COLOMBIA PRESIDENT TO VISIT U.S.
Bogota, Colombia—UPI—President-elect Guillermo L. Valencia will leave next Wednesday for the United States, where he may confer with President Kennedy, it was announced today. Valencia is taking his wife to the United States for medical treatment.

TOURE TO VISIT ETHIOPIA
Addis Ababa, Ethiopia—UPI—Guinea President Sekou Toure will pay an official three-day visit to Ethiopia beginning June 20, according to the foreign office here.

RUSSIA ANNOUNCES NEW AIR ROUTE
London—UPI—The Soviet Union has completed negotiations to set up five new air routes connecting Moscow with the capitals of Ghana, Guinea, Mali, Morocco and the Sudan, according to a dispatch by the Soviet News agency Tass received here yesterday.

RED BANK PRESIDENT ARRIVES FOR TALKS
Sydney, Australia—UPI—A Communist Chinese delegation, headed by Tsao Chu-Su, president of the People's Bank of China, arrived here by plane today for talks with Australian bank officials.

AMERICAN WOMAN WOUNDS AFRICAN
Dar-es-Salaam, Tanganyika—UPI—An American woman hitch-hiking across Tanganyika drew her knife and wounded an African who tried to attack her Tuesday night in the desolate bush country near Mount Kilimanjaro, according to reports reaching here.

Ellen Drake, 27, (hometown unknown), stabbed the African in the arm, the reports said. The incident occurred at Arusha, about 290 miles northwest of here and just west of Kilimanjaro.

Market Has Rally After Opening Dip; Blue Chips Down

New York—UPI—Stocks looked mixed in heavy trading today, showing strong rallying tendencies after an opening dip.

While the general market began showing improvement, centering on the electronic and growth stock groups, some blue chips remained down at least a point—notably Du Pont and American Can.

American Telephone moved up 1 1/2 and IBM gained 9 1/2. Most motors firmed fractionally, oils remained narrow, steels were harder and chemicals erratic. Rails and utilities were little changed after recovering from an initial sinking spell.

Xerox, Litton, Beckman and Polaroid were up more than 2 points. Most foods, metals, tobaccos, finance shares, entertainment issues, building materials, aircrafts and other groups were scrambled with individual issues holding within a point of Wednesday's final levels.

Four Children Die In Alaska Blaze

Juneau, Alaska—UPI—Four brothers and sisters burned to death Wednesday when flames swept through their second floor apartment home in the native section here.

A fifth child fled to safety when the fire broke out in the top floor of the two-story frame house occupied by two families.

The victims, all children of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Church, were Stanley, 6, Rowena, 4, Betty, 3, and John, who would have been one year old Friday.

Another son, Peter Jr., 8, escaped unharmed.

The parents were away from home when the fire started and cause of the blaze was not determined. Firemen said the entire second floor was on fire when they arrived on the scene.

Estes' Testimony May Have Shed Light on Death Probe

Franklin, Tex.—UPI—Billie Sol Estes' testimony before a state grand jury may have shed new light on the mysterious death of federal agriculture official Henry H. Marshall.

Estes, who appeared about two hours Wednesday before the grand jury investigating Marshall's death, invoked the Texas version of the Fifth Amendment a total of between 50 and 100 times, a source said. However, Dist. Atty. Bryan Russ said his testimony opened "new areas" into the investigation.

He would not elaborate on the statement except to say that Estes had been "helpful." Russ said Estes refused to answer "many questions" at a 40-minute morning appearance but cooperated at a 75-minute afternoon session.

Dist. Judge John Barron worked out a compromise for the afternoon session after the grand jury brought legal pressure seeking to force Estes to answer all the questions on which he pleaded possible self-incrimination in the morning.

Russ said that as far as he knows the grand jury, which recessed until 9 a.m. next Monday, will not need any further testimony from Estes. Three or four witnesses will be called next Monday, and Russ indicated some of them might be agriculture officials.

BULGARIA PROBLEMS
Vienna—UPI—In addition to other serious agricultural problems, Bulgaria now is fighting off a fruit famine, fruit bugs and an invasion of the potato bug, according to the Communist party organ Rabotnichesko Delo in Sofia.

Ship Arrivals Form Rose Festival Fleet

Portland—UPI—The Portland Rose Festival fleet—14 ships strong—was completed with the arrival of eight U.S. Navy vessels here Wednesday.

The ships, led by the Amphibious Force flagship USS Estes, joined five other U.S. Navy vessels and a Coast Guard cutter.

Navy officials estimated that the ships brought 2,400 men to the city.

Bar Girl Racket Quiz Continues

Washington—UPI—A stripper and a bar girl told Senate investigators today that some night club owners in Calumet City, Ill., and Miami forced girl entertainers to become prostitutes.

One platinum blonde stripper, Corrine Suzette Stein, said night clubs in both spots treat B-girls "like animals." She told Chairman John L. McClellan of the Senate investigating subcommittee that "It's a sin. I don't care whether it's you or a strip-teaser, or who."

College Graduate
Mrs. Stein supported earlier testimony by Joan Gainsley, a college drama school graduate who became a B-girl. The diminutive 85-pound woman, who took her degree from UCLA, said a Calumet City night club owner sought to force her into prostitution.

Miss Gainsley said the club owner maintained a back room in his establishment for the prostitution operation. It was customary for bar girls, she said, to perform immoral acts in the club to solicit more drinks from customers. According to Mrs. Stein, much the same condition prevailed elsewhere. But at the Clover Club in Miami, she testified, "they (the management) would make the girls sell themselves, but they made them go to hotels. Then they'd take some of the money away from the girls."

The Senate investigation has heard testimony that a \$10 million a year vice syndicate that lures unwed mothers into white slavery has been headquartered in Calumet City.

Conditions in Calumet City were the worst, with Miami clubs a close second, she said. She said the entertainers union, the American Guild of Variety Artists, did nothing although it was supposed to protect its members.

Was Somewhat Broke
She said she was booked into Calumet City's Twenty One Club when she was "somewhat broke" and could not find a job in a legitimate club. While working there, she was required to mix with the customers and "cadge drinks" from them like other bar girls.

Any Connection
The subcommittee is investigating whether there is any connection between AGVA and hoodlum-controlled night clubs. Mrs. Stein, who is from Pittsburgh, Pa., said she
