SOC Announces Concert By Noted Ballad Singer

Ashland - A widely known ballad singer, concert artist, folk music arranger and composer will present a public concert at Southern Oregon college, Tuesday, June 26, Dr. Alvin Fellers, director of student affairs announced. Native Kentuckian, John Jacob Niles will sing his mountain ballads in Churchill Hall auditorium at 10 a.m.

The singer, who began his musical career at 15 on the famed Chautauqua circuit, accompanied himself on the dulcimer and sings authentic folk songs which he has been collecting since before World War I. He has been named as the owner of the nation's largest private collection of folk music.

Tracing some of his folk songs back to the fifth century before Christ, Mr. Niles presents a program of varied and universal appeal. This university is indicated by the scope of his concert tours which have ranged from Finland to Canada's Vancouver Island.

William Mootz, critic for the Louisville Courier-Journal, Kentucky, near the singer's home, says that Mr. Niles is "spellbinding."

His musical education was acquired both in this country and abroad - at the Cincinnati Conservatory which recently awarded him an honorary doctor of music degree and at the Universite de Lyon and the Schola Cantorum in Paris.

Mr. Niles' appearance at Southern Oregon is made possible through the summer activity program at SOC as part

of the college's cultural program which brought the modern folksingers, The Limeliters, to the Rogue valley earlier this spring. Unlike The Limeliters' program, the public is invited to attend the Tuesday morning assembly free of charge Dr. Fellers stated.

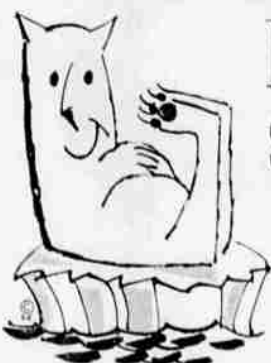
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A free city-wide aquatic testing program is being offered through the YMCA physical department.
