

Vancouver Puts Lump In Pudding

San Diego's Padres have had things pretty much their own way in the Pacific Coast league of late, but the Vancouver Mounties put a few lumps in the pudding Sunday night.

The Redcoats, after being shut out for two straight games by the league-leaders, scored a 13-4 victory over the Padres in the first game of a doubleheader. San Diego returned to form and won the nightcap, 4-2, but the split allowed second place Salt Lake City and the other first division teams, Tacoma and Hawaii, to gain slightly on the Padres.

Tacoma turned back Seattle, 12-7, Salt Lake City defeated Spokane, 3-2, and Hawaii beat Portland, 5-4. Vancouver's victory was due largely to the hurling of veteran moundsman George Bamberger who came to the hill in the fifth inning and shut out the Padres for the remaining four and two thirds innings.

The righthander, who celebrates his 37th birthday Wednesday, also got two hits and drove in three runs. His record now is 8-7. Jay Ward had a homer and four RBI's in the contest for Vancouver.

San Diego took the second game behind the relief pitching of Ray Rippelmeyer. He took over from Howie Nunn after Nunn was lifted for a pinch hitter in the fifth inning. Rippelmeyer pitched shutout ball for the final two innings of the seven-inning game.

Tacoma banged out 13 hits off six Seattle pitchers and three of the blasts were homers. Neil Wilson, with two of the drive trippers and a single, roused in four runs. Faye Thronberry hit the other circuit clout for the Giants. Don Carlson, last of three Tacoma pitchers, gained the victory, his fifth against two losses. Elmer Singleton, who started for Seattle, took the loss, his seventh in 13 decisions.

A clutch single by Billy Williams in the eighth inning gave Salt Lake its victory. Tony Washington had set things up in the fifth when he banged out a two-run homer.

Hawaii got its win when pinchhitter Herb Plews doubled home the deciding tally in the bottom of the eighth inning. Islander right hander Ben Johnson went the distance for his eighth win against four defeats.

49ers Meet Minnesota On Aug. 11

Seattle — A first-hand glimpse of the controversial "shotgun" offense is almost a certainty when the San Francisco Forty Niners meet the Minnesota Vikings in University of Washington stadium Aug. 11.

Sponsored by Greater Seattle, Inc., the eighth game in the annual pro football series will present to Northwest grid fans a chance to see the Californians' colorful offense pitted against a Minnesota eleven that boasts former Husky stars Hugh McElhenny and Dean Derby.

Began in 1960

The story of the "shotgun" began at a Georgetown university practice field Nov. 22, 1960 when the Forty Niners opened preparations for a Baltimore meeting with the defending champion Colts. The outlook for San Francisco, to put it mildly, was bleak. The club had a 4-4 record up to that stage of the season and appeared to be on the brink of disaster.

After convincing his incredulous players that it could work, SF coach Red Hickey unveiled the new tactics before a capacity crowd of 57,000 at Memorial stadium, Baltimore. While the rabid Colt fans looked on in disbelief, the Forty Niners staged one of the season's greatest upsets, 30-22.

Largest Crowd
The largest Los Angeles crowd of the season — more than 77,000 — poured into the Coliseum the following Sunday to see the resurgent Forty Niners and their "shotgun" shenanigans. San Francisco collected an unprecedented fourth straight league win over the Rams, 23-7. Since that time the strategy has worked with varying degrees of success, but it is still one of the most exciting formations in modern football.

Two Hydros Enter Race For 1st Time

Detroit, Mich. — Two new unlimited hydros — Miss Bardahl and Notre Dame — are among 19 challengers for the 1962 edition of American Power Boat association's Gold Cup.

The race, which will be run on Lake Washington in Seattle Aug. 5, carries a cash prize of \$34,000.

Brand New
Although Miss Bardahl bears a name that has appeared on many starting lists, the 1962 challenger is a brand new boat, which has not yet seen major Gold Cup competition.

Notre Dame, a name remembered by Gold Cup veterans, is owned by Shirley M. McDonald, whose father, Herbert Mendelsohn, sponsored the Notre Dame that campaigned in the late thirties and won the Gold Cup in 1937. The new Notre Dame marks the first time in almost 30 years that a woman has entered a Gold Cup challenge.

The last time was in 1933 when the late Delphine Dodge also entered Nuisance in Gold Cup competition in 1925 and 1926.

Only Woman
The only woman ever to own a Gold Cup winner was Paula Blackton whose boat, Baby Speed Demon II, captured the prize in 1914, just prior to World War I. Further distinction was heaped upon the craft when its driver, sports columnist Bob Edgren, finished the race with a 50.49 mph average, the first Gold Cup boat ever to reach the 50 mph mark.

Laval-Sur-Le-Lac, Quebec — UPI — Ted Kroll, a consistent fairway bridesmaid and a fellow who is notorious for helping other pros, today thanked his wife, his caddy and Al Balding for "helping" him win the 53rd Canadian Open golf championship, ending a six-year famine.

The 42-year-old champ from Fort Lauderdale, Fla., plagued by last round blues for the past several seasons, reversed the script after almost blowing the title on the front nine, and came home with a clutch four-under par 32. It was enough to edge five-time U.S. Negro champion Charlie Sifford who at one time during the final round was 3-up on Kroll.

Kroll finished at 71-68-69-70-278; Sifford was 71-67-70-72-280.

Kroll said Balding, a Canadian pro, chided him into "getting more serious about my putting after the first round."

"I think I also ought to thank my wife for talking me into playing this week, and my caddy did a wonderful job of club selection."

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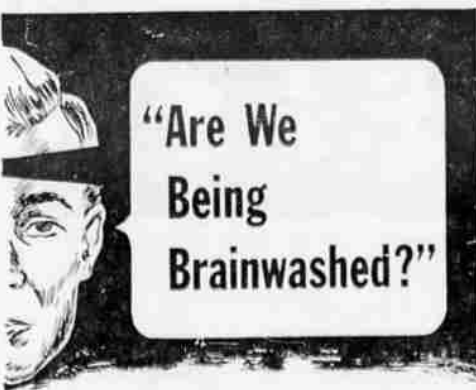
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
