Looking all of her 18 years, Cheryl posed in a bikini but was demurely covered with a serape, or cape, over her shoulders.

The new job pays her \$27.50 for two hours work, plus commissions.

Tall and shapely, Cheryl

she hoped the new job would lead to an acting career.

Asked about hiring Miss Crane, a spokesman for the club said, "It's not costing much, and I'll get thousands of dollars in free publicity."

Living On Own

Miss Crane, a pretty brunette, said she was on good terms with both her mother and father, restaurateur Steve Crane. She said she was not living at home and had been on her own for two months, not accepting help from her parents.

"I don't live at home," she said. "I share a small house in West Hollywood with another girl. I want to make good on my own."

Cheryl was 14 when she was a central figure in the Stompanato case. A coroner's jury ruled her fatal stabbing of Stompanato, then her mother's boyfriend, was justifiable in that the girl was trying to protect her mother.

Tapioa Favored as Fruit Pie Thickener

Fruit and berry juices must be thickened just right for complete pie success. Most fruits and berries require a thickener if the juice is not to spread out thinly over plates when pie is cut.

All of the available berries are fine in pies. Peaches, apricots, pie cherries and plums beckon the pie maker. How about mixing berries or mixing berries and fruit?

Many prefer quick-cooking tapioa as a pie filling thickener because it protects the bright fruit or berry color. It doesn't cloud as some thickeners do. It is time-saving and easy to use because there's no pre-cooking.

3 to 4 cups prepared berries or fruit
1 to 1 1/2 cups sugar
1 to 2 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioa
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon butter or cream

Unbaked pastry for 2 crusts
Prepare pie crust from favorite recipe or mix. Prepare fruit. Combine all dry ingredients, adjusting amount of sugar and thickener according to sweetness and juiciness of fresh fruit which varies constantly. Mix thoroughly.

Line pie plate with pastry; fill with fruit mixture and dot generously with butter. Adjust top crust or arrange lattice or pastry strips, straight or twisted.

Brush with butter to glaze. Bake in hot oven, 450 degrees, 15 minutes; reduce heat to moderate, 350 degrees, and continue baking 15 to 25 minutes longer. Berries and soft fruits take shorter time.

Dinner Treat

For an extra special dinner treat, stir chopped raisins into biscuit mix, add cheddar cheese and enough milk to make a soft dough. Roll out on a lightly floured board and cut into circles or diamonds or other fancy shape. Bake as usual.

Set-Up Standing Order for Milk

The good old summer time reminds us that running down to the store for another gallon of milk gets mighty involved among the teen-agers. So avoid possible friction as to who is driving the car on the errands by simply stepping up standing order for milk.

Half gallons of milk increase in demand right along. They cost less than two individual quarts whether store-bought or home-delivered. Take up less space, too.

Some thing is true of ice cream and other frozen desserts. Bargains are in gallons. Keep milk handy in the refrigerator-ready for more children at more meals; ready for more refrigerator raiders between meals because milk is a mainstay for buoyant health and energy.

If You're Putting Up Berries or Fruit

Do not attempt to "put up" too many berries or fruits at a time or you'll ruin your disposition and waste valuable food. Above all things, do not experiment. Ingredients are too costly. Follow canning, freezing, jam-making or other directions to the letter. They were perfected by experts.

Take early morning deliveries and do your processing the same morning. Once you've started the job, finish it. No holdovers or your finished product will suffer. In which event, you'll find plenty of the commercially packed products from this season's crop ready by the time the

Marinated Cucumbers

Marinated cucumbers are a perfect go-along with fish. Chill the cucumbers thoroughly; slice them thin; add a little salad oil and enough fresh lemon juice to cover. Sprinkle with dill seed and add salt and pepper to taste before serving.

Discuss Canning, Freezing Plans With Produce Men

If you are watching for the best buys, hoping to catch the peak of the season for fruits, berries and other produce, it will pay you well to talk over your plans with the men who head the produce departments in local stores. They're just as interested in "moving" the best buys as you are in catching them. They watch the law of supply and demand at work every day in the year. There's healthy competition among the markets to offer the season's best produce at the lowest possible prices. Watch the ads, too!

Plan to "put up" fruits and berries the morning you pick them up at the store. Once you start the job, see it through while the product is at peak of perfection. There is no way of restoring quality. Remember the sugar, spices and other items. Be sure you have plenty of jars, freezer jars, glasses, paraffin and other canning and freezing paraphernalia.

We mention strawberries first because they'll soon be gone. Now is the season of green apples for apple sauce, apricots, blueberries, boysenberries, loganberries, cherries, figs, nectarines, early plums, raspberries. Peaches peak in July and August.

Other Good Buys

Fryers, broilers, stewing chickens and turkey continue high in nutrition, low in cost. There's plenty of beef being specialized among the thrifty cuts that require longer cooking. Lamb and pork are seasonally higher but ad scanning will reveal specials. There's super abundance of eggs at very reasonable prices so put eggs into the menu more often; give father and the boys eggs at breakfast; put them in egg salads and in casserole dishes.

Cantaloupes lead the melon parade with an abundance also of watermelons and other varieties. Plenty of avocados, early-season grapes, grapefruit, Bing and Lambert cherries from the Pacific northwest are of exceptional quality. Lemons and limes too.

Vegetable bins are piled high with cabbage, cauliflower, cucumbers, beans, green and red cabbage, lettuce, romaine and other salad greens. There's plenty of corn, celery, topped carrots, dry onions, soft squash, green peppers, and of course long white potatoes that are so perfect for potato salad making.

Put fish and shellfish in menus more often. Check the fine display.

Back Stairs: Two Books in Evidence

Washington — Back stairs at the White House.

Two new books have been in frequent evidence recently around the White House: "The Quotable Mr. Kennedy," a serious collection of highlights from the speeches and statements of the President, and "Who's In Charge Here?" a paperback collection of news photographs with hilarious quotations attributed to some of the world's more prominent figures.

Both volumes are the work of Gerald C. Gardner, an imaginative young New York and New Jersey public relations man.

Reviewer Backtracks

One of the nation's more serious book reviewers was preparing to blast "Who's In Charge Here?" on grounds that it was in bad taste, disrespectful and unworthy of public perusal. The reviewer then heard that the President himself had seen the book and

laughed heartily at some of the photographs in which he was involved.

Sample: A picture of the President talking on the telephone while his daughter, Caroline, stands beside him. The caption shows Kennedy saying, "No, this is her father."

The reviewer was unable to believe reports that Kennedy accepted the book in good humor. He said stories to this effect were designed to further the disrespect for Kennedy.

Good Circulation

This is not true. "Who's In Charge Here?" probably has received more circulation around the White House than any volume since "Profiles In Courage." And the President thinks it is a very funny spoof.

What this situation illustrates is the fact that the President's supporters sometimes become far more evangelical in his behalf than he would ever be or, for that matter, any member of his family.

This is a form of political dedication which on occasion can be quite a bother to the honoree.

Experts Active

For some weeks, a special task force of public relations experts has been operating out of the White House in an effort to generate public support for the President's liberalized foreign trade program.

It is distinctly a White House operation, yet there exists at 1600 Pennsylvania ave. a split personality when it comes to the problem of linking the special force with the Chief Executive.

One of the task force principals is Carl Levin, on leave of absence from his distilling industry post to help the trade program. Levin's assignment was announced by the White House. He works as an adjunct member of the White House Task Force Function.

A few weeks ago, Levin mailed to a number of people, in the communications field a set of pertinent questions and
