

Studs Entertain Falcons Tonight

Central Point - Central Point Cheney Studs will try to atone to a measure for a couple of previous setbacks this evening when they entertain the Klamath Falls Falcons in American Legion jun-

ior baseball at Memorial field, White City. The two clubs meet in a single Area 4, Southern division ruckus. It is set for 7:30 p.m. Klamath, which sports a 10-3 full season record to Central Point's 5-7, defeated the Studs 3 to 1 in a non-counter in early June. However, the Cheney team has won more of the scuffles that really count. The Studs are 3-1 and in second place in the division. The Falcons rank third with 2-2.

Close scores in the early meetings and the fact that Central Point holds wins over Medford and Grants Pass, which in turn have tipped the Falcons, are indications that neither team can be called the favorite tonight.

Both clubs with the games now behind them are considered at their season peaks. They are both very much in the division race. A loss would be damaging to Central Point at this stage and bordering on disastrous to Falcon pennant hopes.

Klamath enters the tussle with the more impressive statistical record. Kent Franklin is the batting leader with .400. Lanny Guyer is .356. Larry Binney .333, Sherm Allen .326, Dave Sacks .318 and Terry Maw .303. Marv Edwards is .500 and Kent Hunsaker .375 for fewer appearances. The team is hitting .321.

Lou Alvarez, .333, and Pat Pepper, .309, are top hitters for the Studs. Mike Clines is .257, Neil Rivenburg .240 and Jeff Anhorn .225. The squad is .203. While the average at present is not impressive, it is climbing.

Pitching Records Shown Marv Edwards and Jim Jackson are the leading Falcon pitchers with 3-1 records. Gary Benson is 2-0. Edwards likely will pitch against the Studs tonight. Central Point tossers are Mike Pepper, 2-2, Larry Pepper, 2-3, Larry Mason, 1-2, and Coach Bill Askwith has announced his choice among them this evening. Mike Pepper has a 1.82 earned run average. Larry Pepper is 2.59 and Mason 4.27.
