

Commissioner Plans To Check Wrecking Yard for Compliance

County Commissioner Edwin Taylor said Friday he will "crack down" on a Talent area wrecking yard which is in violation of both the state wrecking yard regulations and county interim zoning rules. "I plan to visit the wrecking yard next week. If it is still in violation of the regulations, I will direct the sheriff's deputy to issue a citation," Taylor said.

County Judge Earl M. Miller said Friday he had assigned the wrecking yard problem to Taylor three weeks ago.

The county commissioner was instructed to have a deputy warn the yard operator he was still in violation and to correct it in a few days or a citation would be issued. Under the law, the county court could revoke the wrecking yard license putting the operator out of business.

Both Taylor and Miller noted that Walker's Wrecking yard in the Talent area has cleaned up its premises since the south Talent area interim zoning ordinance was established Nov. 1, 1961, on petition of a majority of the area residents. The area citizens had complained to the county court about the unsightly premises of the small businesses fronting on Highway 99.

The wrecking yard operator has repeatedly assured the county court that he would clean up his premises. However, following a recent inspection, Planning Technician Jack Eaton reported that wrecking yard materials now cover 3/10 of a mile of highway frontage. State law specifies wrecked cars and other yard merchandise must be contained within a limited area.

The wrecking yard operator assured the county court he would have cars removed from Bear creek and placed behind the fence and other corrections made by Jan 1.

Later, winter weather conditions hampered the clean-up work, it was explained, but the owner said he would take care of the wrecked cars as soon as the ground drains off, according to a county court letter to the planning commission.

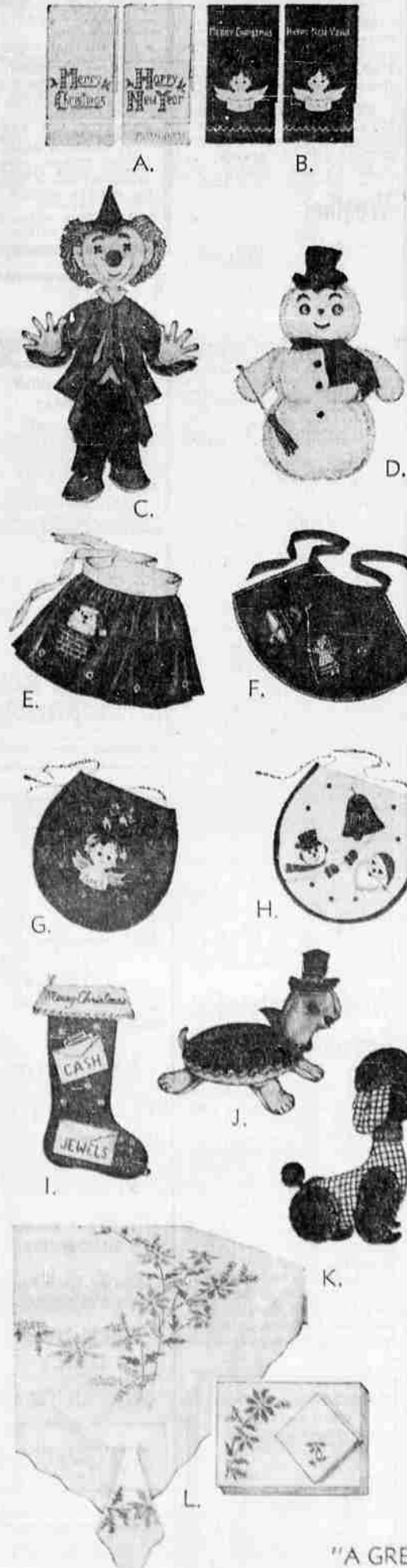
Civil Service Exams Given for Firemen

Final results will not be known for about two weeks. Only four men will be appointed to the local fire department.

