AREA NO. RR-1-P-Ashland Watershed
SE 1/4 and E 1/2 SW 1/4, Section 17, E 1/2 Section 19, all of Sections 20, 21, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, and 34, T. 30 S., R. 1 E., S. 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, and 18, T. 40 S., R. 1 E., M. 2, excepting the Tolman Creek Road and the Tolman Creek Road from the Forest boundary to the Ashland Loop Road.

Permits to enter the above-described areas may be obtained at the Ashland Ranger Station. NOW, THEREFORE, I, MARK O. HATTFIELD, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 47.158, Oregon Forest Laws, do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above-described area to be unlawful and that no person shall be permitted to enter only through permit to be issued by the State Forester, or a fire warden, under which permit entrant shall comply with any and all of the following requirements:

1. Refrain from smoking except in places designated as safe in said permit.
2. Build no open fires except in places designated as safe in said permit.
3. Have as equipment when using campfires, excepting when traveling as a pedestrian or camping at improved, designated and posted campgrounds, tools as specified by the Forester suitable for extinguishing fires.

Shake chicken, 2 or 3 pieces at a time, in a bag containing a mixture of 1/2 cup flour* seasoned with 2 tablespoons salt, 2 teaspoons paprika and 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper. Reserve leftover flour for gravy. Melt fat in skillet and slowly brown chicken turning as necessary with chicken tongs; drain on absorbent paper.

Sift flour, baking powder and salt into mixing bowl. Blend eggs and milk and pour into a well made in dry ingredients. Add melted butter. Blend mixture slowly with rotary beater until all flour is moistened, then beat thoroughly until batter is smooth. Pour into greased 11 1/2 x 7 1/2 x 1 1/2-inch or other comparable size baking dish. Arrange chicken atop batter. Bake in moderate, 375 degree, oven 45 minutes or until batter is puffy and brown. Serve with cream gravy**.

*Cream Gravy. Pour off all pan drippings from frying chicken except two tablespoons fat. Blend in 2 tablespoons flour; cook stirring constantly until frothy. Add 2 cups milk or cream and continue stirring until uniformly thickened. Add 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger and a dash of allspice. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Simmer five minutes.
