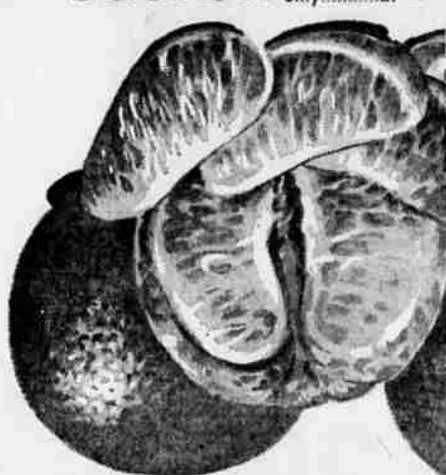

**Elimination of
Canada Shipping
Advantage Urged**

Washington—Shipping industry officials Wednesday joined Rupert L. Murphy, chairman of the Interstate Commerce Committee, in support of legislation to eliminate special advantages for Canadian rail shipments of lumber to the United States.

Murphy told the Senate Commerce Committee he favored legislation calling for the cancellation of international through rates when they hurt a domestic industry.

The ICC chairman told western senators that the legislation, requested to help the Pacific Northwest lumber industry might also help other industries in the future.

Warning Given

Spokesmen for ocean shipping lines supported the proposed legislation. But they warned that other legislation to allow foreign flag vessels to carry cargoes between U.S. ports might wipe out U.S. intercoastal services.

Edwin N. Altman, executive vice president of the American Maritime Commission, said even U.S. railroads would find it difficult to compete with foreign flag vessels in the transport of goods between the East and West coasts.

John N. Thurman, vice president of the Pacific American Steamship Association, questioned contentions of western senators asking for relaxation of the Jones Law, which limits U.S. coastal shipping to U.S. flag vessels.

**Educators to Attend
Festival Event**

Ashland—More than 100 secondary-level educators and administrators from all parts of the United States will arrive in Ashland Tuesday, July 24, to witness an Oregon Shakespearean Festival production as part of their work as participants in the John Hays Fellows Summer Institute in the Humanities.

The John Hays Summer Institutes in the Humanities enable a number of public high school teachers and administrators to study in the humanities for a month with a view to enriching their teaching and to stimulating creative, imaginative contributions to American education.

It is hoped by the directors that participants in the Summer Institutes will have experiences which will help them to return to their schools with increased wisdom and with new vigor and enthusiasm.

With headquarters in New York, the John Hays Fellows Program sponsors institutes throughout the country.

The group, which is studying at the University of Oregon, will witness the opening of "Coriolanus." The next day, the group will tour the theater plant and then attend a talk by Angus L. Bowmer, producing director of the Festival.

**Policeman Receives
Law School Degree**

New York—(UPI)—When Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said the Justice department needed young lawyers who were willing to work hard and not be clockwatchers, he must have had in mind men like William C. Lucas.

Lucas is a New York city policeman. He has six children and owns a home in Hempstead, a Long Island suburb.

Lucas has been a policeman since 1933 and once received a departmental citation for subduing an armed man. But his goal has been to be associated with the law other than by means of gun and badge.

In addition to pursuing his fulltime job and caring for his home and expanding family, Lucas has gone to night school—four nights a week, three hours a night—for the past four years. Early in June, he received his law degree from the Fordham university law school.

After taking his bar examination this summer, Lucas plans to join the criminal division of the Justice department in Washington, a position offered him in a chance meeting with Atty. Gen. Kennedy last spring.

The 34-year-old patrolman was introduced to Kennedy when the attorney general participated in the dedication of Fordham's new law school facilities. It was then Kennedy said he needed "men that were willing to work, work hard, and not be clockwatchers." Lucas measured up to that and other qualifications.

Before joining the police department, Lucas was graduated from Manhattan college with a bachelor's degree in physical education. He was captain of the college cross-country team his senior year.
