250 Girls Attend During Girls' State June 11 to June 17, 250 girls from all over Oregon will constitute a mythical state for one week. They will assume duties of citizens by electing officials and setting up their own city, county and state governments.

Part of the session will be held in the state capitol building. Inauguration of the newly elected governor will be held in the house of representatives Thursday, June 14, at 1:30 p.m. Gov. Mark O. Hatfield will be guest speaker.

Senators and representatives will hold legislative sessions in the house and senate where they will introduce, debate and pass bills. They will visit the Supreme Court where the duties and functions will be explained.

The 1961 governor, Miss JoAnn Johnson, Medford, will preside until her successor is elected. Two girls will be selected to attend Girls' Nation in Washington, D.C.

Final program at Girls' State will be the candlelight service to be held in the rotunda at the capitol Saturday at 9 p.m.

Two of these will journey on to Washington, D.C., to take part in Boys' Nation.

Speakers participating in the sessions will be Leroy Skousen, former FBI agent and now Portland attorney, who will talk on the threats of Communism; Thomas Meier, Air Force Academy cadet from Oregon to talk on academy life; George Shaw, former University of Oregon All-American football star and professional quarterback; Holly Holcomb, deputy superintendent of the Oregon State police; and C. E. (Pat) Emmons, Albany, judge advocate of the American Legion, who will lead a seminar on law.

After the judging at Prineville, the boys went to The Dalles for the junior livestock judging contest. The livestock judging team at The Dalles consisted of Steve Hall, Alan Bray and Terry Bezoff. Crater placed eighth out of 21 chapters participating in the contest.

Medford Council Declines to Accept Lighting Cost Proposal

The Medford city council Thursday declined to accept a state highway department proposal that the city of Medford pay for the annual cost of lighting the two freeway interchanges at the north and south ends of the city.

By a 4 to 3 vote, the council overruled a recommendation of the administration that the highway department's request be accepted. Annual cost of the lighting would have amounted to about \$960, City Manager Robert Duff said.

Duff pointed out, in support of the administration's recommendation, that Portland and Eugene both pay the cost of lighting highway interchanges within their city limits.

Primarily Local Traffic The city manager further explained that he felt the request was reasonable since the interchanges would be used primarily by local traffic.

He recommended against another highway department request that the city accept the cost of lighting the freeway section of the freeway.

At the end of the vote, Mayor John W. Snider told the council he felt the matter "will come up again."

In other action, the council voted to refer a request by The Cellar, Main and Bartlett sts., for a permit to hold public dances on the premises.

The decision to defer the matter came after City Attorney William Mansfield told the council a city ordinance provides that any person under 16 years of age at a public dance must be accompanied by at least one parent or guardian.

Jesse Torres, co-owner of the Cellar, appeared before the council to speak in behalf of his request.

A public hearing was held and bids were called for on a proposal to pave Velia st. from Johnson st. to Morrow rd. A petition carrying signatures of 56 per cent of the property owners involved is on file with the public works department indicating support of the improvement.

The council also voted to accept a completed water main project installed by W. H. Conrad Construction company on Oak, Taft and Narregan sts. from McAndrews rd. to Clark st.

A temporary sidewalk permit issued to Developers Inc., in connection with the construction of Alpine Village, was revoked by vote of the council.

The council approved the erection of a "Yield" sign at Sixth and Main sts., but deferred action on a report concerning the possible installation of stop signs at Siskiyou blvd. and Madoc ave.

Councilman Fred Robinson was absent. The meeting was presided over by Mayor John Snider. The next regular council meeting will be held Thursday, June 21, at 7:30 p.m.
