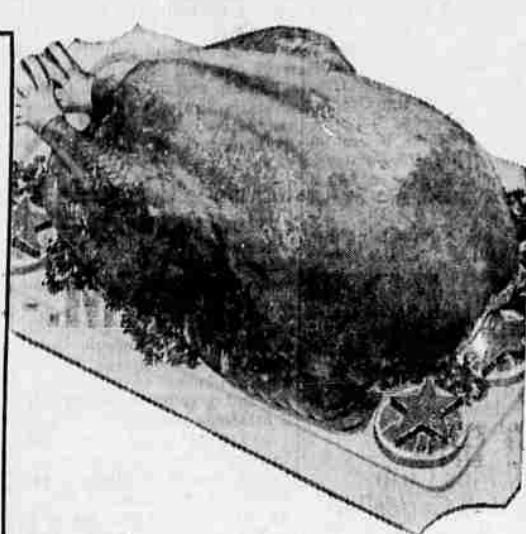

Committee Reports Given at Chamber Directors Meeting

"People don't go on vacations to save money," according to John Pletsch, chairman of the Medford Chamber of Commerce tourist committee. Pletsch reported on activities of the committee at a recent board meeting. Other reports were received from Ken Cook of the aviation committee and Wally Brill of the highway committee.

In his report, Pletsch pleaded for greater public understanding of the importance of the "tourist" to the local economy. He said that for the past six months of each year—eight hours a day—our committee and the community should work on this subject 12 months each year—24 hours a day.

"Instead of working hard for six months of each year—eight hours a day—our committee and the community should work on this subject 12 months each year—24 hours a day," he continued. The assets of "tourism" are a part of the community's life.

Cook, reporting for the aviation committee, said that the committee included 13 members and was working on a questionnaire to send to chamber members and local businessmen to determine preferred schedules.

Brill reported for the highway committee, and expressed the committee's concern about traffic congestion near Lorier and Ross lanes has increased recently. Nearby markets and shopping centers, increased parking and home building and the separation of Lorier and Ross lanes were blamed for the congestion.

Suggestions made by the committee included (1) contacting the county court and suggesting the purchase of a new intersection at Lorier and Ross lanes, (2) discussing with the highway commission the extension of Eighth St. past the market area so westbound traffic could continue on West Main St. while inbound traffic could be routed on Eighth St. through the congested area.
