

# Escape Attempt of San Quentin Prisoners Thwarted

## Businessmen Criticize Part Of JFK's Tax Revision Plan

Washington (UPI) — Business spokesmen Monday renewed their criticism before Congress of sections of the Kennedy administration's tax revision bill.

They testified before the Senate Finance Committee on a proposal to change the system of collecting taxes on American subsidiaries operating overseas.

This provision would require American-owned companies abroad to pay U.S. corporate taxes on income from royalties, patents and other "passive" income in the year earned. It also would tax immediately income from sales subsidiaries as distinguished from manufacturing subsidiaries in foreign countries.

A. E. Kornhauser, of the Controls Co. of America, an electronics firm, testified that this would "reduce the scope of operations of foreign base companies and would further restrict the legitimate business of American companies abroad."

Administration leaders have said the tax is not new. The provision is aimed at capturing taxes on earnings of subsidiaries the same year rather than wait until the money is channeled to the parent corporation.

Other developments:

**Rusk** — Secretary of state Dean Rusk appeared before the House foreign affairs committee to deliver a closed briefing in his recent 10-day trip to western Europe. There was no immediate disclosure of what Rusk told the congressmen about his talks with leaders in France, Britain, West Germany and Portugal.

## Bold Effort To Flee Death Row Ends in Failure

San Quentin (UPI) — Six Death Row inmates at San Quentin prison took two guards hostage in a bold effort to escape early today and surrendered three hours later amid a barrage of tear gas shells.

"We gambled and we lost," said Luis Moya, one of the six convicts. "We were going out the gates."

They also surrendered two guns they had taken from one of the hostages, gun rail officer C. L. Deatrick. Deatrick was struck on the head by the inmates but not seriously injured.

"We wanted to get out," Warden Fred Dickson quoted the inmates as saying. "We didn't have much to lose. We're all going to be executed anyway."

Dickson said the plans of the six men went awry when they discovered that the hostage guards did not have keys to the two heavy doors which seal off death row.

## Eight Petitions To Get Issues on November Ballot Said To Be Failures

Salem (UPI) — At least eight of the 11 initiative petitions seeking to get issues on the November ballot have failed, a survey by United Press International revealed today.

Sponsors of one of three remaining initiative petitions announced they have obtained the necessary 42,000 signatures. This petition declares steelhead a game fish in Oregon, and would restrict the catch on the Columbia river.

Reported close to success were petitions for a new system of legislative reapportionment, and for repeal of the school district reorganization law.

Sponsors of the eight other petitions, including two barring daylight time, threw in the towel.

Mrs. Florence Reed Cook, Eugene, said Saturday she had given up her petition to repeal the 1961 optional time law, and make standard time mandatory, throwing support to the second standard time petition circulated by Elmer McClure, Milwaukie, and others.

But McClure reported today that his petition drive has also failed. Of the 53,000 signatures needed, his standard time committee gathered only about 40,000, he said.

Other petitions that failed would have made car insurance compulsory in Oregon; lower the voting age from 21 to 18; provide a \$600 bonus for Korean war veterans; set up a system of public credit in lieu of taxes; license medical technicians; allowed cities which take over transportation systems to continue pensions of retired employees.

**No Chance, Says Warden**

He said the convicts, finding this strategy foiled, planned to use their hostages to persuade prison officials to open the doors and let the six convicted murderers walk out of the prison.

But, Dickson said, San Quentin policy is that even the warden could be shot and guards would still not be authorized to open the gates and let inmates walk out.

The tear gas, Dickson said, was the principal reason the convicts surrendered.

The first sign of trouble came when Roy B. Kardell, the guard assigned to Death Row, telephoned at 1:07 a.m. and said urgently, "We're in trouble." Deatrick went to his aid and moments later associate Warden Dale Frady learned that both men were hostages.

**Seize Weapons**

The prisoners took a 38-caliber revolver and a 12-gauge shotgun from Deatrick.

More than a dozen guards, led by Associate Warden Louis Nelson, missed on a ledge outside the row of cells occupied by the condemned men and fired tear gas into the cell area at 2:45 a.m.

The prisoners responded with a telephoned plea to Warden Fred Dickson to "knock it off." They said they would release the hostages when guards stopped firing tear gas.

The six involved in the escape plot were identified as Moya, Clyde Bates, Manuel Chavez, Augustine Baldonado, Willard Winhoven, and David Bickley. All six are convicted murderers.

**Order Restored**

James Neiswonger, supervisor of the parole violator unit, said the prisoners returned to their cells at 4:07 a.m. and order was restored.

He said only the six condemned men participated in the attempted break, and that other death row prisoners were urging them to give up after the tear gas was fired.

The six got out of their cells by sawing the bars with a hacksaw. It was not known how or where they obtained the hacksaw. Five of them sawed their way out and they broke the lock on Winhoven's cell and released him.

Then they overpowered Kardell and after that, Deatrick, who was on duty on a gun rail within the cell block. Neiswonger said they probably struck Deatrick from behind with some instrument.

The prisoners, in agreeing to surrender, asked only that they not be harmed and that no reprisals be taken against them.

Neiswonger said that it was unlikely the men would be punished.

**SOVIET EMBASSY RESIDENCE IN FRANCE LOOTED**  
Versailles, France (UPI)—Burglars got into the Soviet embassy summer residence at Brunoy Sunday night and made off with about \$80 worth of loot, police said.

The loot included a lacquered wooden box, several bottles of liquor and a quantity of cigarettes and cigars.

**COMMISSION OF JURISTS TO MEET**  
Geneva (UPI)—The international Commission of Jurists will convene an international congress in Rio de Janeiro beginning Dec. 11, according to an announcement here.

A spokesman said the meeting, to run through Dec. 15, will consider "executive action and the rule of law."

**GERMAN POSTAL WORKERS PLAN SLOWDOWN**  
Frankfurt, Germany (UPI)—About 300,000 German postal workers planned to begin a three-day slowdown today to support their demands for higher wages. The postal workers union urged its members to engage in the slowdown by adhering strictly to all rules and regulations.

**CHICAGO MAN SENTENCED IN SPAIN**  
Madrid (UPI)—A Spanish civil tribunal today sentenced William Bass of Chicago to a year in prison for twice tearing down a photograph of Generalissimo Francisco Franco, a court spokesman reported.

Bass, 37, was convicted of "offenses to the chief of state."

**Stocks Fractionally Mixed on Opening**

New York (UPI) — Most stocks were fractionally mixed in moderate morning trading on the "Big Board" today.

Leading steels, autos and oils showed little change but chemicals slanted lower with Du Pont and Union Carbide off a point and Hercules Power down 1/4. A plurality of the rails and utilities managed small gains.

Most of the fast moving glamour stocks moved less than a point in both directions. However IBM climbed 2 1/2. Foxboro gained 1 1/2 and Texas Instruments lost a point.
