The traditional feast, which heralds the launching of the Shakespearean season, is set for 6 p.m., Saturday, July 21, in Ashland's Lithia park.

Tickets for the opening night performance are no longer available, but many find it enjoyable to attend the feast, festival officials said.

Feasters will be greeted by chicken cooked over an open pit, green stuffs, and refreshments. Entertainment will be by Dancers On-the-Green, the Ashland Kilty band, along with the strolling musicians, fun makers, and dancers in the traditional Maske of the Wood.

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Entries Total 419 for Junior Olympic Aquatic Rivalry Here

Entries of 419 boys and girls are in for the 1962 Oregon AAU Junior Olympic Short Course Swimming Championships in Medford on Friday and Saturday.

They represent 16 clubs or teams from western and south central Oregon.

Swimmers will contend in four age groups at Jackson pool with girls events on Friday and boys contending on Saturday. Preliminaries are

slated for 10 a.m. with finals at 7 p.m. Diving events are slated for 10 a.m. with preliminaries on Friday at 5 p.m. and finals at the same hour on Saturday.

Oregon AAU is sponsor of the meet and Medford city parks and recreation department the host. Ken Lyons, Medford recreation supervisor, is meet manager. Tye Steinbeck, coach of Portland's

Aero club, will be referee.

Age divisions are 10 and under, 11-12 years, 13-14 and 15-16. By name these classes are midget, junior, intermediate and senior.

Performance in the meet here will count toward national championships. National titles will be determined on the results of various Junior Olympic meets throughout the United States.

Competition here will be in freestyle, backstroke, butterfly, breaststroke and medley races with distance ranging from 50 to 400 yards. Only senior division entries will swim 400, in freestyle, which is 16 lengths of Medford's 25-yard short course Jackson pool.

Three Events

Diving will be from both one and three-meter heights. Participants are limited to entry in three events, excluding relays.

All but 35 entries had been processed by around 9 a.m. today and showed entrants about even between boys and girls.

City parks and recreation personnel and swimmer's parents will serve as meet officials.

Clubs entered include Multnomah Athletic club, Aero club and Downtown YMCA of Portland, Portland Aquatic club, Grants Pass Athletic club, Albany Tennis and Swimming club, Redwood, Roseburg, Tualatin Hills and Parkrose - Reynolds Swim clubs, North Bend Aquatic club, Corvallis Country club, Eugene YMCA, and Klamath Falls, Lakeview and Medford swim teams.

Forestry Group to Meet in Medford

Syria Labor Union Ordered Dissolved

Archery, Sikes Lead Public Links Field Into Match Action

Town of Tonawanda, N.Y. — Medalist George Archer, defending champion Dick Sikes and seven scrappy Hawaiians led a 64-man field to play 36 holes of match play in the 37th U.S. amateur public links golf championship.

When the firing has ended, only 16 will be left to play another day.

The 22-year-old Archer, a native of San Francisco, barreled over the 6,697-yard Sheridan Park layout in a one-over par 72 Tuesday to

top 150 of the nation's leading amateurs.

Archer turned in a 73-72-143 for the 36-hole qualifying round over a course that has been labeled "real tough" by most observers.

Seven Strokes Under

Sikes, who took medalist honors as well as the public links crown a year ago in Detroit, Mich., toured the wind-battered court in 75-73-150, seven strokes under the cutoff. The University of Arkansas senior left the sub-par shooting to Bill Tindall of Seattle, Wash., an 18-year-old student who was national junior amateur champion two years ago.

Tindall, who boasts the only par-busting round of the tournament thus far, made a great comeback Tuesday by carding a 33-37-70. The youngster had struggled through to an 81 in the opening 18-hole session Monday. He was joined in the 151 category by nine other players.

The men from Hawaii played strong golf Tuesday — almost as good as Monday. The Hawaiians, who won the three-man team championship in 1961, were well on their way to repeating when Tindall came with up with sizzling round.

Win Team Title

Tindall, Earvin Scott and Ken Storey, a 52-year-old banking executive who had a 74-73-147, compiled a 451 score to snatch the team title from Hawaii by one stroke.

The Hawaiian aggregation of Hung Soo Ahn (73-76-149), B. H. Arakawa (73-78-151), Masa Kaya (77-75-152), and O. T. Douglas Jr. (76-76-152) ranked in the top 30 qualifiers. Allan Yamamoto (79-76-155) was next for the Hawaiians. Fred Diklatro (79-78-157) survived a sudden death playoff for one of the last qualifying spots.

In today's leading matches, Archer faced J. Fred Lufkin of Spokane, Wash., to open the head-to-head competition; Sikes was paired with Tom Hovey of Utica, N.Y.; and Ahn went against his teammate, Yamamoto. The winners advance to another 18-hole test in the afternoon.
