

Movie Producer Jerry Wald Dies In Beverly Hills

Beverly Hills, Calif. — Jerry Wald, who successfully gambled on a blend of art and sensation in a flamboyant 30-year movie making career, died Friday night of his third heart attack in two days. He was 49.

Wald died in bed at his home, where he had been confined since being sent home ill Wednesday from the set of his latest movie, "A Woman in July." His wife, Constance, said she was just about to give him a glass of orange juice to help him sleep when he was stricken. His son, Andrew, 15, also was present.

Box Office Hits
A boy from Brooklyn with uninhibited enthusiasm that lasted a lifetime, Wald contrasted box office hits such as the lusty "Peyton Place" with critically acclaimed "Johnny Belinda" and "Sons and Lovers."

"Johnny Belinda" gave Jane Wyman an Academy Award, while "Mildred Pierce" earned one for Joan Crawford.

Wald — youngest man to win the coveted Irving Thalberg Award, in 1948 — had been ill from time to time more than a year. He underwent surgery several times. But he kept busy with plans for such projects as an adaptation of Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy's "The Enemy Within," conferring with Kennedy on the book only two weeks ago. He also had in the mill an adaptation of "Ulysses" by James Joyce.

Countless Memos
Wald, who since 1957 headed his own production company with a release agreement with 20th Century Fox studios, looked for movie ideas everywhere and kept a dictaphone handy to dictate countless memos. "Lots of my ideas come right out of the newspapers where I read the kind of items that show what people are thinking about," he once told a reporter.

A developer of some major star names, Wald has been credited with giving Marlon Brando his first screen test and starting him on the way to success. He also "discovered" the late James Dean at a UCLA actor's school.

In addition to his widow and son Andrew, Wald was survived by another son, Robert, 18.

Redmond Coldest Spot In Nation

Ferry Building on SF Waterfront Is Damaged By Blaze

San Francisco — Fire destroyed a part of the world-famous Ferry Building on the San Francisco waterfront Saturday, but the blaze was quickly brought under control.

Fire Chief William Murray said that the fire, which was confined to a one-floor wood frame building adjacent to the main building, caused about \$25,000 damage.

The origin of the fire was not known.

Three alarms were sounded, bringing 90 men and 22 pieces of equipment to battle the fire, which started at 1:45 a.m. PDT. It was controlled by 2:15.

The fire began in a shop fronting the bay, and spread to the roof, where most of the damage was reported. Smoke swirled around the famous tower with its great clock, attracting a large crowd.

The Ferry Building has greeted visitors arriving by way of San Francisco Bay for 63 years. Ferry service on the bay has been recently discontinued, but the building serves as a tourist attraction, office building and heliport.

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Coast Port Heads Testify State Aid Vital for Growth

Newport — Oregon coast port officials told members of the Legislative Interim committee, meeting here, that state aid is necessary for the growth of their port.

Gerald Patterson, representing the ports of Bay City and Tillamook, said demands for small boat facilities could be met if small ports were to receive the money.

Committee chairman Edward J. Whelan said the committee would recommend that money collected as tax on marine gasoline, which boaters can ask the state to refund, be applied to development of marine facilities.

The unreturned money amounts to \$300,000 a year, Representative Whelan said, and now goes to the highway fund.

Port of Newport manager Telore Abendroth told the committee his port needs extension of its north jetty, widening and deepening of the entrance to Depoe Bay, and deepening of the channel.

Requests for construction of a passable bay entrance to the port of Nehalem came from Earling Braute, port commissioner. He described Nehalem as a "disaster area" and said he felt fishermen would return to the port if the entrance were improved.

The committee unanimously agreed that a serious drawback to the development of the central coast area is the Corvallis-Newport highway, U.S. 20, which Newport port commissioner Thomas Lashbaugh described as "a damn poor highway."

Dress Rehearsals Start in Ashland

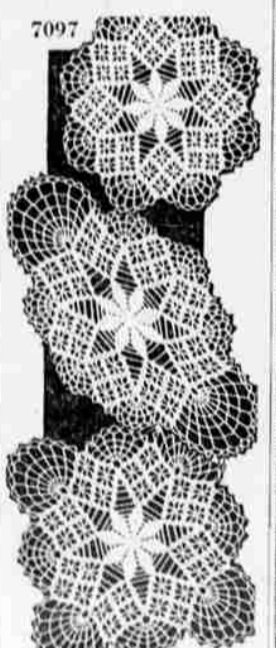
Ashland — The first round of dress rehearsals started Friday at the Oregon Shakespearean Festival here.

Technical rehearsal sessions — where lighting and scenic adjustments are made — were completed Thursday, with eight days remaining before the theater's 22nd opening night July 21.

During the dress rehearsals period, all four productions are in performance order, rotating exactly as they will throughout the 44-night season. Costumes are added, giving the actor an opportunity to adjust to their attire before the shows open to the public.

As during the technical rehearsals, the sessions will be closed to the public to permit final adjustments of the details involved in each production. Members of the Festival association will be admitted to the final dress rehearsals.

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Spokane Man Charged With Murder

Spokane — A husky ex-Navy man, once convicted of beating his high school sweetheart, has been charged with murdering her father.

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Fowle, public relations man for a savings and loan company here, had gone to the station to pick up his daughter, Nancy, 19, who worked there as night receptionist.

Markham signed a statement admitting the shooting. After Fowle was dropped by five slugs from a .45 automatic pistol, witnesses said Nancy was pulled into a car which sped from the scene. Police found Markham and Miss Fowle in the car about two hours later.

Police Chief Clifford Payne said that when he and Sgt. Jim Haynes approached Markham's car, Markham and Miss Fowle ran from the car to some bushes. Payne said the girl stood between Markham and police and called out, "Don't shoot him."

Police found a .45 automatic pistol, a .30 caliber rifle, a sub-machinegun and 500 rounds of ammunition in Markham's car.

Markham was released from the Navy June 15 after two years of service. Spokane County Prosecutor John J. Lally said that when Markham was home on leave a year ago, he was convicted on a charge of third degree assault for taking a ladder, climbing to Miss Fowle's bedroom and hitting her.

Lally said Markham was given a six-month sentence, suspended on condition he stay away from Miss Fowle. He said she had dated Markham for about five months during their senior year of high school.

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Fowle's body, lying face down, was found by Menzo Rose, a caretaker who lived near the station.

Fowle's survivors include his widow, Naomi, and another daughter, Maureen, 14.

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
