Marichal Cools Off Cardinals By 5-0

Juan Marichal cooled off the St. Louis Cardinals with a two-hitter Saturday and recorded his third shutout of the season by pitching the San Francisco Giants to a 5-0 victory.

The only Cardinals who collected safeties off the right hander were Carl Sawatski and Charlie James. Sawatski beat out an infield single in the first inning while James cracked a double in the eighth.

Marichal struck out four and walked three in boosting his season mark to 10-4 and ending the Giant's latest losing streak at three.

Felipe Alou smashed a two-run homer off Joser Larry Jackson (5-7) in the first inning to give Marichal enough runs at the start. Willie Mays' second double of the day accounted for two more runs in the fifth. The Giants scored again in the sixth on singles by Alou and Willie McCovey.

Ernie Banks hit his 17th homer and drove in four runs to lead the Chicago Cubs to a 6-3 win over the New York Mets. Don Cardwell went six innings to receive credit for his third victory.

Milwaukee topped Pittsburgh 2-1. Cincinnati lost to Philadelphia 4-3 and Houston beat Los Angeles 4-1 in night games.

The two teams met again last night at Salt Lake City.

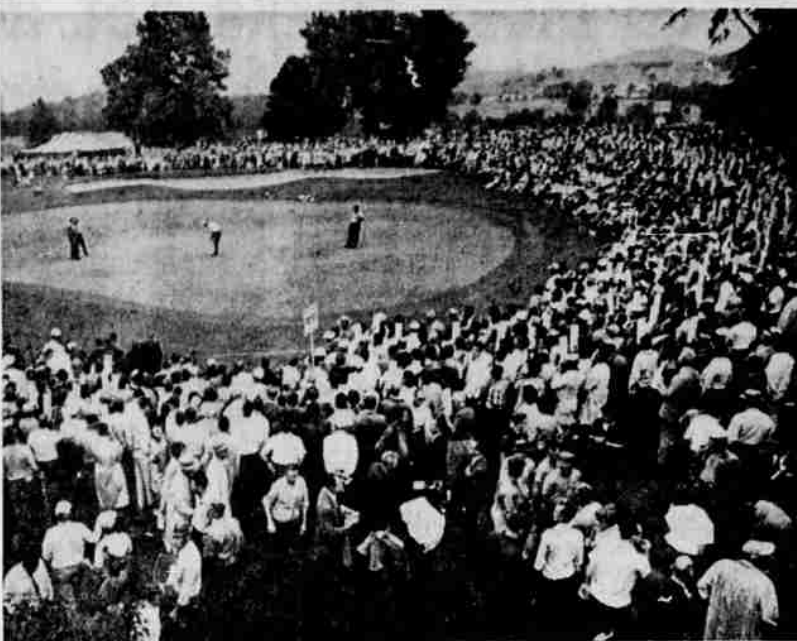

Indians Rally To Edge Yankees 10-9

Jerry Kindall hit a two-run homer in the last half of the ninth inning Saturday to give the Cleveland Indians a 10-9 victory over the New York Yankees despite a three-run, pinch-hit homer by Mickey Mantle.

The home run, which knocked the Yankees out of first place in the American league, was Kindall's fourth hit of the day and boosted his batting average to .430 against the Yankees. Kindall connected against Jim Landis, the seventh New York pitcher, after Woody Held was hit by a pitched ball.

Mantle made his first appearance in nearly a month in the top of the eighth. The slugger, who suffered a muscle tear in his right thigh May 19, slammed a tremendous 450-foot homer with two on to give the Yankees a 9-7 lead. The blow climaxed a Yankee rally from an early 6-0 deficit.

Jack Nicklaus Ties Favored Arnold Palmer in U.S. Open

Oakmont, Pa. - (UPI) - Burly Jack Nicklaus, a pro for only seven months, showed favored Arnold Palmer those money nerves Saturday as he came on in the stretch to tie golf's golden boy for the U.S. Open Golf championship.

The blond bomber from Ohio State made up two shots on Palmer in the final round with a two under par 35-34—69 for a 283 which threw the nation's most coveted championship into a Sunday playoff.

Palmer, the Masters champion seeking a big slam, was as much as three shots up on the field as they fought out the final two rounds over awe-some Oakmont's hills and dales. But then a balky putter and the grasping acres got to him as he finished with a 35-38—71.

All Square

That brought them home all square after three days of struggling through rain and heat — with cocky Phil Rodgers and Louisville slugger Bobby Nichols tied two strokes back at 285.

Fifth came Gay Brewer of Crystal River, Fla., at 287, while Tommy Jacobs and Gary Player were tied at 288 and defending champion Gene Littler wound up at 290.

It was a tight, tense afternoon before a record crowd of 23,522 as Palmer jumped into a three shot lead and then, with his putter misfiring, saw it dwindle away and force a playoff at 1:45 p.m. EDT today.

He kicked away some of it himself. For he was in position on the semi-final hole of the morning round to put it away when he drove the green of the 292-yard par four hole and rammed home a 23-foot putt for an eagle.

But then, on the 18th he played it like an amateur as he three-putted from 200 feet and finished that third round in a tie with Nichols — with Rodgers and Bob Rosburg one shot back, and two shots away the ever-threatening player Nicklaus.

Nobody was paying any particular attention to the 22-year-old Buckeye Bomber. He has been a pro only seven months and while he won two national amateur championships and has been a consistent money winner since turning pro, nobody figured him for the nerves required to race up and look Palmer in the eye.

Played Like Veteran

But the 200-pound 22-year-old played it like a steel-nerved veteran while Palmer's putter was giving him fits and the Masters champion was battling desperately just to stay alive.

Palmer seemed to have it locked when he went out there with the gallery giving him all the vocal help in Pennsylvania and ran off birdies on the second and fourth holes. Now he was running three shots in front of the pack — and usually nobody catches the Tiger when he has them on the hip like that.

But the Arnie began to come apart at the seams. He butchered the ninth with a bogey six, taking four blows from 40 feet, and he chipped it up again on the 13th by trapping his tee shot.

Nicklaus, playing in front of him, got away to a faltering start with a bogey on the first hole but then the big kid from the Buckeye country began his run.

He cannoned a 20-footer on the seventh and put his second

on the carpet on the par five 480-yard ninth, running it down for another bird. Then he rammed home a 12-footer on the 11th and now he was all square with the king.

Hole by hole they matched it then, Nicklaus with that big bulldog jaw jutting out in front of him, and Palmer giving it a little bit of Barrymore as he was betrayed time and again by that putter which wouldn't pay off with any birdies that he needed so desperately.

Nicklaus beat the losing rap on the 17th with pressure putting that kept him alive. He trapped his drive on that 292-yard par four hole and blasted it out to the fringe. Then he chipped it four feet past — and walking up calmly stroked it home in the face of the toughest pressure his young nerves ever were called upon to handle.

Palmer played it in regulation without too much difficulty and then was walking to the final tee while Nick-
