

Destroyer Coming Back To Portland

Portland — (UPI) — The destroyer escort USS McGinty is coming home after being gone nearly a year.

Lt. Cmdr. J. E. Kearney, commander of the local Naval and Marine Corps Reserve Training Center, said the ship was expected to return July 17.

It left Portland last October for a tour of active duty with the Seventh Fleet in the Far East. Most of the crewmembers aboard the ship are from Portland. The vessel was activated last fall.

Capehart Favors Prompt American Invasion of Cuba

Washington — (UPI) — Sen. Homer Capehart (R-Ind.) has called for a military invasion of Cuba "right now" by U. S. forces to drive out Fidel Castro's Communist regime.

"I think you have to do it," Capehart declared.

"It doesn't make any sense to send troops 10,000 miles away" to Thailand and not send them into Cuba only 90 miles off U. S. shores, he said.

Long Advocated

The Indiana Republican, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations committee and its Latin American subcommittee, has advocated U. S. intervention in Cuba since Castro's government clearly emerged as a Communist regime.

Capehart said he felt President Kennedy had no choice but to send forces to Thailand in light of the crisis in neighboring Laos. But he said action against Cuba was even more important.

"I'd invade right now," Capehart said. "I'd make the effort and succeed," unlike an ill-fated invasion attempt by Cuban exiles last year.

With Own People

Asked if he thought Cuban expatriates in this country should be used for the invasion force, Capehart said, "I'd go in with our own people."

Capehart said he saw no hope of the West saving Laos, even if a neutral government were established there.

"I think Laos has been lost to the free world for two or three years," he said.

But forces should be maintained in Thailand, he said, as part of the U. S. commitment under the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization (SEATO) agreement.

WAR HERO RECOVERS

"I am told a new telephone directory is being prepared. I hope this will put a stop to this business."

Portland — (UPI) — Portland radio and television personality Robert A. McNulty Wednesday was sentenced to three months in Federal prison for failing to file tax returns.

McNulty, 38, pleaded guilty of failing to file tax returns during a three-year period.

Federal Judge Gus J. Solomon set the sentence despite pleas for leniency by McNulty's attorneys.

Judge Solomon scheduled the sentence to begin in two weeks.

Halt Rejection Of Scriptures, Garham Warns

Chicago — (UPI) — Evangelist Billy Graham urged mankind Wednesday night to halt its rejection of the Scriptures because it is either "back to the Bible or back to the jungle."

In holding his longest service since his crusade here, the evangelist told a crowd estimated at 29,000 as he held out a Bible. "I used to say this was the world's best seller. Up to a few years ago it was. Now the writings of Lenin are the world's best seller."

Continuously holding up his leather-bound Bible for all to see, Graham warned that the world would experience anarchy and savagery such as it has never known if the Bible were allowed to be defiled by its critics.

"There is in America," he said, "a movement designed to take away our traditional concept of God, to take the Bible out of our national life. If this movement succeeds, then 'In God We Trust' will be removed from our coins, future presidents will be sworn with their hands upon the Constitution and chaplains will disappear from the Congress and armed forces."

Graham invited the audience at the McCormick Place Convention Hall to make "decisions for Christ." About 391 persons answered his plea.

The service marked the half way point of Graham's three-week crusade that ends with an afternoon rally in Soldier Field.

Chest List Is Given

Chicago — (UPI) — How well stocked is your medicine chest? Probably not well enough to handle minor emergencies, says the American Medical Association.

Here's a list of suggested items: aspirin; calamine lotion for minor skin irritations and insect bites; a cough syrup with no habit-forming drugs; petrolatum for chapped skin, burns, cuts and bruises; adhesive bandages and tape; roll bandages and sterile gauze pads; an oral thermometer plus a rectal one for small children; a bulk or mild saline laxative; epsom salts and rubbing alcohol; an antiseptic for wounds and cuts that soap and water won't clean.
