

THE WEEK IN CALIFORNIA

Richardson, Rafferty Leading Superintendent Candidates

The final, official returns from the June 5 primary election were released last week.

And they showed Ralph Richardson and Max Rafferty still leading the list of nine candidates for the office of state superintendent of public instruction. The two men thus qualified for a runoff during the Nov. 6 general election.

Prior to the announcement from Secretary of State Frank M. Jordan, there had been speculation that Rafferty, former superintendent of schools in La Canada, might have lost his place in the runoff to Cecil Hardesty, San Diego county superintendent of schools.

The final count gave Richardson, a member of the Los Angeles city board of education, 737,578 votes; Rafferty, 660,537, and Hardesty 631,959.

The returns also showed that:

—102,565 Democrats wrote in the names of Republicans Richard M. Nixon and Joseph C. Shell for governor. Nixon got 35,883 and Shell 66,712. Democratic incumbent Edmund G. Brown got only 5,236 Republican write-ins.

Incumbent Democratic Atty. Gen. Stanley Mosk was the biggest vote getter with 1,815,734 ballots. Incumbent Jordan led the Republican side with 1,574,333.

4,479,723 Californians went to the polls, or 63.5 per cent of those registered. This was slightly less than the 64.6 per cent voting in the 1958 primary.

Nixon received 1,321,034 votes, nearly twice Shell's 723,254. Brown got 1,744,028, some 300,000 short of the combined Nixon-Shell total despite the Democratic party's 3-2 registration edge.

Elsewhere, there were these developments:

Nixon: Richard M. Nixon, the Republican gubernatorial nominee, was granted a five-day delay in which to fill a personal campaign statement for primary expenses. A Los Angeles County Superior Court judge granted the delay when the former vice president said certain campaign invoices had not been received by him when he departed June 28 for a series of speaking engagements and

a trip to Denmark. Nixon and Max Rafferty, a candidate for state superintendent of public instruction, headed a list of 20 nominees who did not file their statement by the deadline. Republican Secretary of State Frank M. Jordan termed Nixon's delay "darned careless. He's run for office often enough so he knows what to do."

Shelley: Rep. John F. Shelley said he definitely had decided to run for mayor of San Francisco next year. Shelley, 36, is now in his seventh Congressional term and is a candidate for reelection in November.

"There is no secret that I have been very seriously considering running for over a year," he said in Washington. "Being mayor of San Francisco is one of the greatest jobs in the world." The

former California State Senator and one-time labor leader said he felt he could contribute more to "the greatest city in the world" as its mayor than representing it in Congress. Shelley is a Democrat. The current mayor, George Christopher, is the Republican nominee for Lieutenant Governor.

Plane: A light plane crashed and burned moments after takeoff in Fair Oaks near Sacramento, killing five persons. The plane smashed into the ground several hundred yards from a residential area and not far from where a group of boys were playing baseball. The victims were Lawrence Mills, 46, his wife, Geneva, 45, and their son Jimmy, 13, and Eugene Richardson, 36, and his wife, Ruth, 26. The five Sacramento residents were planning to take

the plane on a brief pleasure ride.

Crime: An FBI report showed that in proportion to the population, the incidence of most major crimes decreased in California last year. In only two of seven categories of major crimes, forcible rape and aggravated assault, did the state's rate increase.

Fires: Two major southern California brush fires swept across more than 3,300 acres of valuable watershed. A blaze in San Gabriel canyon in Los Angeles county caused \$500,000 watershed damage and charred 850 acres. A second fire in Bootlegger canyon in the Angeles National forest raced across 2,500 acres, causing \$75,000 damage to watershed.

Alcatraz: Moves were made to preserve Alcatraz Prison as a historic monument. Rep. John Shelley (D-Calif.) asked Interior Secretary Stewart Udall to order a survey of the San Francisco Bay island with a view toward designating it as a historic site. Lt. Gov. Glenn M. Anderson also urged the island be converted

into a monument to "the West." His suggestion was for a U.S. Senators Thomas H. Kuchel and Clair Engle.

The Family Council

Rae H.—Marrying this divorced man will give her nothing but headaches.

Ethel H.—His former wife has agreed to support herself. He's free.

