Stockpiling Query For Lead and Zinc Centers on Ike

Washington—A Senate subcommittee's effort to find out who ordered millions of dollars worth of unneeded lead and zinc bought for the national strategic stockpile centered today on former President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Sen. Henry C. Dvorzhak (R-Idaho) said Eisenhower suggested buying lead and zinc for the war emergency stockpile to help distressed industry back in 1954.

Testifying Wednesday before Sen. Stuart Symington's special investigating subcommittee, Dvorzhak said Eisenhower chose purchases for the stockpile over tariffs as the best way to aid ailing industry.

Symington welcomed Dvorzhak's testimony, saying it showed conclusively that the stockpile was used for other than strategic purposes.

Lead and zinc are among the most heavily overbought metals in the government's overflowing storehouse of critical materials.

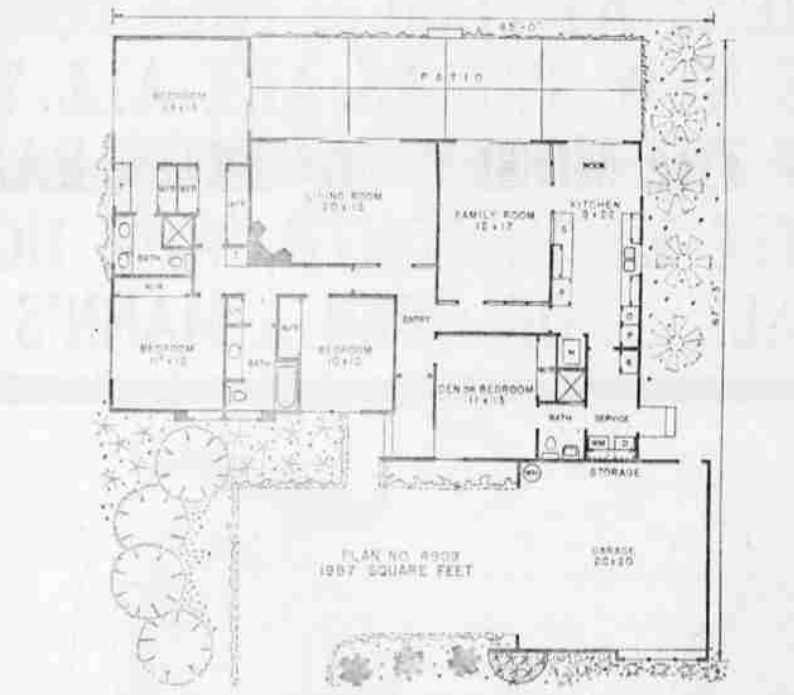
