## Rivers Reports Fish Parasites Nothing To Be Alarmed About

A parasitic infestation noted on fish in lakes of this area is "nothing to be alarmed about," Cole Rivers, Grants Pass, state game commission biologist for this area, has emphasized.

There is absolutely nothing wrong with the fish so far as use for human consumption is concerned, he added.

Report of something wrong with the fish at Howard Prairie lake prompted a query to Rivers. He reported that the infestation by the "external" parasite, "myxospordia," has been noted at Willow lake this spring and to a limited extent at Fish and Squaw lakes.

"We have been watching it all spring," said Rivers. The parasite causes an excessive secretion of slime. This gives a dark gray appearance as if the fish have a fungus growth.

In the eighth, ex-Dodger Bobby Lillis got a triple and scored on Golden's grounder, beating out the attempted put-out at the plate. Lillis' hit bounded away from left fielder Tommy Davis and the Colts' shortstop was on third by the time Davis recovered the ball.

Golden kept the five Dodger hits scattered. In the second inning Los Angeles had consecutive singles by Ron Fairly and Wally Moon but catcher John Roseboro flied to Al Spangler in shallow left field and Fairly was thrown out at the plate attempting to score from third.

The run in a last ditch bottom of the seventh inning followed a tying run by Neil Rivenburg, who scored on a passed ball.

Grants Pass did all its scoring in the first two innings and a five-run second frame spurged gave the Climate City lads an 8 to 3 margin. The Studs pulled up gradually, scoring in four of the remaining innings. They trailed 7 to 8 going into the bottom of the final panel. The two important runs crossed with two out.

Rivenburg walked, was sacrificed to second by Harold Allen and went to third base on a groundout by Don Kilbourn. Halaas got on base when hit by one of pitcher Jim Thompson's throws. He swiped second. Then came Glines' big blast.

In the second stanza, a walk, fielders option, an error and a single by Wolney loaded the bases with no one out. Larry Pepper, replacing Larry Mason on the hill for Central Point, walked a man to force in a run. Roy Standley next tripled to punch over three runners. Peters singled Standley home.

Central Point picked up two runs in the third session. Pat Pepper singled, stole second and reached third on a groundout. He scored on a miscue. Howard Tomlinson, who boarded the bags on a misplay, gained third on a passed ball and came home on another.

Glines singled for Cheney in the fourth. He swiped second and third and an error let him tally. Central Point had its best hitting inning in the fifth when singles by Rivenburg, Allen and a Kilbourn two-bagger accounted for one counter.

Rivenburg hit two for three in the contest and Glines and Grants Pass's Wolney, Roy Standley, Peters and Lyman Kiesecker each two for four. Central Point's Mason gave up five hits and was charged with six of the Grants Pass runs in one inning plus. He walked one batter. Larry Pepper over six innings per-

mitted two runs, four hits and three walks. He whiffed nine batters.

### Dark Makes Hasty Exit After Friday Giant Loss

San Francisco —(UPI)— Shortly before game time Friday night, manager Alvin Dark of the groggy San Francisco Giants mused, "The boys will play better ball now that they're home from that rugged road trip."

Shortly after game time, Dark set some kind of a record in piling out of his uniform and taking off for his Atherton residence after the Giants lost another to the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-2.

A three-run homer in the first inning by Charlie James made the difference for the Cardinals who now have won 10 out of 11 while the Giants incurred their ninth loss in 11 outings.

As if things weren't bad enough for the Giants, first baseman Orlando Cepeda sustained a charley horse in his left thigh vainly trying to score a run during the third inning and was taken out of the lineup.

James, who now has collected seven hits in his last 12 trips against Billy O'Dell and clubbed the Giants' southpaw for six RBIs during that span, sliced a wicked shot over the right field barrier to mess things up early for the Giants.

The blow also started O'Dell toward his third loss this year in four decisions with the Cards and gave him a season mark of 7-5.

James added a single off Billy in the fourth inning then laced another in the seventh, stole second and tallied the Cards' fourth run on a base hit by Gene Oliver.

A wild pitch by Stu Miller let the final St. Louis tally scoot across in the eighth.

Ray Sadecki struggled the distance for St. Louis although giving up six walks to go with seven hits. Three double plays got him out of trouble and he fanned Willie McCovey with two on and two out in the seventh.

**Davies Wins British Amateur Golf Meet**  
Hoylake, England —(UPI)— Richard Davies, handsome 31-year old real estate broker from Pasadena, Calif., pulled his faltering game together on the final seven holes Saturday and won the British amateur golf championship with a 1 up, 36-hole victory over John Poval of Wales.

After wasting away a morning 4-up advantage and falling behind by 2 during the afternoon round, Davies won the 30th, 32nd and 33rd holes in par-birdie-par to earn America the huge silver championship trophy for the 15th time.

**U.S. Gets 28th Win In Wightman Tennis**  
Wimbledon, England —(UPI)— Darlene Hard, the blonde ex-waitress from Montebello, Calif., blasted Christine Truman off the court Saturday and gave the United States its 28th victory, 4-3, in the Wightman tennis cup.

But as soon as the top-ranked American disposed of the six-foot British girl, 6-2, 6-2, the rest of the United States team fell apart. And with the pressure off, the British players suddenly snapped into form and walloped their American opponents in the last three matches in straight sets.

New London, Conn. —(UPI)— The Yale university varsity crew narrowly edged Harvard Saturday night in the 11th renewal of the oldest intercollegiate athletic even in the United States.

Runnerup Omaha picked up a game on the pace-setting Indians with a 9-4 win at Dallas-Fort Worth.

Catcher Jim Campbell was the big gun for visiting Oklahoma City, driving in two runs with a bases-loaded double to break the tie in the 13th. Campbell also had a triple and two singles to drive in another run.

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## Cornell Takes Varsity and Freshman Races in Regatta

Syracuse, N.Y. —(UPI)— The East regained rowing prominence after three lean years Saturday when Cornell won the varsity and freshman races and missed by a whisker a "sweep of the river" in the 60th annual intercollegiate rowing association regatta.

A sun-drenched crowd of 15,000 was treated to an awesome display of versatility as Cornell churned to a two-length victory in the 3-mile varsity race on calm Onondaga lake after the formidable freshman crew won the 2-mile opener.

Darkhorse Navy spoiled Cornell's bid for a sweep by nipping the Big Red junior varsity by a quarter length over the 3-mile course, Cornell just ran out of water in this one.

The twice-beaten Cornell varsity oarsmen, concentrating on distance all season, finally lived up to the potential everyone said they had.

Harrison (Stork) Sanford, at the helm of the Cornell varsity eight for 28 years, seemed to take the performance in stride.

"We rowed the race as we planned," he said. "I knew we had it won after two miles."

Cornell took the lead at the midway mark from fast-starting Washington, the only undefeated shell among 13 in the varsity race. The Big Red stayed at a low 30-stroke count before jumping to 35 strokes near the end.
