## Reedsport Swimmers Take First in Medford Relay Meet

Reedsport piled up 322 points yesterday afternoon and evening to win the second Medford relay at the city's Hawthorne swimming pool.

Medford nosed out North Bend for second place 274 to 272. Grants Pass scored 144 points, Roseburg 138 and Klamath Falls 28 in the six-way meet which opened the season competition for Medford's city team.

Reedsport collected a total of 13 places in the 32 events. The coast team swept the 11-12 year boys division, taking all four events. North Bend collected 11 firsts, sweeping the 15-17 girls class and taking three events each in 13-14 girls and 11-12 girls.

Medford 10 and under girls team of Ann Gerety, Donita Taylor Sheryl Smith and Janet Brown gained victories in all four events of their division.

The meet was conducted in four age groups each for boys and girls. Races were medley, freestyle, breaststroke and butterfly. Each race was 160 yards with each relay member swimming 40 yards (one pool length).

Medford city recreation department conducted the meet.

### Zarley of Houston Is NCAA Golf Winner

### Four Crack 4-Minute Barrier As Beatty Wins AAU Mile Run

Walnut, Calif. — (UPI) — Little Jim Beatty, fighting his way out of trouble time and again, won one of the greatest mile races in American history last night in the 74th annual AAU meet when he was clocked in 3:57.9.

In a race in which three other men also cracked the one-time invincible four-minute barrier.

So tight was the finish that it took a photo to separate second-place finisher Jim Grelle and third-place Gary Weisger. Each was timed in 3:58.7.

Bill Dolson of Kansas came in fourth at 3:59 — his first time under four minutes. New Zealand's John Davies was fifth at 4:00.2, barely missing his first sub-four-minute mile.

Other outstanding performances were:

— Slender Ron Morris of the Southern California Striders became the fourth man in history to clear the 16-foot height in the pole vault as he went 16 feet 1/4 inch. He barely missed a world mark of 16-3 on his final vault of the evening.

— Jerry Tarr, the powerful Oregon finisher, was the meet's only double winner with a 13.4 high hurdle victory last night and a 22.6 victory in the 220-lows tonight.

Tarr, a powerful runner, was left at the post in the lows and was running in last place after the third hurdle.

### Tarr Takes Hurdles in AAU Meet

Walnut, Calif. — (UPI) — National collegiate champion Jerry Tarr led a march of Oregonians through the first day of the National AAU Track and Field Championships here Friday.

Tarr beat arch-rival Hayes Jones in 13.4 seconds, equaling the meet record. It was the first defeat for Jones since 1960 and avenged an earlier loss this year when Tarr hit a hurdle and had to pull up.

Tarr, an Oregon graduate running for the Emerald Empire Athletic Association (EAAA), made up a two-foot deficit over the last three hurdles.

Harry Jerome of Oregon and the EAAA ran second to Bob Hayes of Florida A&M in the 100-yard dash. Hayes was timed in 9.3 and Jerome in 9.4. Collegiate champion Frank Budd of Villanova pulled a muscle in the race and was out of the Saturday 220.

Mike Lehner of the EAAA dropped out of the six-mile run after three and a half miles. He was running 18th at the time. Bruce Kidd, a 19-year-old Canadian, won in meet and American record time of 28:23.1.

Two other EAAA runners qualified easily for Saturday finals. Sig Ohlmann ran his best time, 1:48.7, to qualify in the 880 and Archie San Romani Jr. ran a 4:06.5 mile to qualify in that event. Ex-Web-foot Jim Grelle also qualified in the mile with a 4:10.4 clock.

George Kerr, an Oregon State graduate student, qualified in the 440 with a time of 46.6. Bob Johnson of Oregon State equaled his all-time best, 46.7, but finished fourth and out of the final.

Norm Hoffman of Oregon State failed to qualify in the 880 despite a 1:49.3, his fastest time ever.

Darrell Horn, a former Oregon Stater now competing for the Air Force, finished third in the qualifying for the broad jump with a leap of 25-3 1/4, but Dan Moore of Stanford and Salem, Ore., didn't reach Saturday's finals.

### Oregon State Opens Football Ticket Sales

Oregon State University, Corvallis — Advance sale of tickets for Oregon State's 1962 football games will begin on Monday, July 2, Athletic Director R. S. (Spec) Keene announced.

Ticket applications with detailed information will be mailed to alumni and Beaver Club members, as well as those fans on the general public list, by July 1. Others wishing this information may write or phone the OSU athletic department and applications will be mailed them.

Two season ticket plans will be in effect, including a Portland ticket for three games and a Corvallis ticket for three games. The Beavers play six home games and four on the road this fall.

The Corvallis season ticket will include games with University of Pacific, Oct. 20; Colorado State (homecoming), Nov. 17; and Oregon, Nov. 24, the three Corvallis games.

**Iowa State Game**  
The Portland season ticket includes games with Iowa State, Sept. 22; Washington, Oct. 13; and West Virginia, Oct. 27.

Although homecoming usually was celebrated at the OSU-Oregon game, the associated students at OSU voted to change the date this year due to the game falling on Thanksgiving vacation — when many students will be off campus and not able to work in advance on house signs and other homecoming plans. Most of the students will return on Saturday morning for the Oregon game, however.

The Iowa State opener at Portland is the only night game, starting at 8 p.m., daylight time. All other games are at 1:30 p.m. Away games include Iowa at Iowa City, Sept. 29; Stanford at Palo Alto, Oct. 6; Washington State at Pullman, Nov. 3; and Idaho at Moscow, Nov. 10.

### NEW YORK GETS TRACK TRIALS

Walnut, Calif. — (UPI) — New York City and its forthcoming world fair Saturday were awarded the 1966 Olympic track and field trials.

A bid by the fair sponsors of \$350,000 was the bait taken by the U.S. Olympic games track and field committee in officially selecting New York.

The announcement came as the Olympic committee met in conjunction with the 74th annual AAU track and field championships being held here this week end.

Site of the trials, tentatively slated for late June of 1964, will be Downing Stadium on Randall Island. The stadium has a capacity of only 22,000 — many less than the huge Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum which hosted the 1956 Olympic games and the Stanford, Calif., stadium, site of the 1960 trials.
