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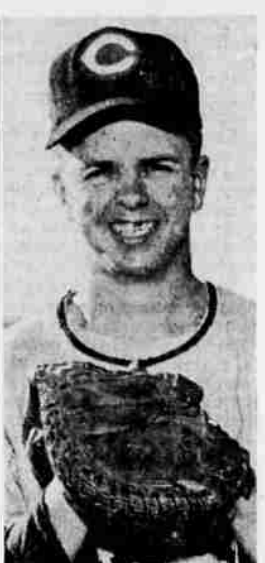
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Medford, CP Studs Legion Ball Rivals

Central Point may have, Jeff Anhorn, catcher; Harold Allen, first base; Pat Pepper, second; Lou Alvarez, short; Mike Glines, third, and Neil Rivenburg, Howard Tomlinson and Dick Halaas or Paul Bransom, outfielders.

Central Point has been idle since Friday when it beat Grants Pass. Medford downed Klamath Falls Falcons on Saturday night and Coos Bay twice on Sunday.

Southern Oregon champion Stewart Schroeder has set the medalist pace in qualifying play for the men's club championship golf tournament at Rogue Valley Country club. Schroeder, ex-Medford high ace, who has just completed his third season as No. 1 man for the Oregon State university varsity, carded a two-under par 69 in his qualifying tour.

The score ties the record for the renowned course established recently by young Doug Olson. Schroeder heads a field of 77 who have played qualifying rounds. Right behind him is Harry Millette with a 70. Qualifying play will conclude on June 24.

Medford American Legion junior baseball had its share of oddities this week end. Take the way Medford scored its tie-breaking runs in the seventh inning against the Klamath Falcons on Saturday night. We failed to pick it up from the Cokes, but this is the way John Nolen, summertime sports editor for the Klamath Falls, Herald and News, tells it:

Medford's pitcher Stuart Young was on third base and shortstop Dan Miles was on second. Klamath catcher Dave Saks called for a pitchout. The strategy caught Young off third base and put him in a hot box. The Falcons deliberately had Young running in the hot box to tire him since Stu was due for his seventh inning pitching stint. This strategy backfired when a throw by KF third sacker struck Young and bounded out toward the mound. Young scored and Miles, who had come down to third, saw that there was no one handy to retrieve the glancing ball, raced home, too.

Medford's version is a bit different. Coach Cliff McLean said that the squeeze play was on, after two bluffs, with Mike Neathamer at bat, and that the play went awry despite a good pitch. McLean reported that the base line was really jammed with Klamath players. The ball hit Young on the top of the head. Neathamer followed this activity with a double.

BACK AND FORTH Then, against Coos Bay on Sunday, Scott Eaton singled. He was headed for second when Bob Schroeder fled to the outfield where the ball was caught. Eaton, skidding into second base, picked himself up and ran back to first. The ball beat him there but got by base man Buddy Bick. Eaton again picked himself up out of the dirt and made it back to second safely.

DAY OF THEFT Sunday was a day of thievery for Medford against the coast team with the 15 steals. The Cokes had a squeeze effort turn into a hot box on Dick Deffley but got a run on interference when basepath obstruction was called against CB third sacker Ken Basendorff. Gary Miller got credit for a hit when shortstop Butch Smith held his ground but too long trying to keep Deffley from scoring from third. Miller beat the throw which was bad and which allowed Deffley to score anyway.

NEARLY CLOBBERED The Cokes said this writer probably would come out with a column seeking to ban baseball because he almost got clobbered by a foul ball off the bat of Scott Eaton. The ball went high in the air and came straight down at us. Wind had let up and the ball refused to veer from its relentless course. We couldn't move much. We were sitting down in the bleachers on a foot rest and using the seat board for a table. But we got a hand up in time and the ball glanced off our ungloved fingers. Chalk up an error if you will.

SCOTT AT KFLW Aforementioned John Nolen is the same young man who has been Southern Oregon college athletic news director during the past school year. We understand he'll return to college in the fall. It's reported that his Herald and News predecessor, Wayne Scott, is sports director for Klamath Falls radio station KFLW and has been broadcasting Klamath Falcon games.
