Mamie B.—After 30 years, you'd think he'd eat peas with a fork.

Fred B.—She's not going to turn me into a Mr. Emily Post!

Mamie B.—After 30 years of marriage I find I'm still tied to a savage. I knew he was a boor when I first met him. One visit to his family and I realized Fred and his brothers had no bringing-up, no training in manners or politeness. But he was a good sport and I figured married life would civilize him.

But when it comes to rudeness and vulgar behavior, you name it and Fred shows it. His shoes still go up on the living-room couch. His clothes are draped anywhere he wishes. He grew up without closets and he acts as though he doesn't know what they're for.

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The Council: Just because Mamie is on the warpath now about Fred's inconsiderate manners and mannerisms, Fred can't assume she's "happy" about them all those 30 years. She may merely have been plotting her strategy. Wrong, unattended to, don't automatically turn into rights. Fred has the comfortable notion that Mamie's tolerance of his behavior made it all right. One can tolerate a boil on one's neck but that doesn't mean it's good and should be there.

So let's forget about the 30 years of outward silence and inward seething. It's over. How help these two face the next 30 years with a chance at some real rapport? Up to now the ties between them seem to have been mainly surface ones. But there are waiting to be hitched up. Bridging the gap by means of two-sided effort will be more worthwhile than continuing as Mamie suggests each going his own rugged and selfish way.

As matters stand, the B's are playing a too-familiar marital game called Getting-Each-Other's-Goose. Fred ignores the justness of Mamie's suggestions (there is some), attributes her pickiness to change of life, and keeps on doing what comes naturally. This naturally keeps Mamie pouncing on his every "move," intensifying her campaign to make the poor guy over.

Stock harking back, Mamie, to Fred's upbringing. By now you should know he didn't marry you to get civilized, but rather to get a partner—someone who'd accept him pretty much as he is, grateful for any small modifications that might take hold. And just to eliminate the possibility that your own pettishness is due to your own menapausal fears and discomforts, go to a doctor. If per chance there's a physical reason for your being hypercritical of Fred, he'll have to concede there's also a valid reason for your being plain critical. He'll have to admit he's been sloppy.

And you, Fred, had best look at this contest on its merits. It needn't be a battle of egos—Fancy-Schmancy-Mamie vs. Plain-Simple-Ole-Fred. It's a battle of issues, good ones. Orderliness is an essential of a peaceful home. So be restraint and respect.

Republicans Join In Urging Support For Hanford Plant

Washington—(UPI)—Republican House members from Washington and Oregon joined Monday in urging congressional support for a plan to let a public utility group build and operate an electric generating plant using surplus steam from the Hanford, Wash., plutonium reactor.

Reps. Walter Norblad (R-Ore.) and Thor C. Tollefson, Tom Pelly and Jack Westland (all R-Wash.) and Edwin R. Durso (R-Ore.) endorsed remarks on the House floor by Rep. Catherine May (R-Wash.) in which she said the plan was a good one.

Their comments came shortly before release of an Appropriations committee hearing record in which the plan was denounced as a giveaway and praised as a sound compromise on which the taxpayers cannot lose.

According to the transcript, Rep. John R. Pillion (R-N.Y.) called proposed charges for the surplus steam "altogether unrealistic" and unfair to the government, which is spending about \$195 million to build the plutonium plant.

Contention Denied—Pillion told Charles D. Luce, administrator of the Bonneville Power administration.

Stevenson Elected Honorary Member—Ashland—Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson, Southern Oregon college president, was elected an honorary member of the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America during their recent annual meeting.

Considered one of professional scouting's highest awards, honorary membership was conferred on Dr. Stevenson for his life long interest in scouting and outdoor education.

Dr. Stevenson has been associated with scouting for 44 years and has been on the Executive Council of the Crater Lake district for several years.

Hospital Escapees Have Brief Freedom—Salem—(UPI)—Two persons fled from the State Hospital Sunday by lowering themselves from a third floor window with sheets but were apprehended a short time later by state police.

They were identified as Gloria Barkley, 40, who was convicted in the slaying of her mother on the Klamath Indian Reservation in 1953 and a 16-year-old Eugene girl.
