Ladies Have Wimbledon Semifinals

Wimbledon, England—(UPI)—Karen Hantze Susman became the first American woman in three years to reach Saturday's Wimbledon women's singles final today. Mrs. Vera Sukova of Czechoslovakia upset Maria Bueno of Brazil to win the other berth in the championship round.

Mrs. Susman had little difficulty eliminating Ann Haydon of England, 6-5, 6-1, while Mrs. Sukova, a sturdy 31-year-old Czech housewife, scored a surprise 6-4, 6-3 victory over Miss Bueno, who had won this tournament in 1959 and 1960.

Wimbledon, England—(UPI)—Karen Hantze Susman of San Antonio, Tex., was gunning for revenge when she met England's Ann Haydon today in the women's singles semi-finals of the Wimbledon tennis championships.

The other semi-final pits Vera Sukova, an unseeded Czechoslovakian, against two-time champion Maria Bueno of Brazil.

Mrs. Susman, the last American survivor in either singles division, lost to Miss Haydon in this year's Wightman Cup matches.

Mrs. Susman also wanted to get even with Miss Haydon for knocking teammate Billie Jean Moffitt of Long Beach, Calif., out of the tournament. Miss Moffitt, who upset top-seeded Margaret Smith of Australia in the second round, dropped a 6-3, 6-1 decision to Miss Haydon in Tuesday's quarterfinals.

Mrs. Sukova also reached the semi-finals at the expense of an American — surprising second-seeded Darlene Hard of Long Beach, Calif., 6-4, 6-3. Mrs. Susman advanced with a 6-4, 6-4, victory over Renee Schuurman of South Africa and Miss Bueno, the champion here in 1959 and 1960, defeated Lesley Turner of Australia, 2-6, 6-4, 6-2.

Russians Sweep in Regatta

Philadelphia — (UPI)—For Russian Olympic champion Vyacheslav Ivanov, it was like pitching both games of a baseball doubleheader — and winning.

Ivanov, a 24-year-old tool-maker with stamina to spare, rowed to an impressive two-length victory in the singles of the Independence Day International regatta on the Schuylkill river Wednesday before 50,000 spectators.

Then, subbing for an ailing teammate, he took over at bow in the doubles as the Soviets stroked to an easy 1 1/4 length victory.

Combined with a comeback triumph in the eight-car event, the Soviet oarsmen made a clean sweep of the International regatta.
