

Giants' Bonus Baby Looks Like Million Dollars So Far

The question of whether the San Francisco Giants paid bonus baby Bob Garibaldi \$150,000 or \$125,000 appears to be purely academic because he has looked like a million so far.

But to the acid test for the first time Monday night, the 20-year-old tyro came through like a pro, needing only one pitch to nail down a 3-2 victory over the New York Mets that boosted the Giants with-in two games of first place.

Garibaldi, placed on the Giants' roster only last Sunday, took over for Stu Miller in the ninth inning with the potential tying run on third, the winning run on first, two out and Rod Kanehl up.

Manager Alvin Dark handed Garibaldi the ball and said: "It's not do or die; it's just do or don't. And don't worry if you don't. There'll be a lot of other ball games."

Garibaldi made only one pitch—a fast ball—and Kanehl lifted it harmlessly to center field where Willy Mays hauled it in for the final out.

That kept Garibaldi's earned run average at 0.00.

He made his first appearance in the majors against the Mets Sunday, retiring the only three batters he faced on 11 pitches.

Admits Being Shaky

"I wasn't as nervous last night as I was the first time," Garibaldi said. "But I still was a little shaky."

"Alvin Dark made me feel better by what he said when I came in to pitch. It gives you confidence when you know they're not going to shoot you if you do something wrong."

The victory was credited to starter Jack Sanford and it was his 11th. Don Larsen balled Sanford out of a tight spot in the seventh and Miller relieved Larsen after he walked the first two men in the ninth.

The loss was charged to Roger Craig, who saw the Giants go ahead, 2-1, on an unearned run in the seventh. A pair of wild pitches by reliever Bob Miller produced another run for the Giants in the ninth and that proved to be the clincher after Richie Ashburn singled home the Mets' second run in the last of the ninth.

Pittsburgh came from behind to trip St. Louis, 5-2 and Milwaukee blanked Cincinnati, 3-0. The Houston-Chicago game was postponed because of wet grounds while the first place Los Angeles Dodgers and Philadelphia Phillies were idle.

Only two games were played in the American league where the New York Yankees stretched their lead to 3½ games with a 3-1 victory over the Kansas City A's, and the Washington Senators licked the Los Angeles Angels, 4-1.

Johnny Logan's grand slam homer in the sixth inning off Ray Sadecki of the Cards powered the Pirates to their 18th victory in the last 22 starts. The homer, Logan's first since 1960, overcame a 2-1 deficit and helped Alvin McBean to his 10th win in 15 decisions.

Home runs by Joe Adcock and Roy McMillan led the Braves to victory over the Reds. Bob Hendley held Cincinnati to six hits for his sixth victory. Joey Jay, who has won 12, suffered his ninth loss and first to the Braves since they traded him to the Reds in 1960. He had beaten his former teammates five times in the interim.

Ford Wins Eighth

Southpaw Whitey Ford reeled off his eighth win for the Yankees although Jim Bouton was called on to get the final out in the ninth after the A's scored their only run on Gino Cimoli's triple and a single by Manny Jimenez.

Ford allowed seven hits, struck out six and walked one. The Yanks nicked loser Donny Pfister for two runs in the second on Elston Howard's double, a walk, an error and a sacrifice fly, then added another run in the third on three singles.

Bob Johnson drove in three of the Senators' four runs against the Angels with a home run and a bases-loaded single. Both blows came off starter Ted Bowfield, who suffered his fourth defeat compared with five victories. Don Rudolph hurled a four-hitter to even his season record at 3-3.

After six years in the big leagues, he was shuffled down to the Pacific Coast league where he has been ever since. The batting average of the 35-year-old Alabamian is not much higher than his weight, but he can still unload homers and has now hit more than 230 of them in his colorful career.

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Coach Jack Faulkner said he was impressed by several of his new men — halfbacks Charles Marshall of Oregon State and John McGeever of Auburn and linebackers Dick Keeler of Long Beach State and Kim Fraser of Wisconsin.

The squad continues its two-day schedule and will follow the grind until Aug. 6. Faulkner said an intrasquad scrimmage will be held at Colorado State University here Saturday night.

Championship and first flights in the men's division started today.

LOCK JOINS SENATORS

Chicago — Outfielder Don Lock, purchased from the New York Yankee organization, joins the Washington Senators today and may be available for action in the doubleheader with the Chicago White Sox. Dick Lotz New Golf Champion

Pebble Beach, Calif. —The youth corps was in command of California state amateur golf this week—and some of the oldtimers were grumbling about starting "age-bracket" golf.

Dick Lotz, a brash, 19-year-old youngster from Hayward, won the state championship by disposing of his 17-year-old friend, Ron Cerrudo, Castro Valley, 5 and 3 in the finals Sunday.

