Need for Talent Rural District Told

Talent—Backers of the proposed Talent rural fire district hope to set up an operation similar to that of the Central Point Rural Fire District.

Petitions seeking an election on the formation of a district covering the rural area around Talent and Phoenix were submitted to the Jackson County Court last week. The court this morning ordered return of the petitions to district proponents, however, because required affidavits had not been submitted.

"We want to get equipment and men available to fight rural fires on a 24-hour basis," explained John Tompkins, Talent city councilman who is one of the leaders of the group seeking formation of the district.

"We feel this step is necessary because of the population increase in this area," he added. "We also hope it will reduce fire insurance rates."

At present there is a Talent Rural Fire Department serving the area, but it is strictly a volunteer organization. Funds for equipment are raised through voluntary subscriber fees, whereas a district would have taxing power.

Submission of the petitions to the county court last week

climaxed nine months of work by district proponents.

The proposed district would take in all the rural area between Phoenix and Talent, and south from Talent as far as Jackson Hot Springs. A large portion of the Valley View and Fern Valley area east of Talent and Phoenix also would be included as would some of the area west of both communities.

The incorporated cities of Talent and Phoenix, both of which have their own fire departments, would be excluded. Tompkins said he thought the area proposed for the Talent district would be similar in size to that of the Central Point Rural Fire district.

Winnemucca Road May Open Sept. 18

Winnemucca, Nev. — Plans are being made to open the new Winnemucca-to-the-Sea route by Sept. 18, according to Jim Rutherford, manager of the Winnemucca Chamber of Commerce. Rutherford said that franchises have been let to truck companies to travel the route.

He added that Greyhound Bus Lines has moved 16 families from Elko, Nev., to Winnemucca to operate a bus depot there.

Genevieve Briggs, Mail Tribune correspondent who spoke with Rutherford last week, also reported he indicated Greyhound is preparing to route buses over the new highway.

I. L. Carew, Medford Greyhound superintendent, told the Mail Tribune this morning, however, that he knew of no such plans, although he did not rule out the possibility of applying for routes over the highway after it has opened.

Carew said the families were moved to Winnemucca in connection with a change in east-west, San Francisco to Salt Lake City operations. Buses on that route will now change drivers at Winnemucca instead of Reno, he explained.

Grants Pass, Happy Camp Mills May Reopen Aug. 1

Grants Pass — Approval of a \$1,306,500 federal loan by the Area Redevelopment Administration has cleared the way for reopening of the former Grants Pass Plywood mill and a Happy Camp, Calif., green veneer plant.

Both plants will be operated by the new Josephine Plywood Corporation, with reopening predicted by Aug. 1.

Announcement of the loan was contained in a telegram received here from Sen. Wayne Morse, stating that the project will also be financed by a \$402,000 loan from the United States National Bank of Portland, \$201,000 investment by local redevelopment groups, the contribution of \$100,500 of equity capital and \$320,000 working capital of Josephine Plywood Corporation.

Original application for the loan was made in the name of "West Coast Plywood Co.," a name later changed to Josephine Plywood to avoid conflict with other firms of similar name.

It was announced here that Gerald S. McCarthy, of Roseburg, will be general manager of both plants; and Robert P. Busch, of Grants Pass, assistant general manager. Busch was formerly general manager of Grants Pass Plywood. Henry Wolney will return to his former position of superintendent of the Grants Pass plant.

LOCATION CHANGED

Illinois Valley — The Recreation Swimming lessons that were to have been held at The Forks and Lake Selmac have been changed back to the Lucky Clover Motel in Cave Junction.

Mike Hanby, recreation director, also a qualified Red Cross life guard, will be on duty with instructor Mrs. Louis Aller. Mrs. Aller has worked with the children since the program began in 1955.

Registration days were Thursday and Friday but those who didn't register then can pick up cards, fill them in and present them to Mrs. Aller today when swim classes begin.

Hours are from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Intermediate class 10:30 to 11 a.m. Advanced class 11 to 11:30 a.m. Beginners class 11:30 a.m. to 12 p.m. and Mothers and Infants 12 p.m. to 12:30 on Monday and Thursdays.

The classes will be grouped with an amount in each class per day with all registered

having play day on Wednesday. On play days, pupils may bring play equipment such as inner tubes, rubber rafts, balls with the exception of snorkels.

Volunteer members from the advanced classes in the past have helped the instructor with the smaller children and this help is asked again and will be very much appreciated.

White City — Mr. and Mrs. Gene Everett, 104 Division rd., have taken over management of the Desert Cafe, located at the corner of Highway 99 and Agate rds.

The Everetts have had previous restaurant experience and are in the process of adding a combined dining and banquet room to the cafe. When it is completed they will be able to serve special parties up to 25 or 30 people.

At present the hours have been extended to from 5 a.m. to around 8 p.m., with merchant's lunch for the area workmen one of the specialties. They presently have two additional helpers plus their own son who works part time. The Everetts have taken a two year lease with renewable options on the cafe.

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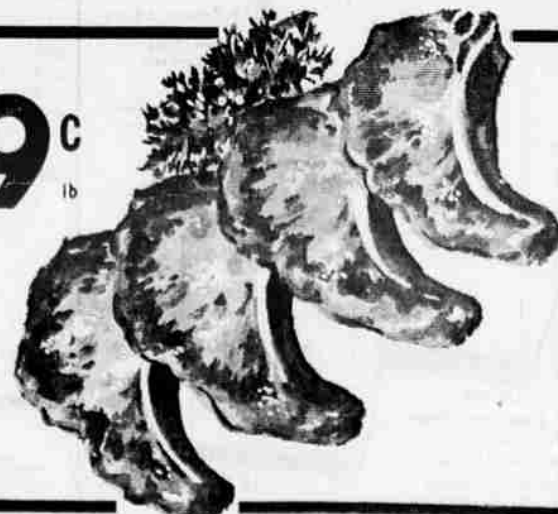
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
