Withdrawal of 21,000 acres of sand dune lands along the coast of Lane, Douglas and Coos counties from entry or disposition under the general mining laws is planned by the forest service, according to an application filed with the bureau of land management.

The lands are in the Siuslaw National forest. It is recommended that the area be maintained in its present condition.

Point Reyes Bill Passed by House

Washington, D.C. — A bill to establish the Point Reyes National Seashore passed in the House Monday by a voice vote, climaxing a four-year campaign to preserve the scenic cape 35 miles north of San Francisco for recreation.

The measure will now be returned to the Senate—which passed it last September—for confirmation of amendments. The chief amendment accepted on the House floor was a "simplifying" one proposed by Representative William S. Mailliard (R-Calif.). It will allow owners of residences built before Sept. 1, 1959, to continue to own them for 50 years from the enactment of the bill. The bill had provided they might be owned until the last surviving child of the owner became 30 years old.

the tranquilizer definitely contained the dangerous synthetic substance.

The Arizona Medical association named the anonymous panel which recommended terminating the pregnancy. Abortion is a felony in Arizona, but the law allows physicians leeway where the mother's physical or mental health may be endangered.

Doctors here agreed there was a strong likelihood the child would be born with deformed limbs or with arms or legs missing.

The woman said she was glad her case, believed to be the first of its kind in the United States, was being publicized.

"Perhaps others who may not have read that story and who have some of those European tranquilizers available will throw the drugs away," she said.
