At both services Greg Keith will be dedicated to the work of the Potrero Hills Community center in San Francisco where he will be a volunteer worker this summer. This district ministers to more than 30,000 people speaking 14 different languages.

Following the public talk a study of the Watchtower magazine entitled "Overseer's Fully Accomplish Your Ministry" will be held.

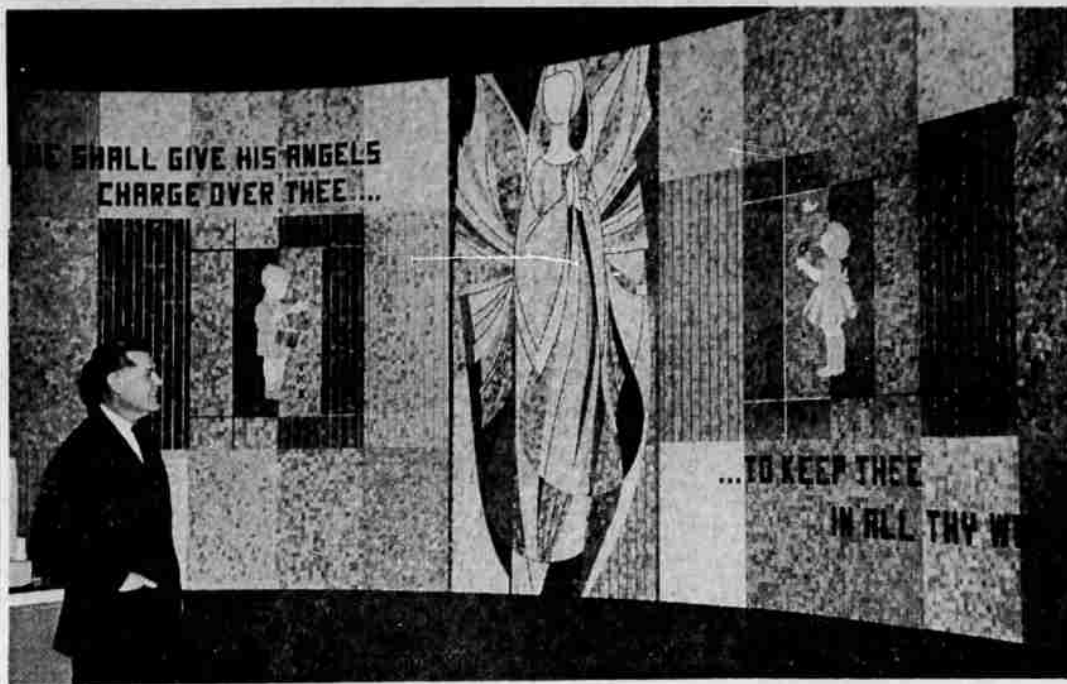
