

Starts Monday at RVCC

82 In Junior Golf Tourney

More than 80 young golfers will tee off here Monday morning to open the annual Southern Oregon Junior golf tournament at Rogue Valley Country club.

Pro Ron Caperna announced Saturday that 82 entries had been received so far. All indications suggest a "record field" this year. This is a medal play tournament with 18 holes to be played Monday and 18 on Tuesday.

Entrants are put into one of five divisions—junior boys, five divisions—junior boys, 12 to 15; pee wees, 11 and

under; junior girls, 15 to 17; and girls, 14 and under.

Junior action will start at 8 a.m. Monday on both courses at RVCC. Pairings and times were announced Saturday and are listed below.

This year's field of entries include golfers from Medford, Salem, Vancouver, Portland, Grants Pass, Coos Bay, Corvallis, Eugene, Bay City, Cottage Grove, Crescent City (Calif.), Lakeview, Redding (Calif.), Ashland and Klamath Falls.

Graham Bruner of Tillamook won the junior division trophy last year with a 148 gross score for the 36 holes.

In other divisions last summer, Rich Knight of Medford was first in the boys division with 148; Dave Boals of Medford was tops in the pee wees with 186; Mary Saunders of Grants Pass led junior girls play with 188; and Peggy Saunders of Grants Pass was number one in girls division with 183.

Pairings and times will change for Tuesday's play. All times are Pacific Standard Time.

Stiff Will Marks Vietnamese Leader

Saigon—UPI—President Ngo Dinh Diem of South Viet Nam is a stubborn man.

This stubbornness is reflected mostly in his fight to keep his strategic southeast Asia nation from falling to communism.

But it is also reflected in

his reluctance to accept the advice of the Americans who have a \$2 billion stake in South Viet Nam and who are determined the nation will not become communist.

Critics of the short and stocky Diem, who became 61 last January, charge this is

one of the president's greatest faults—his reluctance to accept advice, even from his aides, and his too great reliance on his closely-knit family.

Personally, Diem believes in his democracy. A Catholic, he is sincerely devoted to his people, who are most Buddhist.

He leads an austere bachelor life in the stucco, colonial-style presidential palace in the middle of Saigon.

Family Dominates

According to sources close to Diem, the dominant influence in his life is his family. He pays regular visits to the family home in the central Annam city of Hue, once the court of a Mandarin emperor.

Surviving members of Diem's immediate family are four brothers, Msgr. Ngo Dinh Thuc, Bishop and Vicar Apostolic of Ninh Long; Ngo Dinh Nhu, his political adviser; Ngo Dinh Luyen, who served as ambassador to London, and Ngo Dinh Can.

His eldest brother, Ngo Dinh Kho, was slain in 1945 by communist Viet Minh in an attempt to intimidate Diem, who was then taking a prominent part in South Viet Nam's drive for independence.

His only sister died in Hue in 1959.

Another member of the family who is said to wield much influence is his sister-in-law, Madame Ngo Dinh Nhu, considered to be the nation's first lady because of Diem's bachelorhood.

Influential Lady

She has been one of the leading figures in helping him get the new republic on the ground. Some critics claim the petite brunette has too much influence on the president.

Rumors also have circulated in Saigon from time to time that she and her husband are connected with illegal financial dealings involving U. S. foreign aid. Madame Nhu dismisses these by saying: "These stories are put around by communists and then taken up by irresponsible cowardly sections of the community and given credence." These rumors have never been accompanied by any proof.

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CHECK THE SAFETY OF YOUR FARM THIS WEEK

ONE THING A FARMER DOES NOT WANT TO CULTIVATE IS AN ACCIDENT

- GUARDS and safety devices should be kept on all machinery. Many farm accidents have resulted from unguarded mechanisms.
- ELECTRIC WIRING should be carefully insulated and inspected regularly. Many rural deaths were due to electrocution.
- CLOTHING that is loose-fitting or torn should never be worn around moving machinery.
- FIRE HAZARDS are everywhere... be careful with matches... don't smoke around the barn!
- GUNS should always be stored unloaded, and put where children can't get at them.
- ANIMALS may bolt if startled; warn them of your presence by speaking before approaching.
- WATER HOLES on your property are a potential danger to children... they should be fenced off to prevent mishaps.
- LOOSE WIRE should be coiled and stored or discarded. It can cripple animals and persons alike.

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
