Star Berth For Musial 19th Time

Cincinnati, Ohio—(UPI)—Stan (the man) Musial, walloping the ball at a 330 clip despite the fact he's 41 years old, was picked today for a record 19th time to be a member of the National League All-Star team that will meet the American league at Washington, July 10.

Manager Fred Hutchinson of the pennant-winning Cincinnati Reds, skipper of the NL team, today exercised his right to pick the squad's reserves and pitchers—and in general stuck pretty close to the voting by the league players that picked the starting lineup.

Hutch came up with one surprise—Sandy (No Hit) Koufax of the Los Angeles Dodgers was the only southpaw among the seven pitchers he selected.

But the selection of Musial was no surprise. There have been times in the past when NL managers were accused of picking Stan the Man simply on sentiment, but this year he is swinging like the Musial of old with a .330 batting average through Sunday's game.

Thanks to the recent practice of two All-Star games in one year, Musial has played in a total of 22 classics during the 18 previous years he was picked. Both figures are records for a player in either major league.

Hutchinson today selected seven pitchers and 10 other players to go along with the eight starting players picked by the NL players in their own poll.

The NL 25-man squad thus will have a heavy West Coast flavor with 10 players from teams in that area—five each from the Dodgers and San Francisco Giants.

Australians In Tennis Semifinals

Wimbledon, England—UPI—Rod Laver and Marty Mulligan blasted out straight-set victories over the Fraser brothers, Neale and Dr. John, in all-Australian matches today to advance to the men's singles final in the Wimbledon tennis championship.

Wimbledon, England—UPI—Rod Laver, shooting for a unique tennis grand slam, met Neale Fraser and Marty Mulligan met Dr. John Fraser Wednesday in all-Australian men's singles semifinals matches of the Wimbledon tennis championship.

Laver, who hopes to become the first player since Don Budge in 1938 to win the Australian, French, English and American titles in the same year, was favored to beat Neale Fraser, a former champion here, who ousted American collegiate champion Raphael Osuna of Mexico in the quarterfinals.

The other semi-final match between Dr. John Fraser, Neale's "kid brother," and young Mulligan, is rated a toss-up.

Women Play Thursday

Laver, the No. 1 seed here and the defending champion, reached the semifinals via victories over Tony Pickard of England, Whitney Reed of Alameda, Calif., Pierre Darnon of France and Manuel Santana of Spain. Reed and Santana were considered his toughest opponents through the draw, and barring an upset, he is a cut-and-dried favorite to go all the way and add the English title to his Australian and French victories.

The women's singles semifinals are scheduled for Thursday with Vera Sukova, the unseeded Czechoslovakian housewife who scored a stunning upset over Darlene Hard of Long Beach, Calif., Tuesday, meeting former champion Maria Bueno of Brazil and Karen Hantze Sussman of San Antonio, Tex., playing Ann Haydon of Britain.

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Row Team Hopes Tape Stays Fast

Henley, England—UPI—Members of the Detroit Boat Club were hoping to avoid a swim in the River Thames today when they faced Kingston of England in the Thames cup competition that opened the historic Henley Royal Regatta.

Twenty-five rips were discovered in the Detroiters' shell after its 3,500 mile flight here and crewmen repaired it themselves with sticky tape and glue.

Ken Blue, the club's coach, reported that the shell "held together okay in practice" but he admitted he would keep his fingers crossed during today's opening heat for lightweight eights.

Fifty Detroit club members flew from the states to root for their boys, the only private American club in this year's regatta. The rest represent U.S. colleges and schools.

Massachusetts Institute of Technology, winner of the Thames Cup in 1954 and 1955, opened its bid for another title against University College of Dublin, the fastest crew in the Emerald Isle this year.

Phillips Academy of Andover, Mass., was pitted against New College St. Peter's of England in its opening heat. Washington and Lee High School of Arlington, Va., drew a first round bye.

In the grand challenge cup for heavyweight eights, Yale university and the University of Pennsylvania wound up in the same half of the draw with the defending champion Soviet Navy crew.

Experts predicted that both Yale and Penn will have to improve fast to defeat the Russians. The U.S. crews had trouble handling the choppy conditions of the river during workouts this week.

Russians Face Yank Oarsmen

Philadelphia—UPI—Soviet oarsmen met their Yankee Doodle dandy counterparts on the Schuylkill river today in an international regatta marking the birthday of American freedom.

The Russians tossed their champion eight-oared shell against four American and one Canadian crew, and primed Vyacheslav Ivanov, world's champion in the single sculls for an iron man stint in both the singles and doubles, spaced one hour apart.

Rowing diplomacy was strained in the 24 hours before the meet when the Russians asked that one American shell in each race be designated as the official U.S. representative, with the international aspect determined by the finish of the Soviets and the designated boat, regardless of other placings.

Agreement
American officials, balking at the demand, hoped the problem would be solved without such designation and that the winner of each of the three races would be declared the winner, per se.

Later, it was agreed that Washington and Cornell would be the official U.S. representatives in the eights; Lake Washington and Vesper club in the doubles and Seymour Cromwell and Robert Lea in 3rd in the singles.

Ivanov, Russia's single sculls champion in the 1956 and the 1960 Olympics readied himself for the two races as a result of the illness of Alexander Perkov, bow man of the Soviet doubles.

NEWPORT, N. J., (UPI)—Unseated Neferiti, a two-hyte among 12 minor ocean racers, and the veteran Weatherly paired off today in the third of a series of America's Cup yacht observation trials off Newport. Neferiti took the measure of Weatherly Tuesday by 2 minutes, 37 seconds, while Weatherly was whipping Columbia, the 1958 cup defender, 1:22 minutes, 44 seconds.

MAJORS ACQUIRE TWO

San Francisco's Giants Eye First Place Chance

San Francisco—UPI—Bob Bolin, an erstwhile relief pitcher, drew an important starting assignment today in the San Francisco Giants' plans to sand-bag the hapless New York Mets twice and regain first place in the National league pennant chase.

The fire-balling Bolin (2-0) was to be coupled with lefty Billy O'Dell (9-6) or Jim Duff-

alo (1-2) in the twin-bill. For the Mets it was Jay Hook (6-8) and Willard Hunter (1-3).

But at the same time, the Los Angeles Dodgers had a golden chance to increase their half-game lead over the Giants when they played the Philadelphia Phillies twice.

Jack Sanford, who had failed to go the distance in his last two starts, went all the way Tuesday in pitching the Giants to a 10-1 victory over

the Mets. He gave up nine hits but three double plays, plus 13 Giant safeties, helped hefty Jack roll to his eighth win against six losses.

Sanford pitched good ball and held them close while we got him the runs," said Manager Alvin Dark, who has denied reports that the right-hander is in his doghouse.

The Giants got to loser Al Jackson (4-0) for seven runs and 10 hits, driving him to

cover after four and one-third innings.

Jim Davenport and Felipe Alou provided the biggest jolts in a game that saw the Giants outscore the Mets 15 to 9. Davenport crashed a two-run triple, his second in as many games, to highlight a fourth-inning attack which saw the Giants tally four times.

Then Alou piked his 15th home run in the eighth with a

man aboard while the Mets were giving up three more tallies.

The blast came off Wilmer Mizell, the third New York hurler to work, and followed a bizarre play in which Orlando Cepeda's pop fly dropped between Mizell and first baseman Marv Throneberry for a run-scoring single.
