oregon Interagency Migratory Labor committee, has announced that John Walsh, executive director of the President's Committee on Migratory Labor, Washington, D. C., will speak to the Oregon committee meeting in Room 202 of the Labor and Industries building here Tuesday, June 12, at 9:30 a.m. (PST).

Walsh will be accompanied by Joseph Beeson, Seattle, regional farm placement representative for the bureau of employment security. He will speak on national policies and programs affecting migratory labor, the Oregon committee chairman said. All interested parties are invited to hear Walsh's talk, Short said.
