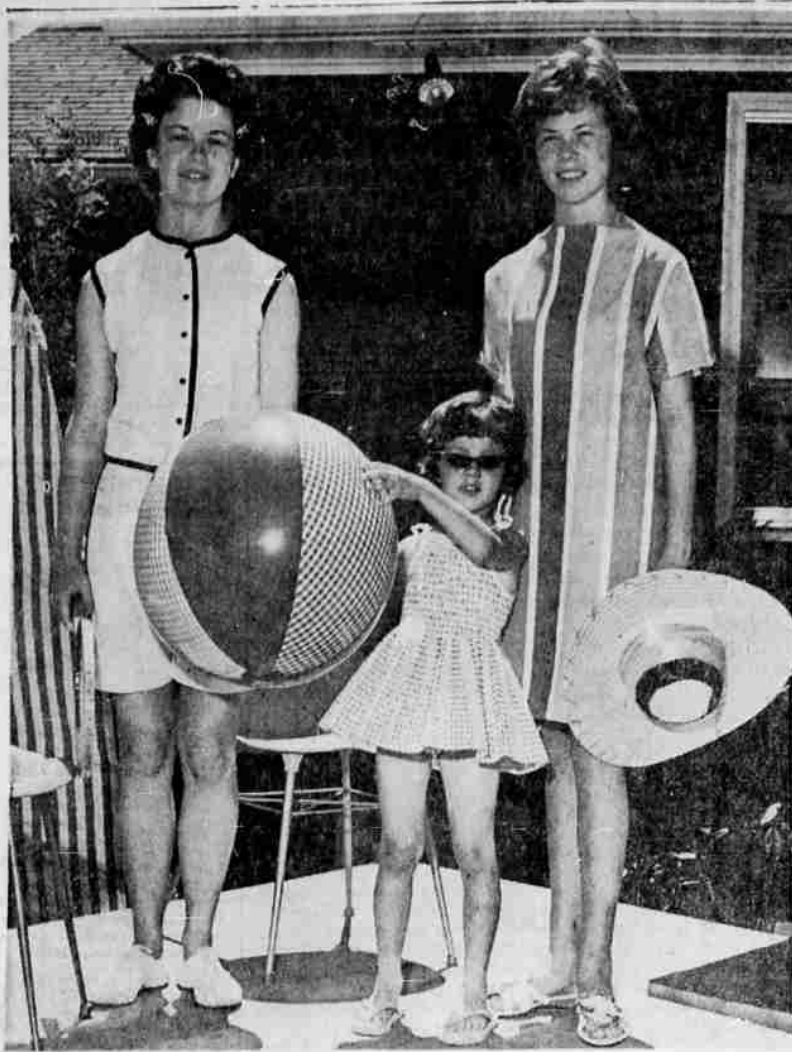

The Smocks have been keeping a diary in recent weeks, which they made into the last letter of a series for The Mail Tribune. First half of the diary-letter was published last week, and the remaining portion follows.

### Speaks

May 15: John spoke at the Rotary club today. The word has spread regarding his whereabouts and availability and his speaking engagements are becoming more and more frequent. Alice had a group in for luncheon at which she served "terribly" American food including a tossed salad, hot rolls and pumpkin pie.

She can't decide whether these women are very polite or if they really do enjoy our eating habits as much as they say. In the evening John attended a lecture on Mycenae at the university. And Alice attended her Council of Adult Education group meeting. It was her turn to be the leader for a discussion of Hemingway's, "The Old Man and The Sea."

May 19: We left the girls with friends and their excitement over spending two weeks without mother and daddy ran high. We were equally thrilled about starting our Barrier Reef holiday.

May 20-23: These days represent a holiday we shall long treasure in our memories. We took the overnight train to Sydney, flew from there to Brisbane where we spent two days with friends enjoying the sights of Queensland.

The climate and growth here are very tropical and reminded us of Hawaii. We continued further north by plane to begin our five-day boat cruise through the Whitsunday passage and out to the Barrier reef. Weatherwise, we once more were in luck, and the days were spent cruising, fishing, playing in the surf, beach combing, etc.

### Six Boats

There were six boats in the fleet, each with a crew of eight and 26 passengers. A more congenial group would be hard to find and by the end of the week, goodbyes were hard to say. Alice found fishing great; she shrieked when she caught a three-foot shark, but was thrilled with the beautiful four-pound coral bass she landed.

