TVA Uses 'Copter For Line Patrol

Knoxville, Tenn., (UPI) - The work day of a professional helicopter pilot can be a constant battle with sunbathers, moonshiners, skittish horses and frightened chickens.

Al Marcoux, a transplanted New Englander who began flying planes at the tender age of 14, flew the Himalaya Hump in World War II and has tried just about every stunt possible with a helicopter. But his relatively sedate title of Chief Helicopter Pilot and Instructor for the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) has exposed him to a lot of problems he never knew existed.

Marcoux, based at Muscle Shoals, Ala., is one of two TVA 'copter pilots with more than 10,000 accident-free helicopter flight hours-believed to be a record. He made his helicopter solo flight in 1947 just two hours and 40 minutes after his first lesson started.

Before coming to TVA 11 years ago, Marcoux used helicopters for such things as a mercy mission to ice-d-in families off the coast of Rhode Island in 1948. On Thanksgiving day, 1950, his 'copter carried the Brown university football mascot—a caged bear cub—and touched down on the football field as a half-time stunt.

TVA found a new use for his talents. Marcoux patrols the huge agency's transmission lines, provides transportation for malaria control spray work, inspects giant smoke stacks at TVA steam plants, makes air pollution studies and conducts a flying taxi service for a constant stream of prominent visitors at TVA installations.

Once near Kentucky Lake he unintentionally flushed a pair of startled sunbathers. A few farmers in remote mountain areas have taken potshots at his craft. Once he flew too near a hidden moonshine whisky still and almost relived his wartime days.

"I guess they thought we were revenueurs," he said, "but those boys are pretty used to us now. They know we're not interested in them. Some of them even wave now and then."

Youngster Drowns At Oxbow Hatchery

ASKED FOR SUSPENSION

Washington - (UPI) - Maurice A. Hutcheson, president of the AFL-CIO Carpenters Union, has asked that his six-month jail sentence and \$500 fine for contempt of Congress be suspended. The 64-year-old labor leader's request for probation was filed in U.S. District Court Tuesday, the day after the Supreme Court refused to reconsider a decision upholding his conviction.
