

Bo Belinsky Fined By Angels After Police Stop Ruckus

Beverly Hills, Calif. — (UPI) — Bo (No Hit) Belinsky, the Los Angeles Angels' merry-making moundsman who cruises the streets of Hollywood in his red Cadillac convertible, is gaining himself as big a reputation for his pre-dawn dallying as for his pitching prowess.

The 25-year-old rookie hurler wowed the sports world earlier in the season with a no-hit game against the Baltimore Orioles, and since then has made quite a name for himself with his extra-curricular escapades that include dating movie-land starlets Ann Margret and Connie Stevens.

His latest anti-meridian antic exploded Wednesday when he and fellow Angel rookie, Dean Chance, got involved in a yelling feud with their two female companions as they returned from a farewell party for Eddie Fisher.

Eagle Point Man Gets Suspended Term

James D. Newbry, route 1, box 72, Eagle Point, received a six months suspended sentence in Jackson county district court this week on charges of assault and battery.

and Chance were returning with the women, the other identified as Briggett Witaker, also 33, to the Ambassador Hotel, where the party started after Fisher's Coconut Grove appearance.

Commercial Fishing Closed in Bay Area

Portland — (UPI) — The Oregon Fish Commission announced here Wednesday it was closing the 30-day commercial fishing season for chum salmon in Tillamook Bay.

The commission made the announcement at its monthly meeting. It said the closure was indefinite. The commission said that commercial fishing at the bay has gone from 2.8 million pounds in 1928 to 12,000 pounds in 1960. It said it did not know the cause for the drop.

Robert W. Schoening, state fisheries director, also announced that the Yakima Indian Tribal Council has adopted regulations for tribal members limiting gillnetting in the Columbia river.

He said the council disclosed it will not defend two Yakima Indians arrested by the state police last fall for illegally fishing in the Columbia.

Timber Harvest Is Lowest Since 1949

Salem — (UPI) — Oregon's timber harvest in 1961 amounted to 7,410,683,000 board feet, State Forester Dwight Phipps said today.

He said this was the lowest volume harvested since 1949 and the second consecutive year that production has declined.

In the last two years the total production figure has dropped some 1,453 million board feet, having decreased about 736 million from 1960 to 717 million from 1959.

Lane County, which claimed the lead for log production from Clatsop County in 1941 and gave it up to Douglas County in 1949, again took top honors with a harvest of 1,477,710,000 board feet. Douglas County was second and Linn County third in harvest.
