Don Kilbourn and Mike Glines headed the Cheney offense with two hits each. Kilbourn singled and doubled to drive in three runs. Glines singled and tripled. He stole home for one marker.

Two errors, a fielder's option and Kilbourn's double got two runs in the second inning. Glines had his single in the third frame. He swiped second base, moved to third on a miscue and followed with his scoring steal. Lou Alvarez doubled and Jeff Anhorn singled him home.

Pat Pepper tripled.

An error, two wild pitches and a Kilbourn hit gained a run in the fourth inning. Pat Pepper scored in the fifth on his triple and Lou Alvarez's sacrifice fly. Neil Rivenburg singled in the sixth panel and hit a batter, an error and Glines's three-master put over two runs. Glines was out trying to stretch his hit to a homer.

Klamath tabulated twice in

the third inning on three bases on balls, a Bob Woldt single and an error. For two in the fourth Jay Paxton's single was followed by Bill Bianchi's triple and a misplay.

The three Pepper brothers got into the pitching act for Central Point. Larry whiffed four, walked three batters and allowed two hits and two runs in 2 1/3 innings. Mike in 4 1/3 fanned three, walked one, gave up five hits and was charged with two runs. Pat was sent into pitch to the last Hawk batter. But he walked the first man he faced before striking out the next.

Marv Davis, on the hill for KF, yielded eight hits to Central Point. He fanned three and walked one. Paxton had two safeties for the Hawks.

Sikes Wins 2nd Public Links Title

Town of Tonawanda, N.Y.

— Dick Sikes of Springdale, Ark., won his second straight national amateur public links golf championship Saturday with a gruelling 2 and 1 victory over scrappy Heng Soo Ahn of Honolulu, Hawaii.

The 22-year-old University of Arkansas senior, getting better as he went along, wore down the tiny Hawaiian and ended the match on the 35th hole of the scheduled 36-hole final.

Sikes, three down after 16 holes, notched an eagle three on the 11th hole and tied the match when Ahn bogeyed the 17th hole in the morning round. The two sharp - putting contestants waged a saw-tooth battle from the 18th hole through the 27th with the match still deadlocked at that point.

The champion hit a tremendous tee shot on the 17th hole - three 21st hole. The ball dropped three feet from the pin as Sikes just missed a hole in one.

Sikes and the 32-year-old Ahn both birdied the tied hole and Sikes went one-up with his third straight birdie on the 23rd hole of the 6,697 yard Sheridan Park course. Ahn, who had taken the 20th hole after Sikes shot a bogey five, also won the 27th to even the match again.

Sikes took the lead again on the 28th with a par four to Ahn's bogey. Both players birdied the 29th hole and halved the next two holes before Sikes sank a 30-foot putt from the edge of the green on the 32nd for a birdie three.

They halved the next three holes and it was all over. Ahn missed a golden opportunity to get back in contention when he blew a three-foot putt on the 33rd hole. His tee shot hit three feet from the pin on the 35th hole and he had to settle for a par when his putt rolled a few inches past the cup.

Sikes had a two - under par 69 over the first 18 holes. He finished the day with seven birdies and an eagle.

Griffith Outpoints Dupas, Keeps Title

Las Vegas, Nev. — Emile Griffith, left, ties up challenger Ralph Dupas as they clinch in the third round of their welterweight title bout at Las Vegas, Nev., on Friday night. Griffith posted a unanimous decision to keep the title.

Griffith, the 23-year-old fighting miller from New York and the Virgin Islands, Friday night made his first appearance since he was injured March 24.

He scored a unanimous 15-round decision over the veteran Ralph Dupas of New Orleans before a crowd of 5,169 that paid \$53,610 to watch the non-television fight at Convention Center.

Not Easy

It was not an easy fight. Dupas, veteran of 116 fights, used a lot of slick tactics and was a moving target at all times.

Griffith never really clipped him good until the 15th round when he belted Dupas from one corner of the ring to the other with hard rights to the jaw. Dupas covered up and remained on his feet at the final bell.

There were no knockdowns in the bout.

After the fight, the happy Griffith, not even breathing heavily, said, "I was fighting

myself and Dupas. There were times when I was doubtful but my manager spoke to me.

"Now I feel a great sense of relief. Now I know I don't have to hold back. I can fight my fight."

Griffith's managers, Gil Clancy and Howard Albert, said they had no definite plans for another title defense.

Zarley Wins Pacific Golf

Vancouver, B. C. — Kimit Zarley of Yakima, Wash., Saturday won the 63rd annual Pacific Northwest Golf association tournament at the Vancouver Golf club.

Zarley defeated the present Canadian junior champion Terry Campbell of Vancouver, B.C., on the last hole of the 36-hole final.

Twenty-year-old Zarley had a four-lead after the morning round but wilted in the afternoon sun as Campbell fired a four-under par 68 to make it close.