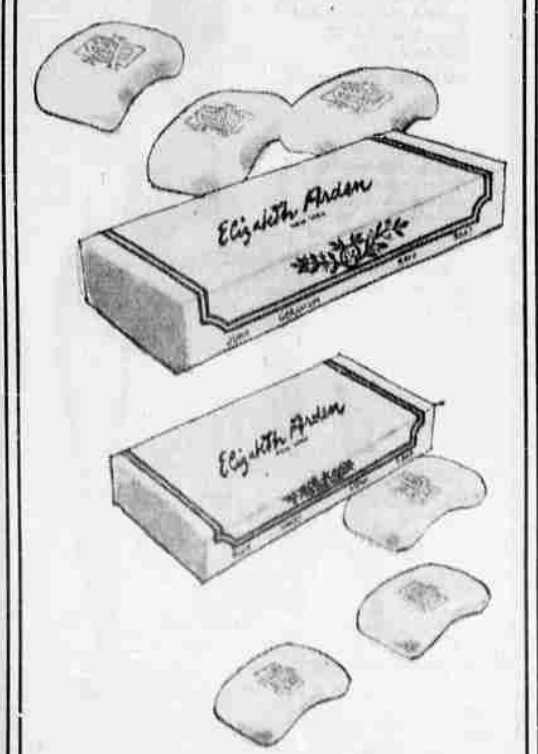

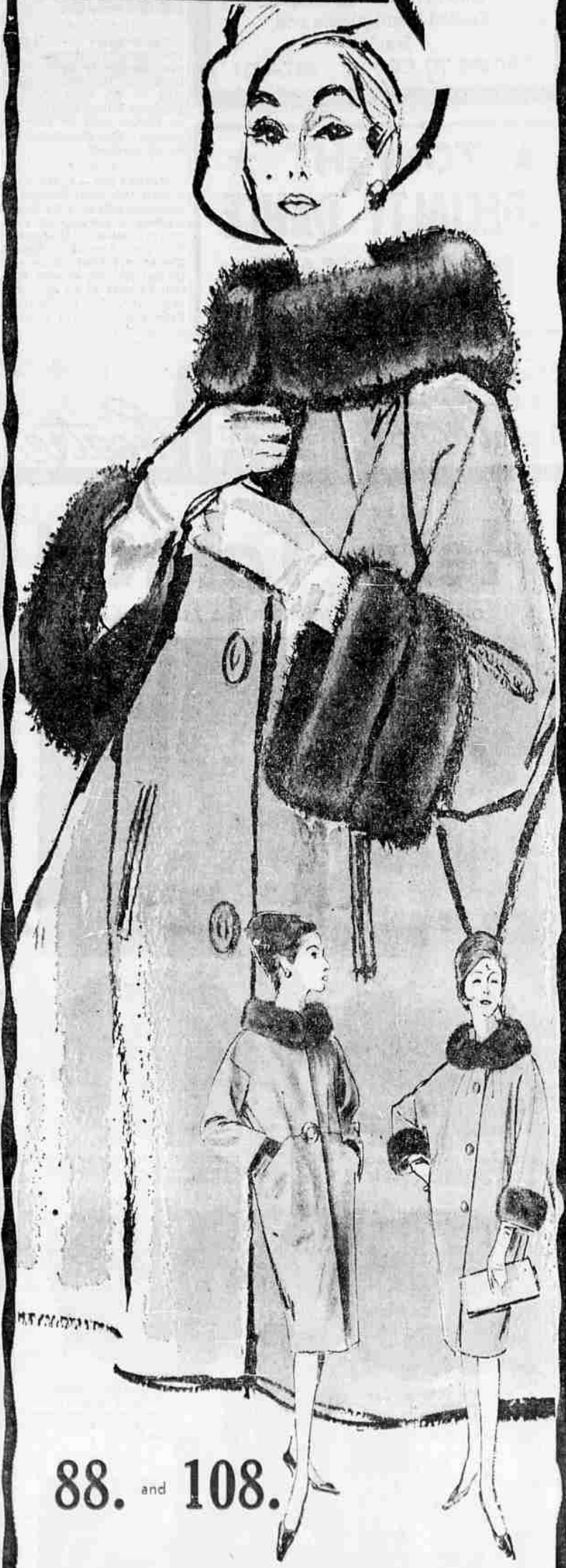