The fish were all marked with designs of brilliant colors and were a sight to behold. We were taken over the Barrier reef in glass-bottom boats and all the "ohs" and "ahs" were sincere as we viewed the vivid colored fairland beneath us, a skin diver's paradise.

We spent two days sight seeing in Sydney before returning home. Though it was good to see our family again, it was difficult to adjust to the wintry weather after basking in the sun.

June 4: Today is the Queen's birthday and a public holiday. Her birthday is really in April but it seems the weather here is too unpredictable and since the event is marked with parades and reviews of all types, the date of celebration has been changed.

We had pop-in company all day. Of main interest was a Fulbrighter who will be spending the next school year on an exchange to Redwood City, Calif. The last company of the day were bridge players, so we set up the table and cheered the Queen every time we made a game.

June 12: John was invited to spend the day at Frankston Teachers college. This is where Ernest Miller is librarian and lecturer Alice joined friends for a shopping trip to one of the large open-air markets. The material which she

soon will be wearing as a dress was stripped from a tree trunk where it had been tied for display. An even more curious display were the slacks which, from their hanging places on higher tree branches, were acting as wind socks as the breeze swayed them.

The markets fascinate Alice and she never tires of nosing around in them.

Our trunks are to be picked up in a few days and sent ahead by ship, so we have cut our clothing needs for these final weeks to a bare minimum.

We leave Melbourne on July 28, taking the brand new Southern Aurora train to Sydney. This train has just been completed and is supposed to surpass any other train anywhere in design, performance and modernness.

### Accommodations

We are pleased to have been able to secure accommodations on it. We will meet in Sydney by friends we met on our recent boat cruise and spend the day with them, departing for Honolulu that evening. We are flying to Seattle where we will visit Alice's family and have a look-see at the World's fair before heading south for home, sweet home.

Our social schedule between now and then is so crammed that it "almost" ceases to be fun. It has been a most rewarding year, so meaningful to each of us. Though we are getting eager to greet our families and friends, we are dreading the goodbyes which must soon be faced here.

We hope you have enjoyed sharing some of our experiences with us through these articles and we thank you for being interested enough to read them. We leave you now with a ta-ta (goodbye) and a "oweryagoin", mate!" and will look forward to seeing you in the very near future.

## Art Association Slates Japanese Film for Tonight

A Japanese movie which has been described as "incomparable as a cinematic poem of force" will be shown at the Red Cross auditorium tonight at 8 o'clock under the sponsorship of the Rogue Valley Art association. It is the third of a series of foreign films being brought here by the association as a public service and is being shown without charge.

"The Seven Samurai" is the story of a group of hired knights (or samurai) who defend a village against 40 mounted bandits. Their pay is a few handfuls of rice. Pauline Kael, considered one of America's leading film critics, wrote of this movie that the "Seven Samurai" is "like a brutal and imaginative ballet on fighting and the nature of strength and weakness, so complex visually that you can't take your eyes away."

Directed by Akira Kurosawa, the film took more than a year to make and was the biggest film ever made in Japan at that time. Many consider it one of the best films ever made, not just in Japan but in the world. The film itself has been universally praised and Kurosawa has been called the greatest of all contemporary film craftsmen for his use of the horizon for compositional variety. "The seemingly infinite camera angles, the compositions that are alive with action, the almost abstract use of trees, flowers, sky, rain, mud and moving

figures are all active." Because this Japanese film bears a resemblance to an American western, critics have called it an "Eastern Western." Miss Kael said of this "It is the Western form carried to apotheosis—a vast celebration of the joys and torments of fighting, seen in new depth and scale, yet preserving the wonderful chivalric simplicity of the Western plot, which is even more wonderful in the nuclear age."

A short will also be shown, and coffee will be served.

## University Production Opening Soon

"My Three Angels," the first Carnival theatre production to play in the new Outdoor Grove theatre at the University of Oregon, will open June 29.

The curtain will rise on the comedy at 7:30 p.m. (PST). There are no reserved seats, and seating will be on a first-come, first served basis.

"My Three Angels" is actually the first production of the new Carnival theatre, since "Show Boat," presented June 22-23, was a revival of a May production of the University theatre.

The three-act comedy, written by Sam and Bella Spewack, takes place in the rear of a general store in Cayenne, French Guiana in December, 1910. Three convicts happen to overhear a French family discussing the problems involved in caring for a relative's store, and a young girl's romantic woes. The three "angels" decide to step in and remedy the problems, and their "solutions" evoke some hilarious scenes.
