Bella Bella Given Hero's Welcome

Algiers—UPI—Vice Premier Mohammed Ben Bella, leader of a dissident faction in the Algerian provisional government, rode through the sun-blanched streets of Oran today to a hero's welcome from thousands of cheering Algerians.

Combat-clad guerrilla troops of the National Liberation Army lined the streets to provide a guard of honor.

Ben Bella returned to Algeria Wednesday for the first time since he was captured by the French six years ago.

He is currently locked in a struggle for power in his newly-independent nation with provisional government Premier Ben Youssef Ben Khedda.

Foreign Briefs

55 INJURED AT LONDON JAZZ FESTIVAL
London—UPI—Fifty-five persons were injured slightly Wednesday night in the crush of a jazz band dance on a downtown London street during the city's summer festival. A police spokesman estimated the crowd at 30,000 and called the scene "fantastic." He said most of those injured had fainted, but that four persons required hospitalization.

THAILAND NAMES CONFERENCE REPRESENTATIVE
Bangkok—UPI—Foreign Minister Thanat Khomen will represent Thailand at the second Bandung conference of Afro-Asian nations in December, according to Bangkok newspapers. Thailand's decision to participate in the conference was announced last Tuesday.

VAN FLEET'S SOUTH KOREA VISIT DENOUNCED
Tokyo—UPI—Communist North Korea's Pyongyang radio today denounced the visit to South Korea of retired American Gen. James A. Van Fleet. The Communist radio, in a broadcast monitored here, called Van Fleet, commander of the U.S. 8th Army during the Korean war, "a notorious war criminal and intelligence agent, who made his way into South Korea on July 7 in the disguise of the 'leader of a businessmen' group."

LIECHTENSTEIN PRINCESS EXPECTING
Vaduz, Liechtenstein—UPI—Reigning Prince Franz Josef II and Princess Gina of Liechtenstein expect their fifth child this fall, according to a court spokesman here. The 56-year old prince and the 40-year old princess, born Countess Wilczek, have three sons and one daughter, all teenagers.

ITALY AGREES WITH INTERDEPENDENCE
Rome—UPI—Foreign Minister Atilio Piccioni said Wednesday Italy is in full agreement with President Kennedy's "Declaration of Interdependence." Piccioni told the senate the Italian government's goal is an Atlantic community embracing America and Europe.

Art Experts Seek Painting Identity

Rome—UPI—Who is the enigmatically smiling lady whose portrait by Leonardo da Vinci has intrigued the Parisians of visitors of the Louvre, one of the world's great museums?
Is she really Mona Lisa as claimed by art historian Giorgio Vasari, who lived shortly after da Vinci, or a young princess of the House of Savoy, or a southern Italian heroine, as claimed by some other art scholars?
An allocation of 15 million lire (\$24,000) has just been voted by the government Agency for the Development of Southern Italy to solve the mystery.

Many southern Italian art scholars claim they hold enough evidence to support the theory that the Mona Lisa painted by da Vinci was Costanza Davalos, a Neapolitan gentlewoman of Spanish extraction.
The portrait of the woman with the mysterious smile was taken to France, according to tradition, by da Vinci himself when he went to the court of King Francis I in 1516.
Vasari in his art history said the woman painted by the versatile master was Mona Lisa, the wife of Francesco del Giocondo, hence the name "La Gioconda" by which the portrait is known to Italians.

Scholars who refuse to recognize the portrait as that of Mona Lisa say she wears a black veil on her hair, indicating she was a widow. Mona Lisa was widowed at 49, an age much older than that of the woman in the painting, the scholars claim.
Years ago an art student from Turin, Carlo Pedretti, claimed the portrait was that of 19-year-old Princess Filiberta of Savoy, the niece of Pope Leo X and aunt of King Francis I of France.
Pedretti claimed da Vinci must have painted the portrait between 1515 and 1516, shortly after the death of Filiberta's husband, Giuliano de' Medici, and before da Vinci went to the court of King Francis.

Filiberta also went to stay with King Francis and probably took the portrait with her, the student said.
The theory that the smiling woman could be Costanza Davalos is not new. But it never earned much credence among the experts.
Costanza was a fiery, warlike character who took up arms to defend the life of Ischia. To many critics she could not be the mild-looking woman portrayed.
What new evidence to support the Costanza theory has been lately uncovered by

Washington—UPI—A former used car salesman told congressional investigators today he got a key job in the West Virginia Highway Department as a reward for hard work for the Republican Party.

The witness, Henry H. Price of Danville, W. Va., told a House Highway Investigating Subcommittee that the political spoils system always has operated in the state's road agency.
Price said he had been active in Republican county affairs before the 1956 elections, and was given the choice of several jobs.

The former official said his only training for the job was three or four appraisals he took part in during the 1930s for the county road department and in the settlement of estates.

Airlines To Adjust Fares in Canada

Washington—UPI—The Civil Aeronautics Board Wednesday ordered airlines to take into account devaluation of the Canadian dollar in the fares between Canada and the United States.

The ruling will raise fares quoted in Canadian dollars by about 7 1/2 per cent. The Canadian dollar was put at 92 1/2 cents last May 2, but up until now, the airlines have been charging the same—which meant it was cheaper to buy a ticket for a Montreal-New York flight in Montreal than in New York.

River Swimmer Outlasts Boat

Pasco, Wash.—UPI—Swimmer Spencer Campbell was in fine shape today after swimming 192 miles here from Oregon, Idaho, but the boat accompanying him was in need of repairs.

Campbell swam about 10 miles from Sacajawea State Park to Wallula Junction in about four hours, ending at midnight Wednesday.

He was spending today resting in a Pasco motel and said he would do most of his swimming en route to Astoria, Ore., at night from now on because of winds during the day. He hopes to reach the end of his 559 mile swim to Astoria about July 25.

The former navy frogman planned to reach Cold Spring, Ore., about 16 miles downstream, at the end of tonight's swim.

Jobs in Oregon Up Nearly 40,000

Salem—UPI—Employment in Oregon jumped by nearly 40,000 jobs from mid-May to mid-June, from 679,100 to 718,700. But the mid-June figure was nearly 5,000 down from June a year ago.

David H. Cameron, state employment commissioner, said that with the strawberry harvest well under way, three quarters of the new jobs this June were on Oregon farms. The decrease from June, 1961, was due to the slowing of farm activity this year caused by a cold, wet spring, Cameron said.

Nonfarm employment continued at a record pace with 6,400 more workers with jobs this June than last. Cameron said, however, logging and sawmilling jobs were 1,600 below that of June, 1961.

Portlander Assumes Command at Spokane

Spokane, Wash.—UPI—Col. Daniel C. McDaniel, Portland, today took over his duties as commander of the 92nd Aerospace Wing at Fairchild Air Force Base near here. The base officials said Col. McDaniel comes to Fairchild from Amarillo, Tex., where he was commander of the 4128th Strategic Wing.
