Natural Resources Museum Is Open in Lithia Park, Ashland

Ashland-The Southern Oregon Museum of Natural Resources, only museum of its kind between Portland and San Francisco, has opened. Located in Lithia Park, it will be open to the public from 1 to 7 p.m. daily and at other hours by appointment. There is a nominal admission fee for visitors, but organized groups of school children will be admitted free if arrangements are made in advance.

Highlight of the museum is a habitat scene showing wildlife on Mt. Ashland. Also featured are displays of various birds, mammals, insects and reptiles found in southern Oregon, and a live bee hive under glass.

The creators of the museum, David Hagerbaumer, artist, and L. I. Haptonstall, taxidermist, plan to build additional displays in the future.
