

Minnesota Twins Just Three Per Cent Points Back of NY

Some days it just doesn't pay to get out of bed and that, in a nutshell, was the kind of day it turned to be for poor Bo Belinsky, Billy Pierce and Stan Williams.

All three went through separate ordeals Thursday and their collective misfortune would even bring tears to a hobby horse.

Belinsky, the good-time Charlie of the Los Angeles Angels, had insult added to injury when he was knocked out in the sixth inning by the Minnesota Twins after being fined \$250 for some after-hours hijinks.

Before departing, Bo walked eight and trailed 3-2. The Angels tied the score in the seventh, taking him off the hook, but Lenny Green's ninth inning single off loser Art Fowler gave the Twins a 3-4 victory and boosted them within three percentage points of the idle first-place New York Yankees.

Reds Blank Giants

Pierce suffered his second defeat as the Cincinnati Reds blanked the San Francisco Giants, 8-0, on Joey Jay's three-hitter, but that wasn't the worst part of it.

Trying to cover first base in the first inning, Pierce, who has been the Giants' most consistent pitcher with eight victories, suffered a spike injury by Don Blasingame that required 12 stitches and will keep him out of action for at least 10 days.

Don Larsen relieved Pierce and yielded a single to Frank Robinson that produced the Reds' first run, after which Robinson connected for a three-run homer in the third.

The defeat kept the second-place Giants two games behind the league-leading Dodgers, which brings up the sad plight of Williams.

The big right-hander started for the Dodgers, could get only one batter out and was charged with five runs in the first inning as the Milwaukee Braves coasted to a 7-1 victory. Hank Aaron's 12th homer with one on was the crusher for Williams. Bob Shaw then went on to hold the Dodgers to six hits for his eighth victory in 10 decisions.

Colts Best Mets

The Houston Colts beat the New York Mets, 10-2, and the Pittsburgh Pirates downed the Chicago Cubs, 6-3, in the other National League games.

Carl Warwick's two-run homer highlighted a seven-run first inning rally that kayoed Jay Hook of the Mets and made it a breeze for the Colts. Bob Bruce registered his fifth victory for Houston, allowing six hits, including a homer by Marv Throneberry. Don Hoak collected his 1,000th major league hit in the first inning, an infield single, and then belted a three-run homer in the fifth to pace the Pirates to their sixth straight win. Bob Friend, whose record now is 7-7, held the Cubs to six hits, two of which were homers by Billy Williams and Ron Santo.

Padres Nudge Bees To Go Ahead in PCL

Tommy Harper and rookie pitcher John Flavin put in a full night's work for San Diego Thursday night and their efforts helped put the Padres right on top of the Pacific Coast league.

Harper's homer in the bottom of the 12th combined with Flavin's six-hitter carried the Padres to a 3-2 win over Salt Lake City and shoved the Bees into the second slot.

In other action, Tacoma blanked Vancouver 5-0, Hawaii handed Spokane a double dose of the same 6-0 and 5-0 and Seattle and Portland split. Portland took the opener 6-5 and Seattle won the nightcap 3-2 in 14 innings.

Hal Jones homered in the second to give Salt Lake a 1-0 lead but Harper's triple and Jesse Gonder's single tied it in the third. After Salt Lake moved ahead 2-1, Bobby Klaus sent it into overtime with a solo homer in the sixth.

Harper ended it with his eighth homer of the year. Flavin won his second against no losses.

Gaylord Perry, just down from the San Francisco Giants, tamed Vancouver on four hits. John Orsino hit a solo homer in the fourth and Perry was never in any trouble.

Dick Egan and Roger Clapp of Hawaii did Spokane in. Egan allowed but four hits in winning the opener with Carlos Bernier's two-run double highlighting a three run islander third inning.

Clapp gave up seven hits but fanned six and walked but two. He stayed out of trouble until the ninth when Spokane managed to load the bases. Clapp, who drove in two of Hawaii's runs, managed to preserve his shutout. Dick Barone drove in two runs in the eighth for the winners.
