

Willie Mays Hits Two Home Runs, Makes Shambles of Houston, Tex.

Willie Mays fired a couple of shots in Texas just to let the local folks know the San Francisco Giants are drawing a bead on first place again.
The say-hey kid made a shambles of Houston Tuesday night, blasting his 30th and 31st homers in addition to scoring all of his teams runs in a 3-1 victory over the Colts.

The one-man show by Mays, who flared up momentarily when he was hit by a Dick Farrell pitch, ran the Giants

latest winning streak to three games and edged them to within a game of the first-place Dodgers, who lost a 3-2 decision to the Cards.

Hit on Elbow
Willie belted both his homers off Farrell on successive times up in the first and fourth innings. Then when he came up for the third time in the sixth he was hit on the left elbow with a fast ball and subsequently scored the Giants' final run.

Before trotting down to first base, however, Mays had words with Farrell, angrily informing the Houston hurler he thought it was "a bush stunt." Farrell answered back but nothing came of it.

Mays leads both major leagues in home runs and for those who like to keep tabs on such statistics, he is eight games behind the record time-table Roger Maris employed en route to his 61 homers last season.

Jack Sanford racked up his 13th victory for the Giants although he left after yielding five hits in 6 2-3 innings. Don Larsen ambled out of the bullpen, stopped the Colts cold and pitched hitless ball the rest of the way while fanning four batters.

Reds Win Seventh
The Cincinnati Reds won their seventh in a row with a 6-4 win over the Pittsburgh Pirates, the Milwaukee Braves topped the New York Mets, 5-4, in 12 innings and the Chicago Cubs ends a seven-game losing streak with a 5-3 triumph over the Philadelphia Phillies.

The New York Yankees widened their American league lead to three games by beating the Boston Red Sox, 5-3, the Cleveland Indians nipped the Kansas City A's, 5-4, the Baltimore Orioles took the opener from the Los Angeles Angels, 3-2, but lost the nightcap, 8-5, the Chicago White Sox blanked the Washington Senators, 6-0, and the Minnesota Twins downed the Detroit Tigers, 4-3.

Ernie Broglio held the Dodgers to four hits but the Cardinal right-hander still needed a perfect relay from Julian Javier on Frank Howard's ninth inning double to cut down the tying run at the plate.

Stan Musial tied the score at 2-all with a fifth inning double and Curt Flood drove in the winning run with a sixth inning double off loser Stan Williams.

Eddie Kasko drove in three runs for the Reds, who made it 9 out of 11 against the Pirates this season. Joey Jay received credit for his 14th win although he had to leave the game when his shoulder tightened in the seventh. Jim Marshall and Wally Pott homered.

Crandall Homer Wins
Del Crandall gave the Braves their victory over the Mets when he homered on the first pitch off reliever R. G. Miller in the 12th inning. It was also the first pitch Miller ever delivered for the Mets.

Reliever Bob Shaw came on in the ninth and picked up his 11th victory. Felix Mantilla, Frank Thomas and Jim Hickman also hit homers.

The Cubs came from behind with three runs in the seventh to overcome the Phillies. Ken Hubbs homered for the Cubs in the first inning and drove in another win with a double in the seventh. Bill Smith was the loser in relief of Art Mahaffey, who was forced to retire in the sixth with a stiff shoulder.

Marshall Bridges nipped a ninth inning rally by the Red Sox to preserve the Yankee's victory. Whitey Ford won his 10th with the support of Moose Skowron, who drove in two runs with a double and a triple. Arnold Farley was the loser.

Donovan Win 13th
Dick Donovan scored his 13th victory in 17 decisions for the Indians although Gary Bell had to bail him out in the ninth when the A's scored their final two runs.

The Orioles got to Bo Belinsky for three quick runs in their opening game victory over Los Angeles. Johnny Temple stole home during a two-run rally in the first inning and the Orioles added what proved to be the winning run on Billy Moran's error in the second game. Steve Barber was the winner.

In the nightcap, the Angels spotted Baltimore three runs in the first inning and then rallied for five runs in the third. Ted Bowfield was the winner even though the Angels committed four errors, three of them by third baseman Felix Torres.

Cheney, Mike Hershberger and Al Smith also homered for the White Sox.

Rocky Colavito's ninth inning single broke a 3-all tie and gave the Tigers their first victory of the season over the Twins.

Colavito's game-winning blow came off loser Lee Stange and earned Jim Bunning his 10th victory. Norm Cash hit his 27th homer for the Tigers.
