Yanks Split But Gain Lead In American League Chase

Remember the "nickel World Series?"

Well, in the old days, before all those franchise changes, the league-leading Giants and Yankees would seem to be headed for one.

But they're 3,000 miles apart now and if they do go on to win all it will cost you is \$159.61 (tax included) to get from one ball park to the other.

Don't feel so depressed, though. It still could be an all-Los Angeles series. The Dodgers and Angels are right up there, and if they ever land in the World Series together they'll play in the same park.

A lot of good that does all you baseball fans in Puncstunawney, Pa.

Actually, it's still anybody's race in both leagues. If you don't believe it, take a look at the leaders:

Even though they split a doubleheader with the Angels Sunday, the Yankees took over first place in the AL for the first time since June 15—with an assist from Cleveland right fielder Gene Green, whom we'll get to later.

The Yankees copped the opener, 6-3, then dropped the nightcap, 12-5. The White Sox swept two from the Indians, 5-4 and 7-6, while the Twins checked a four-game backslide with a 9-0 decision over the Senators. Detroit moved into fifth place with a 3-2 win over Baltimore, and Kansas City beat Boston, 9-5.

The Giants held on to the top spot in the NL with a 5-4 victory over the Phillies while the Dodgers stayed close by beating the Mets, 5-1. Pittsburgh outscored St. Louis, 7-2; Cincinnati hurled Houston, 6-1, and Milwaukee blanked Chicago, 1-0.

Ralph Terry won his 10th for the Yankees in the opener with the help of home runs by Tom Tresh and Hector Lopez off loser Don Lee. The Angels trailed until the eighth inning of the nightcap when they scored four runs and then tacked on four more in the ninth. Winner Art Fowler drove in four runs with singles in the eighth and ninth. Leon Wagner hit his 22nd homer in the opener and his 23rd in the nightcap.

Camilo Carreon's bases-loaded triple with two out in the ninth enabled the White Sox to come from behind in the first game and the second game was just as much of a nightmare for the Indians, who have lost five in a row and 10 of their last 15.

The White Sox clinched the nightcap with six runs in the fifth inning, four of the runs being unearned when Green dropped two fly balls. Turk Lown and Juan Pizarro were the winning pitchers.

Camilo Pascual, a good bet to be the starting pitcher for the AL All-Stars, scored his 12th victory for the Twins with a five-hitter against the Senators. The Twins collected 13 hits, including homers by Harmon Killebrew, Lenny Green, Bernie Allen and Bob Allison.

Preserves Tiger Victory
Reliever Terry Fox retired Brooks Robinson with the bases full and two out in the last of the ninth to preserve the Tigers' victory over the Orioles. Rocky Colavito's 17th homer off loser Robin Roberts helped Jim Bunning to his eighth victory.

Earl Wilson, making his first start for the Red Sox after his no-hitter, was kayed in the seventh inning by the A's. Kansas City rallied for five runs in that frame as Bobby Del Greco and George Alusik each homered and Ed Charles tripled. Gordon Jones was the winner and Dick Radatz the loser.

Willie Mays' two-run single in the eighth off loser Al Mahaffey gave the Giants a come-from-behind victory over the Phillies. Ed Bailey hit his fourth homer in five games for the Giants while Ted Savage and Billy Klaus connected for the Phils. Reliever Don Larsen won his fourth game.

Tail-End KF Hawks Nip Medford Nine; Cokes Bill Falcons

Bob Woldt in the ninth inning with the run that gave the Klamath Falls Hawks a 13 to 12 nod over the Cokes at Klamath Falls. It was the first victory in five division counting games for the Hawks and Medford second loss in six.

Medford came back to thump the Hawks 20 to 3 in the second frames of the doubleheader but the contest had no bearing on the standings.

The Cokes still cling to the driver's seat in the Legion league. But they play the second place Klamath Falls Falcons on Tuesday evening at 7:30 o'clock at Memorial field, White City. And, the Falcons (3-2) can take over the lead by licking the Medford nine.

Extra Innings

The counter at KF yesterday was billed for seven innings. The clubs went into the frame knotted at 9 to 9. Each shoved across a tally to send play into extra session. Medford made it 12 to 10 with markers in the top of the ninth on two walks, an error and Mike Neathamer's single. In the bottom of the frame, Woldt tripled after two bases on balls. That tied the mix again and Gray's one-baser won it.

Medford's run in the seventh was on a hit by Tom Barker, sacrifices by Bob King and Dan Miles and a single by Dick Deffley. For the KF marker Marv Yuncik tripled and there was an error on Jim Streak's squeeze. Each team had a four-run inning.

Woldt and Gray led a 15-hit attack with four for five each. The Cokes whacked 13 safe blows with Miles awaiting three for five and Deffley, Neathamer, Ron Phipps and Barker each getting two hits.

In the second game Medford got 10 runs in the second inning on doubles by Deffley, Neathamer and Gary Miller, a single by Ron Edmonds, three walks, a hit batter, an error and a fielder's option. Medford collected 11 hits in the fray with Miles, Phipps, Bob Schroeder and Edmonds slapping two each. Ten bases on balls, given up by KF losers, aided the Cokes. Jim Calhoun did the pitching for the short-handed Medford club and limited the Hawks to six blows.

