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Kefauver Sees High Satellite System

Washington—U.S. Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) said Tuesday that if all goes well the United States could have a high-altitude, fixed-orbit communications satellite system within 12 months.

Kefauver congratulated the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. for its success with the low-altitude Telstar communications satellite.

Kefauver, who opposes the administration plan for partial public ownership in any satellite communications system, also said:

"AT&T claims it has spent \$45 million of its own money on Telstar. The public should keep in mind that AT&T stockholders are risking nothing. Whether a success or a failure, Telstar will be paid for by the taxpayers and domestic telephone users."

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Urban Renewal Conference Held At University

Eugene—A plea for experimentation, the use of new concepts, and the willingness to accept new ideas in community redevelopment was voiced Monday by William L. Slayton, Washington, D.C., commissioner of the Urban Renewal Administration of the U.S. Housing and Home Finance Agency.

He spoke at a luncheon meeting on the University of Oregon campus during the seventh national working conference on urban renewal. The meeting, which began with registration Sunday and ended Tuesday, was sponsored by the National Association of Housing and Redevelopment officials and the university's school of architecture and allied arts.

About 250 delegates from every major city in the U.S. registered for the conference.

"Those who would insist that we build only that which has been market tested would put us into the position of continuing the present environment and not offering the urban inhabitant any alternative to what he now has," Slayton said, in emphasizing the need for experimentation.

New Urban Pattern

"Our great opportunity in urban renewal is to produce a different kind of urban living," Slayton added. "My one basic criticism of the design of our urban areas is our unwillingness to experiment."

Although he believes that urban renewal efforts to date "deserve more praise than condemnation," he cautioned his audience of local directors of urban and housing programs and planning commissions to seek the advice of urban designers early when renewal plans are being prepared.

Too often, he said, utilitarian considerations such as basic land use, zoning regulations, placement of utilities, and highway patterns are firmly established before the architect or planner is called in. Such a procedure forestalls the development of new ideas in the design of future cities, he pointed out.

"The designer can see new potentials, new possibilities, and may well be able to propose some new development concepts that can enrich the initial basic determinants of the city," Slayton said. "The urban designer is a contributor, he is not one who merely puts the frosting on the cake."

Beauty Essential

An essential element which urban design should always embody is beauty, Slayton added.

The urban renewal administrator today has "the responsibility for creating urban areas not for the next few years but for posterity—and for posterity that will use and inhabit these areas and buildings for some 75 years to come. What we build will last a long, long time. We should be sure not only that we build it well, but that we create in the process both beauty and function—beauty to raise one's spirits and function to provide a delightful urban environment," Slayton said.

The conference will continue Tuesday with sessions on downtown revitalization and the case history of Harlem Park in Baltimore, "an all-out effort in neighborhood rehabilitation."

The Tuesday luncheon speaker was Neil J. Hardy, Washington, D.C., the commissioner of the Federal Housing Administration, who discussed "The Changing Image and Role of FHA in Housing."

DEMAND REAFFIRMED—Rep. Clarence Cannon (D-Mo.), chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, has announced that the group, on a 25 to 2 vote has reaffirmed its demand for "co-equal authority" in House-Senate conference committee sessions. The House committee accused Senators of having increased House-passed money bills by \$32 billion in the past 10 years, and of having used their advantageous position in conference committee sessions to nail \$22 billion of that into law. Washington—UPI—President Kennedy has agreed to review the Marine Corps' traditional evening parade this Thursday and thus follow up on a promise initiated 161 years ago by Thomas Jefferson.

The White House announced Tuesday the President accepted the invitation of Marine Corps Commandant Gen. David Shoup to attend the ceremony at the Marine Corps barracks here. He will be the first president to appear at the installation since Jefferson's time.

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Regional College Division Created

Salem—UPI—The Oregon Education Department has announced creation of a community college division, and the appointment of a Michigan man to run it.

Dr. Leon P. Minear, state superintendent of public instruction, named Dr. Robert O. Hutton, Battle Creek, Mich., as an assistant state superintendent to direct the community college unit. Hutton, who will assume the new post here Sept. 1, is president of Kellogg Community College in Battle Creek.

Minear named William G. Loomis, Salem, director of industrial education and community colleges, as acting head of the new division.

The division will ultimately have three sections: industrial education, adult education, and lower division collegiate. Minear said he will ask the 1963 legislature to authorize a new director for the lower division collegiate section while the others will be filled with available personnel.