Zarley lost the 19th to a birdie but won the 21st and 22nd holes with birdies.

On the 300-yard 24th hole, Campbell put a wedge shot in the cup for an eagle two. He then went on to win two more holes in a row and cut the margin to two down after 27 holes.

Campbell lost the 20th when he three-putted from 30 feet. He got that one back on the 32nd hole when he came out of the trees with a spectacular shot. Campbell was unable to win any of the last three holes although he did manage a birdie in the 36th.

In the women's finals, Mrs. Robert Hlanfeldt of Seattle defeated June Robinson of Albany, Ore., 8 and 7.

Medford Cokes try their baseball playing mettle against the defending area and Oregon state champions today in an American Legion junior doublebill.

While Medford will meet Roseburg for the first time this season, the Lockwoods will make their second appearance of 1962 on the Veterans Administration domiciliary field.

Roseburg will close out a series of three week end doubleheaders today. This activity is evidence of a busy schedule for the Umpqua valley team. And the Lockwoods have had a full slate and have swept through it impressively, playing twice as many games as Medford.

Through last Wednesday Roseburg had a 31-3 season record compared to Medford's current 12-4.

Enart and King The teams are both members of Area 4 but today's games have no bearing on the outcome of the title race. Roseburg plays in the Northern division and Medford in the Southern. Lockwood headed its division through Wednesday with a 14-1 record and was 4 1/2 games ahead of North Eugene which held second spot. Medford is 5-3 in the South. The Cokes are in second place with their loop three finished but still in position for a three-way tie in final standings.

Coach Cliff McLean indicated last week that Bill Enart and Bob King would be his pitchers for today's games for Medford. Roseburg Coach Bill Harper has a big mound staff to pick from. Among his throwers are Tom Hobbs, Lyle Charon, Dick Williams, Jon Burham, Jerry Boucock and Ken Droscher.

action taken at West Point

West Point, N.Y. — The U.S. Military Academy has taken measures to prevent West Point coaches from promising appointments to young athletes.

The action was touched off by Rep. Samuel S. Starton, D-N.Y., Wednesday when he charged that Schenectady, N.Y., high school basketball star Robert DeLuca would not be able to enter West Point despite a promise by Army basketball coach George Hunter.

Academy public information officer Col. J. B. Stephens explained DeLuca did not receive an appointment because there were no existing vacancies.

"The academy," Stephens emphasized, "has taken steps to see that similar instances did not occur again. All athletic coaches have been briefed on what they may and may not do in regard to appointments. But in the final analysis appointments are made by the Department of the Army on the basis of recommendations from the academy board."

Stephens said the academy was sorry for what happened.

Boyden Awarded \$6,580 in Damages

A Jackson county circuit court jury Friday afternoon granted C. Z. Boyden, 807 East Jackson st., \$6,580 in damages, as a result of a state highway commission condemnation suit.

Top appraisal of the property was \$11,500. The state highway commission had offered \$3,300 for the 1.2 acres taken a quarter mile from the Crater Lake highway and Biddle rd. intersection. Total acreage was 9.95 acres.

The jury trial lasted 1 1/2 days.

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Lane Upsets Hernandez In Unanimous Decision

New York — Keny Lane, southpaw lightweight contender from Muskegon, Mich., climbed off the canvas Saturday night and hammered out an upset unanimous decision over Carlos Hernandez, Venezuelan knockout specialist, in their return television fight at Madison Square Garden.

The defeat broke Hernandez's winning string at seven straight.

Hernandez, tall and mustachioed, had held Lane to a draw at Caracas, Venezuela - Carlos' home town - on Feb. 20, 1961, but 22-year-old Hernandez was favored at 17-5 to beat 30-year-old Lane Saturday night.

Hernandez, top contender, was penalized the sixth and ninth rounds for fouls. But on the United Press International score card the compact, sandy-haired Lane had won those sessions anyway. Referee Arthur Mercante penalized Hernandez the sixth round for hitting while holding and the ninth for low punches.

Lane, weighing 138 pounds to Hernandez' 134 1/2, was floored by a right to the chin in the third round. Smart Kenny, who could have risen earlier, took a nine-count on

one knee. He was staggered again shortly afterwards by another right to the jaw. But his third-round trip was the only knockdown of the fight.

The decision or the three ring official was cheered by the estimated crowd of 800. Referee Mercante voted for Lane on a rounds basis, 7-2-1. Judge Bill Recht agreed 8-1-1, as did Judge Jimmy Riccio, 5-3-2. The United Press International scored for Lane, 7-2-1.

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Coast League Same in 1963

Portland, Ore. — The Pacific Coast League will probably have the same eight teams in it next year, according to loop president Dewey Soriano.

He made the prediction at the close of a two-day meeting of league officials here last week.

Soriano said Vancouver was having the most financial problems, but if the Mounties "didn't want to operate next season, we'd find a buyer for the franchise."

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