Coach McLean indicated that Stuart Young will pitch for the Cokes against the KF Falcons tomorrow night. Mary Edwards may be his mound opponent.

10 In Second

Koufax was expected to sit down today with E. J. (Buzzie) Bavasi, Dodger vice president and general manager, to tear up his existing contract so the club can "do something for Sandy"—as Buzzie put it. League rules prohibit across-the-board bonus payments.

"This is the greatest thing that has happened to an individual Dodger since the team came West," Bavasi enthused Sunday. On Saturday Koufax shook up the baseball world with a 13-strikeout no-hitter as the Dodgers beat the New York Mets, 5-0.

Koufax never permitted a runner beyond first base and pitched to only 30 batters—walking five men.

Cupit, a 24-year-old from Longview, Texas, found new vigor when he sank the putt, estimated variously between 40 and 50 feet, to birdie the 15th hole on Medinah's rugged No. 3 course in the final four-hole round.

The putt pulled him even again with challenging Billy Casper, who had made up a six stroke deficit in 15 holes and who was heading toward a course record.

These were the only two players in the starting field of 135 to break par for the 72 holes, and Cupit, with rounds of 68, 70, 71 and 71, was the only player who did not go over par on at least one round of the 7,110 yard links.

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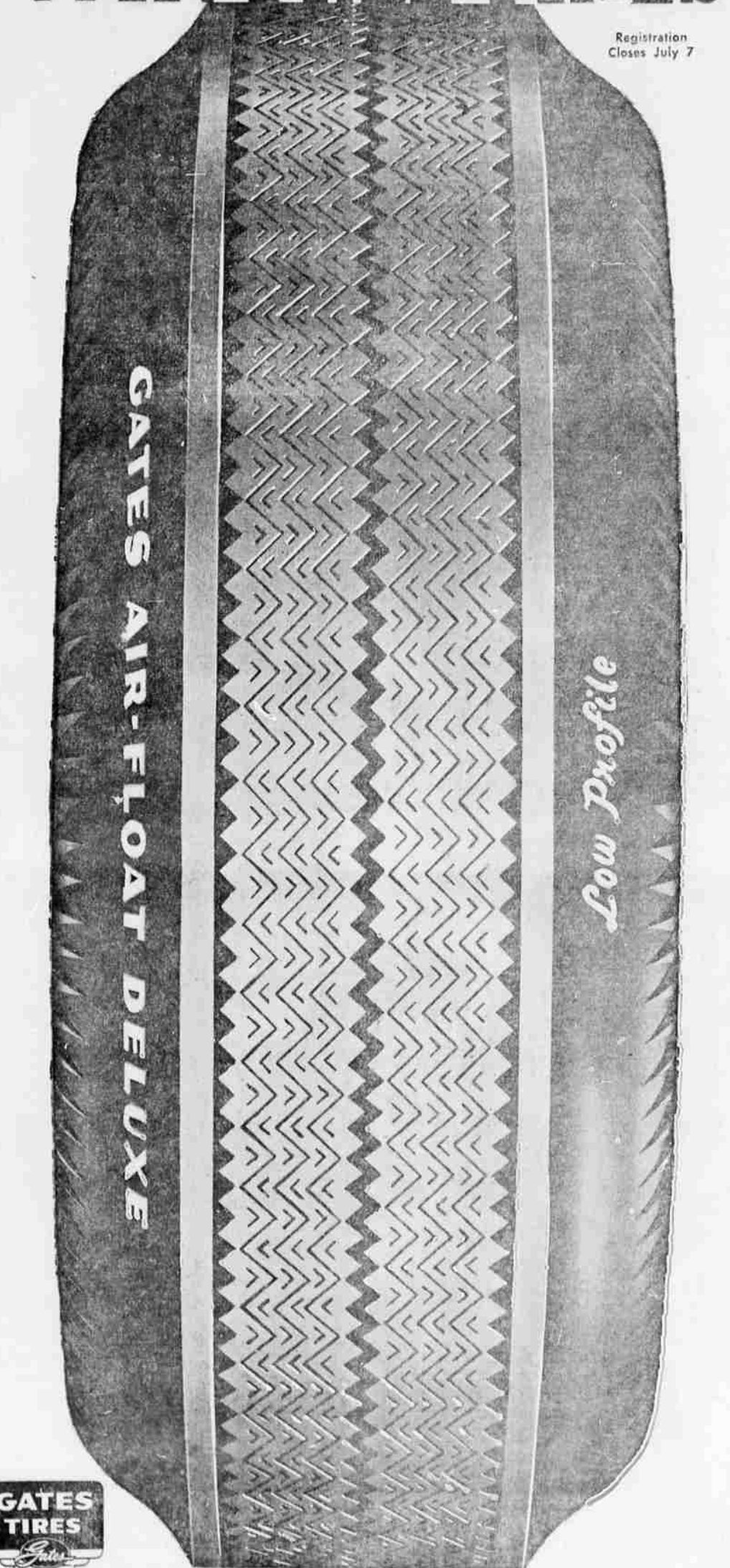
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