Rae H.—My sister is on the verge of throwing her life away and I want to try to stop her. She's 22 and for three years she's been going with a married man. He finally got a divorce and now Ethel is making plans to marry him.

But it was a bitter divorce. There are three young children and, although Allen's wife made things easy now, she has vowed vengeance upon him and Ethel for later on. She claimed she was glad to get rid of Allen and, since she is part-owner of a restaurant, would support herself and the children. She said she wanted to forget him completely.

Ethel forgets one thing. If Allen's first wife gets sick or loses her business she can pull him into court to support her and the family again.

Ethel H.—When two people are meant for each other the way Allen and I are, we can meet and overcome any obstacles in the way.

There are no obstacles to our marriage at present. Allen has his divorce. His wife was quite willing and cooperative. Since she is making far more money than he is right now, she made no claims for support for either herself or their children. In fact, Allen says she signed that she would never take him to court for money. She always high-tailed him and now acts as though she wants to wash her hands of him forever. Once she started to earn money on her own, she treated him like dirt.

My family is trying to scare me about the situation. But we'll face each problem when it arises. There are none at present.

The Council: Nature certainly gives us an arsenal of weapons with which to protect ourselves. We have eyes, for example, to see what's ahead, and brains to prepare for meeting it. But in refusing to look further than his nose, Ethel is being deliberately near-sighted as well as short-sighted. Rae, speaking in behalf of the family, is wise to try to force her sister to see the clouds which will hover over the proposed union.

Over 2,000 years ago a tyrant named Dionysius showed a fellow named Damocles how to look at the whole picture instead of merely the nice part. He seated Damocles at a sumptuous

banquet, but immediately overhead was a sharp sword suspended by a single horsehair. Similarly, Allen's first wife's threat is the "sword of Damocles" for Ethel.

In this picture is an aggrieved wife who wants to hurt. Her present generosity may be merely the grand gesture as she awaits the most telling hour to strike where it will really hurt. And strike she probably can.

In the state of New York, as in most states, a man remains responsible for the needs and necessities of minor children. That probably means Wife No. 1 can change her mind and make trouble up to the time the youngest of her three children reaches the age of 21. (We say "probably" because the exact wording of the divorce decree must be examined and studied by a lawyer. Our comment is based upon our general feeling here.) In some extreme cases, we are informed, a man is even saddled with the support of an over-21 offspring if said descendant is, unfortunately, indigent and "a public charge."

So, Ethel, open your eyes and look, say, a year ahead. Picture yourself with your own infant. You're unable to work. Allen's first wife hurls her dart. How much of this compounded problem can you solve "together"? How long before Allen starts checking timetables with an eye on the Foreign Legion?

If you turn a deaf ear to Rae's plain talk, listen at least to a lawyer who can clarify the legal complications to which you and Allen may be heir.

Winema Offerings Exceed Log Budget

Klamath Falls-Timber sale offerings made by the Winema National Forest during fiscal year 1962 have exceeded the budgeted cut for the forest by more than 40 million board feet.

In a summary of the forest timber sale program, Supervisor Alex Smith said that during the period July 1, 1961, to June 30, 1962, 19 sales have been made for a total volume of 133 million board feet.

The Winema forest, which forms a portion of the Klamath basin working circle, has a budgeted cut of 90 million board feet annually.

"We have purposely oversold this volume," Smith said, "in an effort to develop a backlog of timber under contract as a stabilizing factor to the mills in this area."

With the exception of the Klamath district, which was formerly part of the Rogue River forest, the sales program on the new Winema forest has been developed from scratch this past year with no advance sale preparation to fall back on. For this reason, several sales were made at one time in June. "In future years, we hope to spread them out more evenly throughout the year," Smith said.

Deputies Praised For Unusual Work

Jackson county sheriff's deputies last week were praised by a Medford woman who recently moved here from Portland for their cooperation in performing some "unusual" duties.

The woman discovered a large snake near a water pump at her home in the Roxy Ann area, and was afraid a child might be bitten.

The snake crawled under the house by the time deputies arrived, so they went after it. It was finally located in a corner, and caught by a snare deputies constructed with wood they took from the woodpile at the residence. It was a bull snake.
