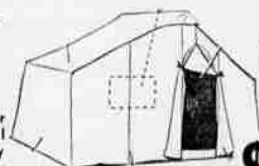

Franco Creates Vice Premier Post

Madrid (UPI)—A sweeping cabinet shakeup today established Capt. Gen. Agustin Munoz Grandes, 66-year-old chief of the Joint General Staff, as Generalissimo Francisco Franco's hand-picked successor.

Seven changes in the 17-man cabinet and the creation of the new post of vice premier for Munoz Grandes were published this morning in the official state Gazette. The state radio reported Tuesday night the changes were being made.

Munoz Grandes held, and still holds, a military title second only to Franco's in Spain. Now he is also second in the political line with authorization to succeed the 69-year-old Franco in event of "vacancy, absence or illness." It was the first time Franco had established a definite line of succession or even showed a readiness to delegate some functions of his rule.

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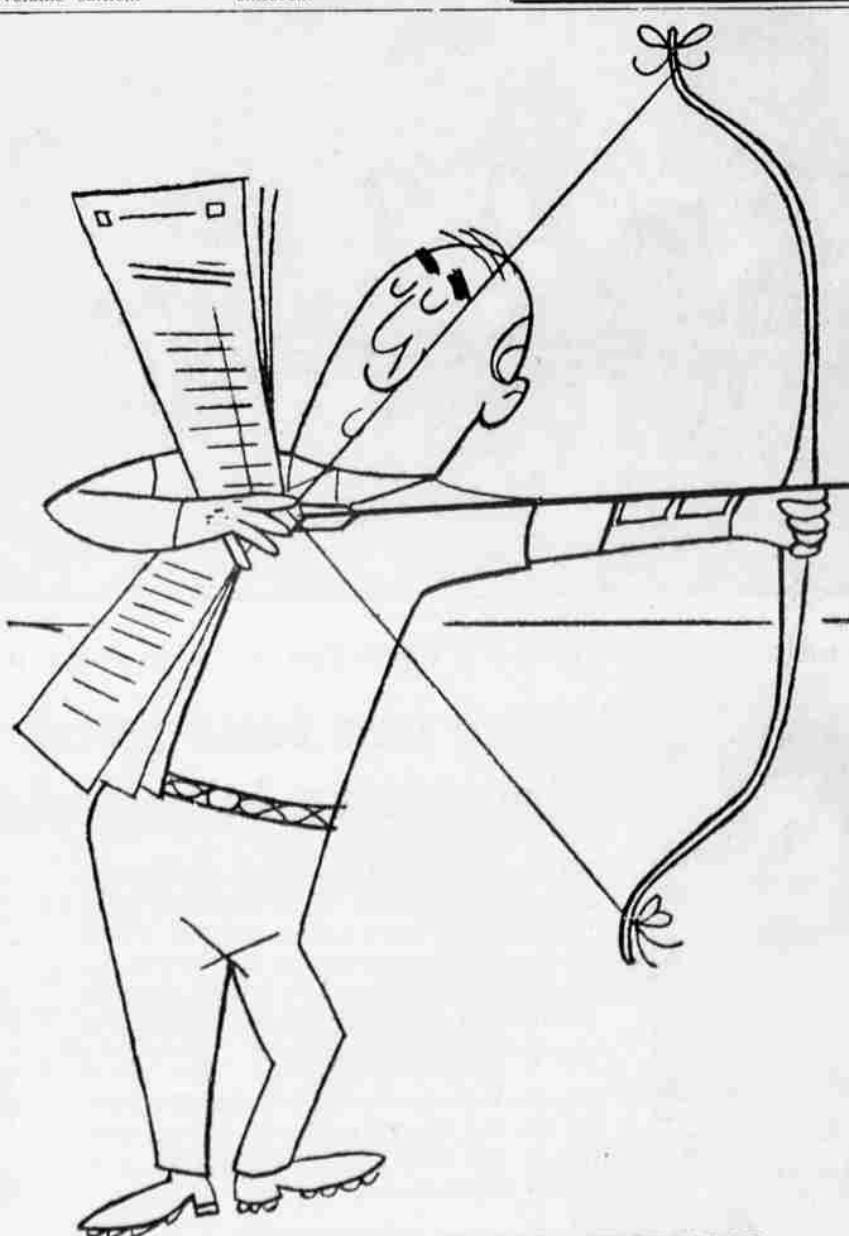
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
