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Pre-Registration Held At College

Asland—Sixteen Southern Oregon communities were represented by the 57 freshman pre-registrants at the first summer pre-registration meeting at Southern Oregon college recently, according to statistics released by Dr. Alvin A. Fellers, director of student activities.
The freshman pre-registration is a new program instituted by the college to lessen the emotional stress which accompanies freshman week at most campuses. Prospective students who pre-register for the fall term are assigned the academic counselors who, so far as possible, will be their advisors for the entire freshman year.
The pre-registrants have the advantage of knowing their advisors before the school year begins. They will know what subjects they are taking; they will have taken the necessary placement tests; and they will be relatively familiar with the college campus prior to freshman week in the fall. The fear of the unknown will thereby be lessened when the regular college year begins in September, Dr. Fellers said.
The next counseling session is set for Wednesday, July 25. Pre-registrants are to report to the Britt ballroom on the Southern Oregon campus at 9 a.m. Dr. Fellers pointed out that SCAT tests will be given to students who have not taken the SAT tests of the college board exams and to students who lack a C high school average and are seeking admission. At approximately 10:30 a.m. the cooperative English tests are given to all entering freshmen. At 11:30 a.m. the cooperative algebra test will be given to those majoring in the science, mathematics or related areas.
The 57 pre-registrants last week registered for these general areas: general studies, six; medical and dental assistants, one; anthropology, one; mechanical engineering, one; secondary teacher education, one; elementary teacher education, 22; accounting, two; secretarial science, 6; pre-dentistry, one; social service, one; home economics, one; forestry, two; civil engineering, one; engineering, one; physical therapy, one; and special education, one. Of the registrants, 16 were men, and 41 were women.

Local Man Elected To Winter Pear Control Group

The Winter Pear Control committee, meeting in Portland, has recommended to the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture a slight revision in regulations covering grades and sizes of anjou, bosc and comice pears shipped this year in interstate commerce from Oregon, Washington and California.
Basically the regulations are the same as last year, which called for a U. S. No. 2 minimum or better grade on anjou and size 188 (number of pears in a standard Western "Pon" box), except for some additional tolerance, reports Richard A. Patterson, secretary-treasurer of the committee, at Portland.
This tolerance on anjou is for frost and hail injuries resulting from adverse weather in Washington and the mid-Columbia growing areas this spring.
The committee recommended the U. S. No. 2 minimum or better grades for bosc and comice and size 180. Same grades were recommended for earlier and winter pears, with same size as last year at 165, and winter nells, size 225.
Inspection Exemption
Patterson said the committee also recommended an exemption from inspection on all winter nells shipped in interstate commerce in lots not exceeding 200 boxes, subject to a shipper's affidavit and spot checking for compliance.
He said official approval is expected soon from the Secretary of Agriculture and that the regulations will be in effect until July 1, 1963. The assessment was set at 8.5 mills per box.
J. A. "Ted" Hodapp, Placerville, Calif., was elected president of the committee, succeeding G. C. Crossland of Wenatchee, Wash. Other new officers are Richard Gray, Medford, first vice president; Richard F. Duckwall, Hood River, second vice president; Patterson, secretary-treasurer; and Richard A. Glaspey, assistant secretary.

Lake of Woods Road Job Added To List

Salem—The Oregon Highway Commission has added a rock production job on the Lake of Woods highway to its Aug. 8 bid opening here, bringing the total to 22 projects.
The rock project, in Klamath county, is on the Lake of the Woods-Wocus Mr. section of the highway about six miles northwest of Klamath Falls.

Schools Require Birth Certificate

Parents who have children entering school for the first time this fall will undoubtedly be required to have a copy of the child's birth certificate, Dr. A. Erin Merkel, Jackson county public health officer, advised.
Birth certificates are obtained from the vital statistics section of the state board of health in Portland. Dr. Merkel instructed.
"It is hoped that parents will order birth certificates now and avoid swamping the vital statistics section," Dr. Merkel added. "With the approach of the school season the demand climbs to 2,400 requests during the last week in August."
A photocopy of a record is 52. Chocky should be made out to the state board of health and the accompanying letter should give the full name of the child, the date of birth, place of birth and the name of the parents. Send to vital statistics section, state board of health, Box 231, Portland 7, Oregon. Allow one week for delivery, the public health officer instructed.
