Cincinnati Disputes Ump Ruling

San Francisco—(UPI)—Thanks to a hotly contested call at home plate, the San Francisco Giants were back in first place today but you can't prove it by manager Fred Hutchinson of the Cincinnati Reds.

Hutchinson, catcher John Edwards and most of the other Reds jostled the umpires Tuesday night during a big argument after Felipe Alou was declared safe at home in Orlando Cepeda's hit to right field which gave the Giants a 6-5 win in the 10th inning. "Alou never was safe," Edwards said. "Go out now and take a look at the dirt. He never touched home plate."

"He was out," fumed manager Hutchinson, standing near a garbage pail which had been booted over in the Reds' dressing room.

"The pictures in the papers should show whether he was safe or not," commented manager Alvin Dark of the Giants.

San Francisco tried to dig deeper into top spot today and went after its fifth straight win when lefty Mike McCormick (4-2) faced Ted Wills (0-0) of the Reds.

Willie McCovey put the go-ahead run on base as he opened the 10th with a single. Dark sent Alou in to run for him and Felipe was off on a hit-run play as soon as Cepeda had sent a looping hit out to right center.

As Lou whirled around the bags, centerfielder Vada Pinson fired the ball to shortstop Leo Cardenas who relayed it to Edwards.

Alou slid and umpire Ed Sudol sent the crowd of 15,967—and the Reds—into a frenzy with the magic "safe" sign.

In other action, league-leading Indianapolis nicked hosting Denver, 8-7, in 13 innings, and visiting Louisville slammed Oklahoma City, 7-3. At Omaha, the lop-sided Ranger victory in the second tilt featured four home runs. Leo Burke smacked a solo in the third frame; Wayne Graham slugged another with one on in the fifth; Sandy Valdespino got a two-run blast in the sixth, and Mickey Harrington hit a round-tripper with two aboard in the seventh.
