Robert Onstad, director of the gallery, has already received inquiries from approximately 30 states. Entry blanks are now available with July 15 the deadline for application. All persons entering work in the show are charged a fee of \$3. Open to Public

From July 21 to Sept. 9 the art center at 31 Water street will be open to the public and prizes will be presented as a result of jury selection, says Onstad. Each entry must be for sale as others cannot be accepted. A commission of one-third will be charged.

Judges for the show are to be Angus Bowmer, director-producer of the Shakespearean festival and drama professor at Southern Oregon college; Robert Bosworth, abstract painter, and Onstad, who has studied at the Minneapolis School of Art; the Academy of Art, and Northern Illinois State university.
