

COLLINS, ELLIOTT, LEONARD SATURDAY'S VICTORS IN PITA OREGON TRAP TOURNEY HERE

Charles Collins, Roseburg, and Arlo Elliott, Portland, annexed state championships yesterday in the Pacific International Trapshooting association's annual Oregon shoot here. Jack Leonard, McMinnville, won the Jim Morris Memorial Handicap and was runner-up to Collins and Elliott for state crowns.

Collins, who cracked 100 straight yesterday at Medford Gun club to gain a two-day total of 196 at 16-yards, weathered a five-way shootout to claim the singles mantle. Elliott nicked Leonard 94 out of 100 to 93 for the state doubles diadem. Leonard's 98 beat a second place 97 by Doug Smith, Reno, Nev. in the handicap.

The tournament will conclude today with the Oregon State Handicap starting at 10 a.m.

Knotting with Collins at 198 in the Friday and Saturday 16-yard competition were Leonard, Gordon Miller, Drain, Frank Simpson, Cornelius, and John Simpson, Portland. Collins split 75 straight in the extra and Leonard, McMinnville, downed 74 for runner-up. Miller fell out with 24 and John Simpson with 23 on the first 25 in the shootoff. Frank Simpson

bowed out with 23 on the second 25.

Richard Hornby, Vancouver, B.C., also chalked up a 196 in singles. He took the out-of-state trophy and was not eligible for an Oregon state crown.

The handicap saw Chuck Skeeters, 13-year-old Medford gunner, win a shootoff for third place. He and Gordon Gilkeson, Hood River, each clipped 96 in the regular. Skeeters won the extra 24 to 23.

Harvey Fisher, Portland, was professional winner in the singles with 196 and J. W. Kennedy, Portland, was second pro with 189. High lady was Miss Janet Hurd, Eugene, with 189. She was trailed by Mrs. Corrine Blake, Portland, who had 183.

High shooter 65-70 years of age was John Hurd, Eugene, with 190. W. H. Blake, Portland, broke 193 for the over 70 years of age trophy. Mike Park, Estacada, was high junior Saturday with 94 and Michael Yunker, Forest Grove, runnerup with 92. Skeeters took subjunior with 80 and Mike Drake, Gold Hill, followed with 88.

George Sherwood, Roseburg, and John Simpson, tied for Class A honors in doubles with 90 out of 100 each. Mil-

ler and Collins knotted with 92s in Class A. Shootoffs are scheduled today for class winner and runner-up awards.

Pete Schmitz Jr., Eugene, took Class C doubles with a 91. Jack Roberts, Portland, was runnerup by default. He broke 88 birds along with Bill Bryant, Ashland, and M. L. Hunt, Bend, Class D trophy went to Al Baker, Eugene, with an 88-bird count. George Voytilla, Winston, was next with 85.

Hornby was high man from out-of-state with 92.

There were 135 participants in Saturday 16-yard shooting and 148 in the handicap. Seventy-three scattergunners entered the doubles.

John Lichtenstern, Klamath Falls, was the only shooter other than Collins to break 100 straight on Saturday.

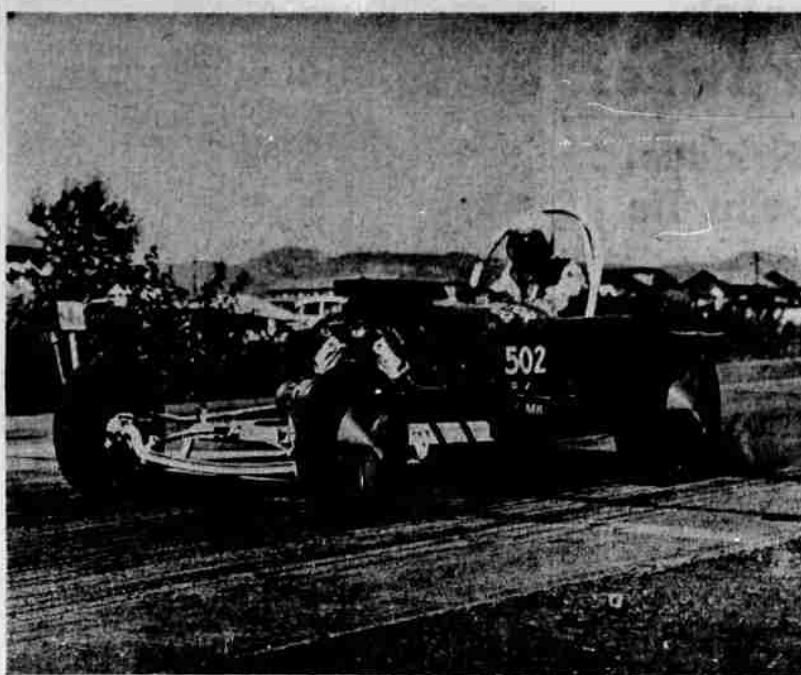
High Scorers

In the handicap yesterday seven entrants trailed the top four with 94s. They were Schmitz, Clogston, Miller, Jimmy Hunter Jr., Reno; John Syme, Hood River; Ken Gilkeson, Roseburg, and A. E. Mansfield, Ashland.

Irwin Crume, Sprague River, was among top double shooters with a 90.

Ballew and Patton were re-elected. Officers of the board were to be named today. Colpitts Sets Oregon State Fresh Record

Corvallis, Ore. — (UPI) — Ian Colpitts set an Oregon State freshman record for the 880-yard run at an all-comers track meet here Saturday.

Colpitts, 135-pounder from Santa Monica, Calif., won the event in 1:51.0. Jay Hill of Portland State finished second in 1:59.2.

Two-time Oregon High school class A-1 high hurdles champion Marcial Hunter of Corvallis defeated Oregon State's Frank Marsh and Steve Paul in a special 120-yard hurdles race.

Hunter ran the high school hurdles while the other two had to clear the college hurdles, which are three inches higher. All three were clocked in 14.3 seconds.

Six Oregon State runners failed in an attempt to qualify for events in the NCAA meet at Eugene next weekend.

They were Marsh in the 440-yard intermediate hurdles, Lynn Eves and Tom Boswell in the 100-yard dash.

Gary Comer and John Ball in the 440-yard dash and Cliff Thomson in the steeplechase. Eves and Marsh previously qualified in other events.
