Kennedy Lashes Union Action As Flight Engineers Strike Pan Am

Senate Extends Law Controlling Materials Export

Neuberger Casts Only Nay Vote

Washington — (UPI) — The Senate voted by an overwhelming margin Saturday to extend permanently the law controlling exports of strategic materials after adopting two amendments designed to strengthen the measure.

The vote at an unusual Saturday session was 59 to 1, with Sen. Maurice B. Neuberger (D-Ore.) the only dissenter. The measure now goes to the house where similar legislation already has been introduced.

The two amendments, sponsored by Sen. Kenneth B. Keating (R-N.Y.) were adopted jointly by a 57 to 2 vote, with Mrs. Neuberger and Sen. Lee Metcalf (D-Mont.) casting the only "no" votes. The present export control law expires June 30.

The Senate met on Saturday for the first time this year in an effort to make at least a dent in its large backlog of legislation.

Democratic leader Mike Mansfield (Mont.) told the chamber that the jurisdictional dispute between the senate and house appropriations committee over money bills threatened to make the entire nation "the object of ridicule."

He said no break appeared in sight in the impasse which has blocked final action on all appropriations to run the government in the fiscal year starting next Sunday.

The controversy involves the place and procedure for drafting the compromise between the Senate and House versions of money bills.

The original export control act was enacted in 1949 and has been extended temporarily from time to time. It gives the commerce department authority to license all exports, bans all shipments to Communist China and forbids shipments of certain strategic materials to other iron curtain countries.

In approving the bill to make the act permanent, the Senate Banking committee added an amendment by Sen. Jacob K. Javits (R-N.Y.) calling for the United States to work with other free nations for a unified commercial and trading policy toward the Soviet bloc.

The Daily Herald said that "sooner or later, if there is not to be crisis after crisis... the island must be handed to the Communist Chinese. 'A pity it did not happen long ago,' the paper added.

The Times found it "difficult to interpret present Chinese policy" but did add that now "the offshore islands have become almost the private Sino-American duelling ground."

The Guardian said it seemed "unlikely" that this year's version of "the annual international crisis" would be the offshore islands. It added, however, that though new Nationalist threats of invasion of the mainland may look more credible now to the Communists because of their "lamentable internal condition" and because time is running out for Chiang Kai-shek.

A former British Labor party minister of state at the foreign office said that Quemoy and Matsu were "foremost" of the "unnecessary causes of friction" with Communist China and urged the West to remove this irritant.

Kenneth Younger's advice regarding western policy toward China came in the latest issue of the China Quarterly.

Younger, now director general of the Royal Institute of International Affairs, saw other points of friction such as the future of Formosa itself but added "on the right of the mainland government of China to claim Quemoy and Matsu as part of China no serious argument is possible."

Strike Stopped By Restraining Order Of Federal Judge

Eastern Idles Its 18,000 Employees

New York — (UPI) — The Flight Engineers union went on strike against Pan American World Airways and Eastern Air Lines Saturday in a vacation season walkout that an angry President Kennedy denounced as the "height of irresponsibility."

The Pan Am strike was quickly stopped by a restraining order issued by a federal judge, but Eastern closed up shop and sent home its nearly 18,000 employees, disrupting travel plans for hundreds of Americans.

The Flight Engineers union, already inflamed by "government interference," called the strike despite pleas for a delay by George Meany, president of the AFL-CIO, and the National Mediation board.

Sternly Worded
"The way is still open for a sensible solution without the injury, both to the parties and to the public, inherent in the present course of action," Kennedy said in a sternly worded statement issued by the White House.

Kennedy said that the engineers' settlement with Trans World Airlines earlier this week "demonstrates that the strikes on Eastern and Pan American Airlines are unnecessary."

The engineers' union promptly responded with a statement by its president, Ronald A. Brown, saying that it should not be blamed solely for the strike, and also that it "will not abdicate its right to strike."

Brown said the strikes against Pan American and Eastern were "perfectly legal and justified" and that the management of the two lines must share equal blame for lack of a contract agreement.

Similar Dispute
He also said that the proposed guidelines for a settlement suggested by the Labor department, which were used in resolving a similar dispute with TWA, would not serve the public interest.

Kennedy said the Trans World agreement should have been followed promptly by similar agreements with Pan Am and Eastern.

"The course was plainly open to all flight engineer chapters for a sensible and equitable resolution of the issues in dispute," the chief executive said.

"The good offices of the government were and are fully available, as they were in the TWA dispute, to assist in such a resolution."

"Such a proffer was made last night by the National Mediation board. It is most regrettable that this offer was spurned by the flight engineers."

Morse Replies to Ike's Attack on Administration

Washington — (UPI) — Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) fired back Saturday at Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's slashing attack on the Kennedy administration, charging that the former president's medical bills have been paid all of his life by the taxpayers.

As Eisenhower warned anew that the individual must be ever vigilant against encroachments on his freedom by big central government, Morse told a Saturday session of the Senate that the five-star general's Gettysburg, Pa., farm is "largely subsidized by gifts."

The White House declined any comment when asked for President Kennedy's reaction to Eisenhower's attack at a GOP fund-raising dinner Friday night.

The former chief executive asserted the administration was floundering because it did not understand the U.S. economic system and he called on GOP candidates to attack Kennedy programs.

Morse rose on the Senate floor to declare that he was quite ready to take on Eisenhower in a debate over Kennedy's programs during the senator's current reelection campaign.

