Klamath Falls Falcons won the Area 4 Southern division American Legion junior baseball title by defeating Grants Pass 3 to 2 on Sunday. The Falcons finished the loop slate with a 5-2 standing. Medford was 5-3. Grants Pass and Central Point each 4-4 and Klamath Falls Hawks 1-7.

Memorial Field, White City — When it comes to American Legion junior baseball, the Medford Cokes appear to have the Indian sign on Roseburg Lockwood Motors.

Last year, Medford beat the Roseburg nine in three out of four contests. Lockwood went on to win the Oregon state diadem. This year that team has rolled over most of its opposition. Roseburg tallied in the first inning on a hit by Gordon Avery, a fielder's choice, a walk and an error as the markers came one at a time. Manning then made the margin 2 to 0. Mike Neathamer got a second inning double for Cokes when an outfielder lost his fly ball in the sun. Three successive walks were yielded by pitcher Jon Burnham to force a run across.

Medford hopped on top in the fourth inning on a single by King, a base on balls and a double down the first base and right field line by Don Anderson.

King, continuing to have an offensive as well as pitching hand in his verdict, tripled in the sixth inning and scored his second tally of the contest on a single by Deffley. Medford battered relief thrower Jerry Boucek for four hits in the canto.

13 Swimming Records Eclipsed In AAU Junior Olympic Events

Records were eclipsed in 13 of the 34 races here Saturday in boys' events of the Oregon association AAU Junior Olympic short course swimming championship.

Saturday's swimming at Jackson park pool produced three triple victors. Medford's own Bruce Hess was among the record busters and among five double winners.

Touching first in three events were Perry Fisher, Multnomah Athletic club, in the junior division, and Jim Mason, also of MAC, in the intermediate races. Fisher established one new standard and so did Mason.

Hess was one of two double victors in the senior division for 15-16-year-old boys in which five marks fell. He won the 200-yard individual medley and the 100-yard freestyle along with placing second in the 100 butterfly. The Medford natator swam the medley in 2:19.5 almost five seconds under the old time of 2:24.4.

Wall Wins Two
The senior two-ply winner was Lynn Wall, Reedsport, who beat out Hess in the 100 butterfly and took the 400 freestyle in record time of 4:30.4, far under the 4:47.7 time which stood before the meet.

Steve Cary, Reedsport, won the senior 200-yard breaststroke in new best time of 2:38.6. He teamed with Bob Plov, Wall and Larry Riley for a 1:37.7 record in the 200 medley relay. Plov, Wall and Riley then combined with Hugh Mackenzie for a 1:43.5 new standard in the 200 freestyle relay.

In the intermediate class for 13-14-year-olds, Mason won 100 butterfly and the 200 and 100 freestyles with a new time of 2:06.7 in the 200. Intermediate marks fell in both relays. The Multnomah crew of Steve Arndt, Tyler Walthers, Mason and Bill Biscole won the 200 free in 2:00.6 after putting a new time in the book with a 1:59.8 preliminary. Aero club of Portland won the 200 freestyle with Jim Stout, Robert Flier and Joe and Bud Tennant timed in new association best of 1:48.5. Multnomah's crew of Arndt, Matussek, Walthers and Mason were second in the same clocking.

Beat Out Coffey

Fisher in the 11-12 or junior class won the 200 medley and 100 freestyle races and the 50 butterfly with a new association standard of 2:39.2 in the medley. In the butterfly Fisher beat out Tom Coffey, Tualatin Hills, who set a new mark of 30.3 in the prelim. Fisher's preliminary 30.5 and final 30.7 were under the old mark of 30.8.

Both junior relay records were beaten by Tualatin Hills. In the 200 medley Jerry Newman, John Riddick, Coffey and John Wyttenberg swam in 2:15.5. Newman, Riddick, Coffey and Rick Zahniser covered the 200 freestyle in 1:58.4 in the preliminary before taking the final.

Lone mark in the 10 and under or midget division was set by Steve Wallace, Eugene YMCA, with 34.1 in the 50 butterfly. He also won the 50 backstroke. Lennie Newman took the 50 freestyle and 100 medley in the midget class.

Walters Victor
An intermediate double man was Walthers in the 100 backstroke and 200 medley.

Two swimmers in addition to winner Wall turned in record bettering final times in the 400 freestyle. Plov had a 4:37.8 and Dee McIntony, North Bend, a 4:39.3. McIntony had set a new mark of 4:41.9 in the preliminaries and Wall with 4:42.4 was under the former standard of 4:42.7.

Reedsport Swim club took seven of the 10 firsts in the senior rivalry and Multnomah AC six of the nine in the intermediate races. Tualatin Hills had four winners in the eight event junior class.