And the heralded battle so intrigued the region's golfing fans that more than 2,000 turned out for the 36-hole finals.

"It was the biggest crowd we've had for a finals in five or six years," said Julie Besco of Long Beach, a member of the state golfing association board of directors.

Dick, who enters Houston (Tex.) university this fall, compiled a three-up lead at the end of the first 18—and Cerrudo never was able to put a dent in the margin the rest of the day.

"I have streaks and when my putting is good, I do pretty good," Lotz said after the triumph.

Cerrudo was supposed to be a greater matter. He had disposed of Lotz's older brother, John, 21, the day before with a tremendous display of talent on the greens.

But his touch suddenly left him during the morning round—and he three-putted the 14th, 15th and 16th, ruining his bid for the crown.

"I just started lifting my head, and I couldn't do anything about it," said Cerrudo. "But this was my first try here and I had hoped that I'd just be able to qualify for match play."

Seven of the eight men in the quarter-finals were 24 years of age or younger.

Lotz was the youngest man to win the championship since Gene Littler turned the trick more than a decade ago. Littler, later to win the National Amateur and National Open crowns, also was only 19 years old.

Harper Leads PCL Hitters

San Francisco —Tommy Harper of the San Diego Padres is leading the Pacific Coast League in hitting with a mark of .343, according to averages released today and including Sunday's games.

Harper, who also leads in home runs with 20, has cracked out 99 hits in 289 times at bat.

Jack Colburn of Vancouver, with an ERA of 2.43, is the top hurler, he has a 9-9 win-loss record. Dick Egan of Hawaii is the top winner with 11 to his credit against five losses.

Ken Walters of San Diego leads in doubles with 24; Tony Washington of Salt Lake City and Rod Graber of Spokane have 9 triples each; and Jess Gonder, San Diego, leads in runs-batted-in with 75.

Portland Slates Football Team

Portland —Portland will have an amateur football team competing in an organized league this fall.

Former Wilson football coach Bob Sweet said Monday the Portland Thunderbirds —formerly the Pioneer — will open drills Aug. 1 for a full eight game slate in the New North Pacific Amateur Football League, competing against Seattle, Tacoma, Fort Lewis and Vancouver, B.C.

First game is scheduled for Sept. 23 at Clatskanie against the Seattle Ramblers.

St. Luke's, Eastwood Baptist, Assembly of God Win Softball Games

St. Luke's Methodist topped First Methodist 12 to 6, Eastwood Baptist walloped First Christian 19 to 3 and Assembly of God defeated First Nazarene 11 to 5 in church league softball games Monday.

The score of the St. Luke's-First Methodist game was 9 to 6 after just one inning. First Methodist sent 10 men to the plate in the top of the first to score six runs on three hits, three walks and two errors.

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Koufax Has Hand Injury

Cincinnati —Pete "Nippy" Koufax left hand, the priceless paw that has posted 14 wins for the fireballing Dodger hurler, will be the center of attention tonight when Los Angeles opens a tough three-game series with the Cincinnati Reds in Crosley field.

Koufax drew the starting assignment against the Reds on Aug. 10, and both were out to notch their 15th win of the National League campaign. But Dodger Manager Walt Alton had a special interest in his talented southpaw's pitching arm.

Koufax has a peculiar injury to the hand that resulted in numbness, first in the fingers and now in the palm of the hand. Although he has taken his regular turn on the mound since the ailment was discovered, Koufax has complained of tenderness and pain in his fingers and, so far, a troop of doctors have failed to come up with a cure.

But it certainly hasn't dimmed the performance of the league-leading strikeout artist. Koufax has allowed only four earned runs in his last eight starts, including a no-hit, no-run game against the New York Mets.

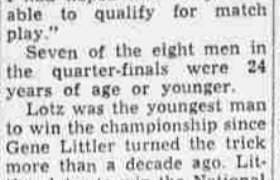
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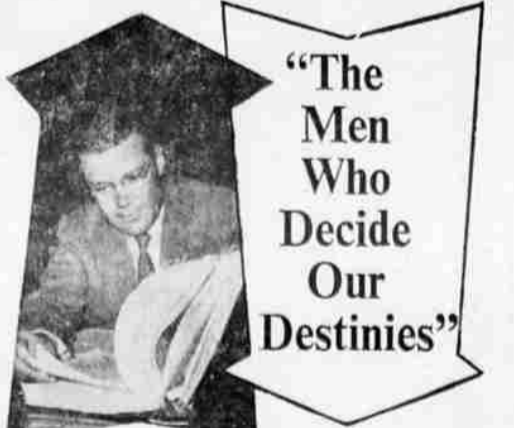


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