Chiding Eisenhower for his opposition to Kennedy's medical care proposals, Morse said that as a career military officer and later as president, Eisenhower never had to worry about paying a medical bill because he was taken care of all his life at taxpayers' expense.

Public Hearing on Talent Sanitary District Scheduled

A public hearing on the proposed South Talent Sanitary district will be held in the Jackson county court room at 2 p.m. Tuesday, County Judge Earl M. Miller has announced.

Depending on the outcome of the public hearing, an election may be called in the district, Miller explained. If the

property owners within the district approve the proposal, a board of directors will be elected.

Financing of the sewer installation would have to be done through district bonding and not Bancroft bonding, the county judge pointed out. The sewer improvement does not apply to the whole county, so under current law financing through Bancroft bonding is not feasible, Miller explained.

If a majority of the area property owners approve the sanitary district idea and it is approved at an election, the district would be assessed the cost of the study and survey made by Consulting Engineer James K. Hoey. If the residents of the area fail to approve the proposal, the county will stand the cost of the study.

South of Talent
The survey and study was requested by petition of approximately 100 residents of the area south of Talent between the Southern Pacific railroad tracks and Bear Creek.

The area included about 225 acres. The survey showed that 74 septic tanks and three cesspools now serve approximately 250 people. Allowing for future growth in the area, the consulting engineer recommended a sewer system which would serve 500 people.

If the district is formed there should be a study of a possible central domestic water supply and distribution system for the same area.

He also recommended that sewage disposal facilities be developed jointly with the city of Talent, and the same firm of consulting engineer be retained to study the possible joint water and sewage facilities for the city and the proposed sewer district.

Joint development of sewage and water facilities would make initial installation and construction costs and system operation more economical, Hoey said.

Lightning Sets Two Small Fires In Area Forests

Two small lightning fires occurred on lands protected by the state department of forestry Friday night and Saturday morning.

The first fire, in the Sams Valley area, was extinguished. The second fire, in the Round Top area in the Evans Creek district, was under control Saturday morning.

Lightning hit all around the Rogue River National forest but did not strike in the forest, Fire Control Officer Robert Torheim reported Saturday.

The weather forecast for Saturday indicated an 80 per cent chance of lightning strikes, Torheim said.

Some Snow
The valleys and mid-slopes are dry while the high country still has some snow in it, Torheim said.

The Rogue River National forest has had one fire so far this fire season. This was from a lightning storm in early June.

The forest staff is now on a seven-day week schedule with nearly all the lookouts up. Still unmanned are Devil's Peak on the summit of the Cascades, Hershberger, Wagner Butte and Whiskey Peak. Devil's Peak lookout station is still snowed in, Wagner Butte was scheduled to be manned today, and Whiskey Peak shortly.

Kennedy Burned In Effigy By Leftists

Mexico City — (UPI) — President John F. Kennedy was burned in effigy Friday night during a Communist-organized demonstration on the University of Mexico campus.

The President and Mrs. Kennedy visit Mexico next week end as the guest of President Adolfo Lopez Mateos.

Authorities said Saturday further tightening of security measures was indicated. Precautions already scheduled for the state visit were said to be "unprecedented."

The campus rally was called last night by various left-wing student groups including the "Friedrich Engels Cell" of the Mexican Communist party. Among the slogans shouted by the demonstrators was "Kennedy No, Jacqueline Si."

The anti-Kennedy demonstration ran counter to general expressions of welcome by Mexican officials.

Price of Haircuts to Increase in Portland

Portland — (UPI) — The price of haircuts in the Portland area will go up to \$2 beginning July 1.

The 25-cent increase was announced Saturday after a referendum among barber shop owners and journeymen affiliated with Portland Local 75 of the Barbers Union.

The price for a shave will go from \$1.50 to \$1.75. Children's haircuts will remain at \$1.50 and will apply to all children through the eighth grade or up to 14 years old, instead of 12 years old as now.

British Urge That Chiang Be Forced To Abandon Islands

London — (UPI) — The reported movement of Communist Chinese troops opposite the Nationalist-held Quemoy and Matsu islands brought suggestions from the British press Saturday that the Nationalists be made to abandon the offshore islands.

The Daily Telegraph said doubts over America's position regarding the islands should be cleared up.

"Either Chiang should be persuaded to abandon these islands or the American guarantee should be extended and made explicit," the paper said. "The present ambiguity is dangerous."

County Surveyor to Check Disputed Ownership of Eagle Point Property

Eagle Point — The county surveyor has been asked to investigate the ownership of property involved in a legal tangle over a road leading to the new \$40,000 Eagle Point Scout-Community building.

The dispute flared two weeks ago when Mrs. Margaret Peachy, who contends she owns a section of the road, had a barricade erected to halt traffic on the road, B. St. The street is the only access route to the scout-community building, erected through volunteer labor and donations by many residents.

Twenty-four hours later, city officials confident that the city owns the road, knocked down the barricade.

Eagle Point City Attorney Gregg Hornecker subsequently met with Paul Haviland, attorney for Mrs. Peachy.

Both attorneys agreed to advise their clients to hold further action until a survey was made by the county surveyor.

Mrs. Peachy's claim to ownership of an 800-foot section of the road is based on a deed drawn up in the early 1800's which she filed and had recorded a few days prior to taking action to barricade the road.

City councilmen, however, say they have proof that the road has been used by the public for at least 43 years. At one time city officials put a gate across it for a couple of years to prevent indiscriminate dumping of garbage in the area.
